The "honest dollar" we heard so much about in the last campaign will not buy as much wheat, or sugar, or clothing, or hardware as it did one year ago. Is it possible that the credit of this nation is being threatened by the use of a dishonest dollar?-Albion Minnor.

A WIRE nail factory at Salem, O. has been closed under the trust-foster. ing tariff. The proprietor gets \$100, 000 annually from the trust to just close up and do nothing, and we don't blame the proprietor. But the 150 employees who are thrown out of employment should march up and vote for Hanna this fall. In this way they get protection.

Ir is said that Mark Hanna, is meeting with such cold receptions at his speeches in Ohio, that he threatens to quit that line of compaigning and apply "business" methods. That means that there will be but very little of the half million "reserve fund" left in the republican National committee treasury after the Ohio campaign is closed.

WHEAT advanced in price because the crop of Europe, India and South América did not come up to the average yield. Don't let us make the mistake of thinking dollar wheat a certainty next year. It will not pay to go in debt to secure more land in order to double your acreage of wheat next year. An increased acreage for 1898 is neither safe or wise.—Farm News.

DEHORNING cattle is now practiced extensively, but there is a right time for so doing. The horns never should be removed when flies and insects are troublesome. The instrument should be scrupulously clean. Late in the fall is an excellent time for the operation, and it is better to expirment with a few matead of dehorning the entire herd. Novices can have the operation performed by a veterinary surgeon, if preferred.-Ex.

THERE is nothing "fancy" in breeding animals of pedigree The animals

are bred for merit, and any farmer can be a breeder. But few keep stock for pleasure or "fancy," the object being to secure as large profit as possible. The lost resulting from the the use of unfit animals on farms is larger than all the taxes paid by farms, and the gain of a few more quarts of milk per day amounts to a large sum in a year.-Ex.

NEAR Benton Harbor is "Twelve Corners," where is situated the "People's Church of America." This organization has no creed; but the fairs, and a large quantity was on exco-operative plan. One of their projects is the building of a huge cold storage house, and if apples do not command sufficiently large prices, they 'll put 'em on ice till they do. At Pottawatomie park a tabernacle is building which is to be "a clearinghouse of religion," which means, we suppose, that the interference of heaven will be no longer required!

LAST February, Congress passed an act which became a law, the intent of which is to prevent forest fires so far as possible. Notices are being sent out by the commissioner of land office at Washington, and are being generally distributed, calling attention to the act which is published full. The notices are printed on cloth. The act provides for the punishment of any one carelessly or maliciously starting fires, and calls on citizens generally, who have knowledge of the act to report the same to the proper authorities.

Success in farming, as in every other business, depends upon the prevention of waste. It is a waste of land to give it only half the cultivation it needs; it is a waste of feed to give it to a poor animal; it is a waste of time to spend it half doing a thing. If the wasted land-now given over to weeds, or only half cultivated—the wasted crops-only partially gathered the wasted feed-improperly fed, were utilized to their fullest extent another hundred million dollars could easily be added to the income of the farmers of this country. - Farm News.

Education of the Farmer

In former times the education of the farmer was sadly neglected along commercial lines. A few years ago about the market value of even farm products, and much less could he have any definite knowledge of the world's commodities and of the law of trade and commerce which govern the same. But the Grange, through its associated efforts and co-operative methods, enables the farmers to obtain a knowledge of the market value of every farm product and of every article of supplies for the farm and the house hold, from a paper of pins to a mowing machine or self-binder; and more than this, he has been taught to estimate the amount of farm products in this and other lands, to study the laws of supply and demand, to investigate the manipulations of the market and to apply his knowledge as best he may to his own conditions of farm life. -- Southern Cultivator.

Watering Horses.

"A Practical farmar" preads, in the Gettysburg (Pa.) Compiler, for plenty of fresh water for farm horses in hot weather. He has been among horses all his life and thinks, if they had their way, they would drink as often as men do. Yet, as a rule, they are fed dry hay and grass at night and the same again in the morning, getting no water until taken out to work after all the chores are done. Then some farmers will leave their teams in the field at 4 or 5 o'clock p. m., go to the house and eat supper return and work their horses till 7 or 8 o'clock, the horses getting no water till reaching the barn. The writer's custom for years has been, during hot est bidder, the mortgaged premises, or weather, to give his horses water the sufficient part thereof to pay the principfirst thing in the morning, just loosing them at the head, and letting in said mortgage. The said mortgaged them run to the trough. They relish it greatly after being in the hot stable all night. Then give them their hay and grain, and on starting for the day's work let them have water again. If the rule is once adopted to water the last thing at night and the first thing in the morning, no human farmer will depart from it.

The Hog.

The hog grows the cheapest on the pasture and beside the field that grows his grains. He is most profitable as a subordinate department, because he cannot consume the coarse fedder of the farm. He furnishes the best market in which to sell the by-products of the mill and dairy. He assimilates more of the most concentrated feedstuffs than any other animal of the farm. Quicker returns come from him than farm horses, cattle, or sheep. He pays the rents in Euorpean countries, lifts the mortgages in the northern states. and in conjuntion with the cow, he will redeem the wornout cotton and tobacco fields of the south.

Avoid permanent residences for the hog; move him about, so that his environments may be clean and uncontaminated by germs that develop rapidly where they have suitable media. Avoid close breeding, as it intensifies predisposition to disease Seclect your breeding from good milkers, as this is the best indication of fecundity. - Ex.
