## The Supervisors.

The county board of supervisors have been in session this week. On Monday expert accountant Dresser, who has been auditing the books of the county treasurer's office for a period covering 12 years, submitted his report, which is very extensive. The report compliments the men who have had charge of the office during that time. The expert finds no deficiencies of any amount the only ones being two or three clerical errors, which amount to nothing. There are a few persons in the county who believe the hiring of Mr. Dresser, was an useless expense, but we are of the opinion that they will agree that the money was well spent if they will examine the new system of keeping accounts which has been adopted, and the simplifications of doing business, which have been adopted on his recommendation. The report in full will be published in the official proceedings.  
Wednesday afternoon the board took up the election of a member of school examiners and a county poor commissioner, after fifteen unsuccessful ballots for examiner the election was put over until Thursday morning. There were two candidates for the office of examiner, F. F. French of East Tawas, and W. H. Hartley of this city, Mr. French was elected on the 21st ballot, securing the necessary 13 votes.  
For Poor Commissioner, Charles W. Force, was elected on the first ballot, to succeed himself.  
The board will probably complete its labors this week.

## MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Lester Burton, formerly of this City, Kills his Wife and then Himself.

At Flint on Thursday afternoon of last week occurred a tragedy that resulted in the death of two former residents of this city. The following dispatch to the Detroit Free Press of last Friday gives the particulars:  
"One of the most blood curdling tragedies that Flint has seen in years occurred about 4 o'clock this afternoon. The participants in the awful affair were Mr. and Mrs. Lester L. Burton, both of whom are now lying cold in death. The hand that sent two souls into eternity in an instant was that of Mr. Burton, who killed his wife by sending three bullets into her body and then placed the revolver to his own head and sent a bullet crashing through his brain. The news of the shooting, which was done in the parlors of the Dayton house, on Detroit street, spread rapidly and in a few moments there were thousands of people gathered about the scene of the murder, anxious to learn something about the terrible deed.  
On the six of August last Mrs. Burton filed a bill in the Circuit Court asking that she be granted a decree of divorce from her husband on account of extreme cruelty. Upon the same day she made a criminal complaint before justice Swayzee against him for an aggravated case of assault and battery. He was arrested, but upon his promise to leave the city and not interfere with her any more this complaint was withdrawn. Burton then went to Chicago, where he remained until about ten days ago, when he went to the hotel which his wife was running and partook of the hospitalities of the house with the utmost freedom and good cheer on his part. People who knew him were heard to remark how sociable he was, and he never looked better during his five years' residence in this city. However he had murder in his heart and jealously in his brain, and with the aid of a revolver he made quick work of his poor unfortunate victim.

Coroner Beagle was called to take charge of the bodies, a jury was impaneled and viewed the remains, after which the dead bodies were laid side by side and taken to an undertaking establishment."

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SPEAKING of his authorship of section 22, Senator Elkins says he is proud of it. Elkins is proud of a good many things that would make a Missouri horse trader ashamed of himself.

The McKinley administration run the government, in debt about four million of dollars, during September which, compared with the same month of last year is just about doubled a good showing.

THE Dingley tariff bill continued its work of piling up a deficit during September. The total income during the past month was \$7,943,100.28. During the same period in 1896, under the Wilson law, it was \$11,374,116.28. At this rate, how much of a surplus will the McKinley administration have at the end of its four years?

THE Detroit Journal lambasted the farmers who are plowing up meadows and sowing wheat this fall, for it says that the conditions that make wheat high this season are not likely to prevail next season, and hay will probably be higher and wheat lower. We thought it was the Dingley bill that made things hum and that it was likely to last forever, and that so successful.—Cheboygan Democrat.

ALAS, and what is this county coming to and whence are we tending? Ex-president Harrison claimed that the Lord assisted him in his election, and now senator Hanna in a speech the other day at Benton, Ohio, proclaimed boldly and unqualifiably that the Lord was a republican. Well we were taught the Lord's prayer by our mother and have always leaned for aid and protection on the Lord to the extent our wicked nature would allow, but if we thought the Lord had joined the republican party then our faith would begin to flicker.—Albion Mirror.

In an interview on the unfavorable reply anticipated from Great Britain to the International Bi-metallic Envoys, Senator Teller says: "I have all along said that France might be willing to open her mints, but that she would ask more concessions to silver than Great Britain would be willing to grant, and so the conference would come to naught. Moreover, I believe even if England should open the mints of India to the free coinage of silver as France, requests, and France should open her mints and the Bank of England should hold one-fifth of its reserves in silver, the present administration would do nothing for silver in this country."

New laws went into effect recently which effect the fees of the County Register, Treasurer and Clerk. In the Register's office hereafter, attachments on real estate will have to be recorded instead of filed. The former price was 25 cents per filing, but under the new law the charge will be the same as for other legal papers, 11 cents a folio. In the Treasurer's office for issuing certificates showing the taxes on property for five years preceding the date of the instrument, the fees will be 15 cents instead of 25 cents. In the Clerk's office 75 cents will be charged for a hunter's license, 50 cents of which will go to the County Treasurer to pay any bills that may be incurred by deputy game warden. If there is a surplus left in the Treasurer's hands it will be paid to the state game warden to go towards defraying the expense of his office.—Cass Advertiser.

