THE ready-made "When Mr. Bryan 'electified' Ohio," editorial that appeared in our republican exchanges last week, is badly shattered by the republican "victory" in that last week.

ANOTHER big fire succeeded to McKinley "prosperity" Saturday afternoon. It was the great publishing house of the Werner Company, of Chicago and Akron, Ohio, which has printed so many tracts on the blessings of the gold standard. The Hannacrats kept it going long enough so that the people wouldn't hear of the failure before election. The liabilities are given at \$300,000, and although the company had four millions of dollars worth of assets it could not realize on them and was forced to the wall.—Petoskey Democrat.

A Honest Confession.

In its issue of October 14, the Chicago Tribune says: "No matter how much gold may be dug out along the Yukon and its tributaries during the next ten or twenty years, the world will be able to find a good use for all of it. Even if the amount of a thousand million were to be thrown into circulation during the next two or three years it would be absorbed forthwith by Russia, Austria-Hungary and other European nations. I would be used by them in establishing the gold standard on the broadest possible foundation. China, India and Japan will take another billion as soon as they can get it. The United States and other American countries can find with the greatest ease employment for a billion more."

This is a practical confession from a gold bug paper that there is scarcely half enough gold in the world to establish the business of the world on that foundation, and as there is no possible chance of getting the gold, the only hope of the world is in fr silver.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

NOVEMBER, 8th, 1897.

Senator Jones, of Ark., Chairman of the Democratic National Committee arrived in Washington in a decidedly jubilant state of mind over the results of last week's elections. He said on the subject: "Well, you bet I'm tickled. It makes me feel 25 years younger and makes me understand that the American people have not been bought or blinded this time. The results are an omen of coming and greater good. It just takes opposition and sorrow to develop the full strength of the democratic party. This result convinces me that the silver sentiment grows, grows and grows, and that by the next Presidential election, it will have grown to an irresistible strength. Just mark my words. Error dies from a pin scratch, but truth survives the cyclone. The democratic party is truth. When it comes to a long race and a hard race, the democratic party gets there. I am very sorry because of the turn matters have taken in old Maryland, but hope for her is not dead in my bosom yet. Of course it would have been more desirable had Mark Hanna been inhumed under an avalanche of democratic votes, but when a great man saves his scalp only by the skin of his teeth, it is virtually a defeat."

One of the most interesting stories growing out of the Ohio election is now being told on the quiet in Wash-

ington, and it finds believers, too. According to this story, Secretary Sherman has been approached by Foraker republicans and offered an opportunity to get even with Boss Hanna and Mr. McKinley for the snobby treatment they have given him, not only by preventing Hanna's election to the senate, but by securing his own return to that body. Mr. Sherman is to old a bird to gobble up everything tempting that is placed before him, but he is said to have this proposition under consideration and to be making a quiet investigation, through trusted agents, as to the probability of success should he consent to enter the anti-Hanna combin. The scheme in brief is for the Foraker members of the Ohio legislature to stay out of the republican caucus, which will, of course, nominate Hanna for the senate, and to nominate Jay Bushnell or some other thick and thin Foraker man as the anti-caucus candidate. The Forakerites claim to have members enough to bring about and keep up for an indefinite period, a deadlock in the legislature, and they argue that after Hanna sees his own election to be an impossibility, he will be willing to join Bushnell in withdrawing and in agreeing upon a compromise candidate who can get the entire republican vote and be elected. That is where the Forakerites tell Mr. Sherman that he can come in. They say that they will suggest him as a compromise candidate for the senate, and that much as they would like to neither Boss Hanna nor Mr. McKinley will dare to object. There are too many "ifs" in this scheme, but it indicates how harmonious the Ohio republicans are.

Consul General Lee has received his final instructions and will this week return to Cuba. He is as careful as ever about discussing Cuban matters, but there are good reasons for saying that he is confident that there will be peace in Cuba in a few months. It was because of this belief on his part that he agreed, when recently requested to do so by Mr. McKinley, to remain in Cuba until the trouble was over.

The army of pensioners still steadily grow in numbers, notwithstanding the assertion of several commissioners pensions that it had reached high water mark and was about to start on the down grade. The annual report of commissioner Evans shows that there were 5,336 more names on the rolls on June 30, 1897, than there were one year before, notwithstanding the dropping, during the fiscal year for death and other causes of 41,122 names. There were 976,014 names on the roll at the close of the last fiscal year, and, unless, death claims an unusually large number, it is probable that the million mark will be passed before the close of the present fiscal year.

From all directions come complaints about the tremendous rise in the price of almost everything, excepting the only article that more than half of our people have to sell—their labor. An expert says of the effect of the Dingley tariff upon the price of men's clothes: "A suit of clothes that could be bought last year for \$15.00 cannot be duplicated now under \$20 and that fact is an annoyance to dealers and customers alike. With men of ample means, who have their clothes made by fashionable tailors, \$5.00 or \$10.00 advance on a suit is hardly noticed, and if noticed makes no complaint. It is very different, however, with those who have to be careful in their expenditures, for to this class \$5.00 represents a considerable sum. The number of men who buy \$15.00 and \$20.00 suits is largely in excess of those who pay tailors \$40.00 and \$50.00 for a suit, and it is for the poor and the middle class that the kick against the Dingley tariff is sure to come."

CROP REPORT.

The following crop report was issued by the Secretary of State, last Monday:

The average condition of wheat on Nov. 1, was in the southern counties, 75; central, 88; northern, 103; and state 82, comparison being with vital-

ity and growth of average years. The condition in the southern counties, where 85 per cent of the crop is grown is 13 per cent lower than one year ago. The severe drouth prevailing at the date of the October report was not broken in the southern and central sections until Oct. 11. Light rains occurred on the 5th-8th, but not sufficient to be of benefit. The 11th and 12th storms occurred generally throughout the state the rainfall being sufficient to afford relief. Since this storm wheat has made fairly good progress. There was a second general rain on the 19th-22d, and a lighter one on the 31st. These rains have been of great immediate benefit, but heavy, soaking rains are needed to place the ground in usually wet condition at the opening of winter.

The estimates indicate that the area seeded to wheat this fall is 6 per cent greater than in 1896. The estimate excess in the southern countries is four per cent, in the central six per cent, and in the northern fifteen per cent.

Don't go to some other merchant and pay your cash when the merchant who trusted you ought to have the same.—*Ex.*
