MURDER RND SUCIDRE. City, K川ls his Wife and then Himself.
At Flint on Thursday afternoon of ast week occured a traged 7 that resulted in the death of two former resi. dents of this city. The following dispatch to the Detroit Free Press of 'ast Friday gives the particulare: "One of the most blood curdling tragedies that Flint has seen in years occured about 4 o'elock this afternoon. The participants in the awful affair were Mr. and Mrs. Lester L Burton, both of whom are now lying cold in death. The hand that sent
two souls into etermity in an instant two souls into etermity in an instant
was that of Mr. Burton, who killed was that of Mr. Burton, who killed his wife by sendiag three bullets into to his own head and sent a bullet crashing through bis brain. The news of the shooting, which was done in the parlors of the Dayton house, on Detroit street, spread rapidly and in a few moments there were thousands of people gathered about the scene of the murder, anxious to learn something about the terrible deed. On the six of August last Mrs.Bur ton filed a bill in the Circuit Cour askirg that she be granted a decret count of extreme cruelty. Upon the same day she made a criminal complaint before justice Swayzee against him for an aggravated case of assault
and battery. He was arrested, but upon his promise to leave the city and not interfere with her any more this complaint was withdrawn. Burton then went to Chicago, where he remained until about ten days ago when he went to the hotel which his wife was running and partook of the hospatalties of the house with the ut part: People who knew him were heard to remark how suciable he was. and he never looked better during his five years' residence in this city. However he had murder in his heart and jeal ously in his brain, and with the aid of a revolver be made quick w
his poor unfortunate yictim. his poor unfortunate yictim. Coroner Beagle wss called to take charge of the bodies, a jury was immaneled and viewed the remains after which the dead bodies were lai side by side and taken to an under taking establishment.
