Circuit Court.

The November term of circuit court convened Tuesday with Judge Simpson presiding. There were eight criminal, nine civil and three chancery cases on the docket.

In the case of Cora Myzek, an eighteen year old AuSable girl, charge with stealing \$50 worth of jewelry, the defendant plead guilty and is held for sentence later in the term.

The liquor cases were all put over the term.

The case against Thomas and Charles Vowles, charged with the burglary of Koenig's grocery store, was commenced Tuesday afternoon and continued until Wednesday noon, when it was put over until Thursday morning in order to secure a witness. The case was taken up again Thursday morning and given to the jury at 5:30 o'clock last evening. They had failed to agree at the time we went to press this morning, and will probably be discharged when court opens.

Wednesday afternoon the case of the people vs John Sayon, charged with threatening to burn buildings, was tried and a verdict of acquittal rendered.

THE republican defeat of last Tuesday are but samples of what 1898 holds in store for them.

THE election of last Tuesday successfully contradicts the goldbug cry that silver was a dead issue

HANNA has spent several weeks telling the voters of Ohio that any thing less than the republican majority of last fall would be a repudiation of McKinley's administration. We venture that it was the nearest he came to telling the truth during his entire canvass.

HENRY GEORGE, Jr. has issued a circular in which he solemnly dedicates his life to the work to which his noble father gave his. The young man is peculiarly fitted to carry on the great reform of his father, having for several years served as private secretary, and being thoroughly familiar with every detail of his father's work

THE Kansas Experiment station pronounces moldy corn very dangerous to feed to horses. The spores of this mold gain entrance to the circulation, and find lodgment in the kidneys and liver. The latter is more affected than the kidneys, probably on account of the lower pressure of the circulation. The spores germinate here and cause inflammation of these organs. The cerebral symptom are the result of the formation of an abscess in the cerebrum. This abscess is caused by an interference with the blood supply. The spores seem to retain their infectious properties for about six months

A mourning city, a grief-stricken people, showed honor to the man who had fallen in the battle for what he believed to be the right. Henry George, apostle of the single tax, leader of the new Jeffersonian Democracy stricken on the eve of election, was honored as no private citizen of America was ever honored before. Public griefs have been many in the great metropolis of the western hemisphere, many have been sincerely mourned, but none, save him who went to eternal rest after having served his people as a leader of soldiers and a chief executive of the land, had laid at his bier such evidence of public grief widespread sorrow and sincere grief, as was laid at the bier of Henry George.

The Cuban junta in New York has formally declared its disapproval of the offer of Spain of Cuba autonomy. This action was predicted by every intelligent observer of the movements of the insurrection, both here and in Europe, outside of Spain itself. In the first place, Cuba did not begin this war for a betterment of conditions under Spanish rule. The day for these things had long passed away, and they certainly became impossible even of discussion after the failure of Spain to institute the reforms promised on condition of the Cubans laying down their arms 20 years ago. In the second place, the particular reforms offered were not acceptable under any circumstances. In the offer of pacification, Spain made no mention of the finances of Cuba, who is to pay the expenses of the unsuccessful attempt of Spain to conquer this people? One quarter of all the money that Spain owes has been borrowed on account of Cuba. At the beginning of this year this sum amounted to \$200,000,000, and it has since been increased to \$350,000,000. Cuban autonomy with this enormous load of debt on her shoulders and Spanish silence about the matter means that Spain intends that Cuba shall pay all this money eventually would be no autonomy at all. It would be financial slavery. Under such a load

Cuba could never get another start in the world. The junta's refusal to consider the proposition is natural inevitable.—Evening News.

TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

The fall elections held in many states last Tuesday prove an overwhelming defeat for the republican party and a repudiation of the present administration. It also demonstrated that the silver question was far from a "dead issue." In every state where the campaign was made on that issue the silver party made wonderful gains over last fall.

In Ohio where Mark Hanna, the dictator of the present administration, made a personal canvas for re-election to the United States senate, he meets with defeat by the loss of the legislature, while republican state ticket is elected by only about 10,000, nearly 40,000 less majority than McKinley received last fall.

In Kentucky, which went republican last fall, the silver democracy win by 25,000.

New York state gives a democratic majority of 50,000, while Nebraska, Colorado, Maryland and Virginia all roll up majorities for the Bryan forces. The republicans carry Iowa, Kansas and New Jersey by reduced majorities.

Tamney carries Greater New York by nearly 90,000.

Detroit does herself proud by re-electing William C. Maybury mayor. They also elected city treasurer and gained several members of the city council.

Port Huron went republican as usual.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

NOVEMBER, 1st, 1897.