## WASHINGTON LETTER.

OCTOBER, 11th, 1897.

That Mr. McKinley is being duped by the government of Spain is the opinion of nearly everybody, except Mr. McKinley and the members of his cabinet. Spain is playing for time and a plenty of it, and it is likely to get it too, unless this country rudely awakens the administration from its dream and demands that Spain be made to fish or cut bait. It is difficult to find an intelligent person who does not believe that the change of ministry in Spain was brought about solely for the purpose of securing delay in replying to the proposition submitted by the United States, and if the game worked well then, there is no reason that it will not be worked again, or at any rate attempted, when Minister Woodford tries to prod the new ministry for a reply. Spain is also trying to secure the support of the bread and butter brigade in this country by hinting at a commercial monopoly to be granted us as soon as peace is restored to Cuba under the new home rule scheme. These things may catch Mr. McKinley, but they do not catch those who know the actual situation in Cuba. Spain will have nothing to do with the commerce of Cuba when there is a restoration of business and trade on the island, because its hold upon the island will be gone. Mr. McKinley cannot change the ultimate result in Cuba, but he can hurry up matters, if so disposed. If he allows Spain to pull the wool over his eyes by the recall of Butcher Weyer, and indefinite talk about Home Rule concessions to the Cubans, which every schoolboy in the United States knows will not be accepted, he will simply lose a great opportunity to please the people of this country, regardless of party. He probably has not forgotten how difficult it was to prevent Congress forcing this issue last spring. It will be impossible, if nothing has been done by the time Congress reassembles in December.

The single gold standard advocates composing the so-called monetary conference, which has reassembled in Washington after a recess, are, perhaps unconsciously, doing the silver men a great favor by trying to force the administration into the advocacy and on the country, at the coming session of Congress. Nothing would please the silver men so well as to see this issue forced to the front by an attempt to jam legislation through Congress. Without the active assistance of the administration, it cannot be done. Left to himself, Mr. McKinley would let the financial question severely alone, but with this commission hammering away at him from the outside and Secretary Gage from the inside, he may give in and recommend financial legislation in his annual message to congress. If the support of Czar Reed be secured, any sort of a bill can be passed by the House, but that is where it will stop. The silver men command the situation in the senate, and nothing which they oppose can get through that body.

It is enough to cause a smile on the of a wooden Indian to listen to the official announcement that Mr. McKinley is going to Ohio to vote, but is in doubt as to whether he will accept either of the several invitations that have been extended to him to make a speech in the state previous to the election, when it is well known that Boss Hanna billed him weeks ago for a speech in Cincinnati.

Pagan Bob Ingersoll had influence enough with Mr. McKinley to pull down a nice plum for one of his nephews,—“Fools rush in” etc. There has been more or less comment in Washington on the fact that Senator Foraker, of Ohio, was the only republican of national prominence who could be induced to take part in the republican mass meeting in New York, held to ratify the nomination of Ex-Secretary Tracy by Boss Platt and Mr. McKinley. Ex-President Harrison positively declined, although Tracy is his personal friend and was a member of his Cabinet; Chauncey Depew conveniently managed to have other engagements, and Czar Reed politely refused to go. This means that these men are “on to” the Platt-McKinley game and are too smart to get themselves mixed up in it. Why Foraker went to New York is one of the hard things to answer. After his shabby treatment in Ohio by Boss Hanna, he was probably flattered when Boss Platt asked him to speak at the New York meeting and accepted the invitation off hand.

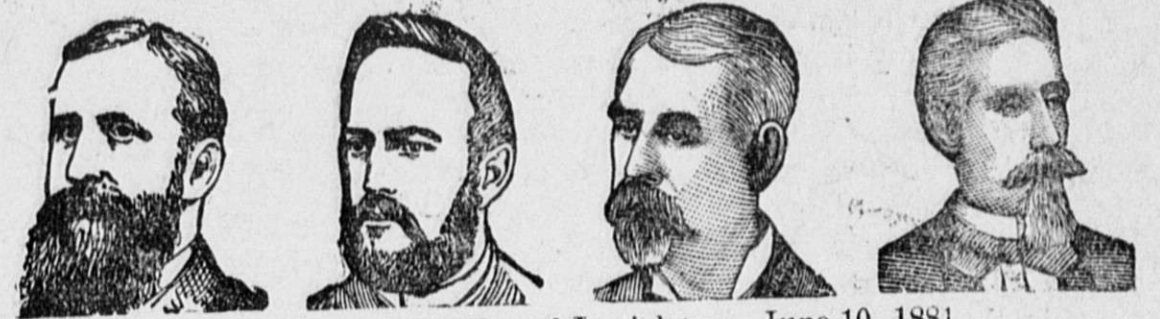