Secretary Gage now owns up to the gold bond scheme, which so many republicans took the trouble to deny when it was publicly stated a short time ago that it would form the foundation of the administration's attempt to secure financial legislation from congress at the coming session. Mr. Gage's statement to the cabinet has been made public, probably with the hope that it will meet favor with the people to a sufficient extent to influence senators who are naturally opposed to such a scheme, which, for bamboozing purposes, Mr. Gage calls anti-radical in character. This country fought the greatest war of modern times without finding it necessary to issue a single gold bond, yet, now, in a time of peace and amid boasts of continued and increasing prosperity, the administration will ask congress to authorize the issue of a sufficient quantity of gold bonds to refund the entire bonded indebtedness of the country and to add a hundred or two million to the gold reserve fund. Some of the arguments advanced in favor of the change are little short of ludicrous. For instance, when Mr. Gage says that making our entire bonded indebtedness payable in gold would strengthen and confirm the public credit and put us in a position to command the markets of the world for our securities on the most advantageous terms." Every school boy knows that we already occupy that position; that the securities of no country on earth are in greater demand all over the world than those of the United States.

Mr. Gage repeats the Cleveland-Carlisle recommendation that the greenbacks and Treasury notes be retired, and offers as a substitute the probable increase of national bank notes that would follow the adoption of his recommendation to allow national banks to be established with a capital of \$25,000 in towns of less than 2,000 inhabitants and to allow all national banks to issue notes to the par value of the bonds they have deposited with the government to secure their circulation. Taken all in all, the financial recommendation of the present administration bear a close resemblance to those of the Cleveland-Carlisle regime, and the following words written by Mr. Gage, after telling about how prosperous the country is now on account of bountiful crops, etc., indicate that the administration might ever follow Mr. Cleveland's example in giving the

country a financial object lesson to impress its view upon congress: "Unfortunately these good conditions cannot be assured to us. Commerce and industry, sensitive to all unfavorable events, and watchful with anxiety against dangers as yet unseen, need for their full rehabilitation from past reverses and depressions, a renewed confidence that the government's finances are to be firmly placed on stronger and more enduring foundation than now exists." In other words, the establishment of the single gold standard by law, instead of by the will of an administration, as at present, is demanded. The difference between demanding and getting from congress will soon be apparent from the administration.

How the Dingley tariff law acts to reduce our trade with Mexico—trade which naturally belongs to us, is shown by the following remarks of Mr. E. L. Stillson, now in Washington, who has been in Mexico for fifteen years, as manager of a Philadelphia silver mining company: "This country, I think is not pursuing exactly the right policy in its relations to Mexico. We ought, by right of contiguity to have almost a monopoly of the trade of the sister republic. Everybody knows that instead of buying the bulk of its imports from the United States that Mexico prefers to get them of France and Germany. The reason for this is that we have put a high tariff on Mexico products, and so the Diaz government thinks it proper to get back at us by a stiff duty on American wares. The goods of France and other foreign countries are not so heavily taxed, and therefore crowd yankee products out of the market. As long as we levy such high tribute against them, we may expect to see their trade almost monopolized by trans-Atlantic countries."

Notwithstanding the jolly that Attorney General McKenns has been publicly giving himself for his work in helping the Huntington syndicate make sure of getting the Union Pacific Railroad at a price admitted to be many millions below the actual value of the property, he is said to fear that it may keep him out of that coveted seat on the bench of the U. S. Supreme court, to which he will be nominated in a few weeks. He knows that there are a number of senators who are thoroughly posted on this whole U. P. business, and he has a dread lest they should see fit to either hold up or defeat his nomination to succeed Justice Field, as a punishment for his connection with the deal.

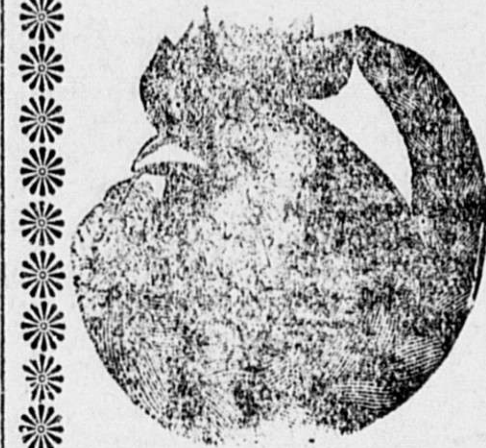

The health officer reported to the council that he had investigated the matter and found that the case was as complained of.

RESOLVED, That the city attorney be, and is hereby instructed to procure an injunction enjoining and restraining any and all persons from depositing any filth or sewerage in Tawas River upon complaint of Wm. B. Kelly.

The resolution was adopted, all voting yes.

The following resolution was presented by alderman Dove who moved its adoption, which was supported by alderman Rollin.

RESOLVED, That the committee on ordinances, with city attorney be, and are hereby instructed to prepare an ordinance in conformity with section 4, chapter 17, of act number 215 of the Public Acts of 1895, and report at next regular meeting.

The resolution was adopted, all voting yes.

The committee on streets and sidewalks reported that the Halletown road below the bridge was in an almost impassable condition and recommended that the same be repaired and graveled at once.

Moved by alderman Bigelow and supported by alderman Dove that the committee on streets and sidewalks be, and are hereby instructed to have Halletown road repaired at once. Carried, all voting yes.

Moved by alderman Dove and supported by alderman Murphy that council adjourn. Carried, all voting yes.
