The supreme court has just handed down a decision in effect that all secret societies which own property are taxable unless organized chiefly and solely for either benevolence, charity, education or promotion of science. The case was brought about by the Masonic Temple association refusing to pay taxes on the Masonic Temple at Bay City.

CAHUNCY DEPEW, is evidently does not agree with the republican press of the country. In a recent interview he said: "With an alarming falling off of the Republican vote in the state (New York), with heavy losses in New Jersey, Ohio and other states. The republican party is confronted with the incontrovertible truth that Bryanism and ometalism is not dead."

The program for the 47th annual meeting of the Michigan State teachers' association, to be held in Lansing Dec. 28-30, has just been completed. Gov. Pingree will welcome, State Superintendent Hammond will respond; Bishop John H. Vincent will lecture; President Hutchins of the State University will make an address; Supt. Whitney will tell of schools in Germany.

A cigarette is a roll of paper, tobacco and drugs with a small fire at one end and a big fool at the other. THOSE democrats who bolted the Chicago platform and supported the "gold bugs" are now making efforts to get back into line. Henry Watson of the Louisville Courier Journal admits the errors of his way, and announces that he will submit to the will of his party. In Michigan, judge Allen B. Morse, late minister to Glasgow, expresses a hope that the gold democracy will again unite with the regular party organization. Even Lew Rowley, of the Lansing journal, begins to see the error of his way. It is all right boys, if you are sincere, but don't try the game you worked, at the state convention at Detroit a year ago last spring.

THE October bulletin of the Dairy and Food Department, just issued, comes out plain and sits down hard on the Red Cross Vinegar Company of St. Louis, Mo., for trying to sell their vinegar to a dealer of this state which did not meet the requirements of the vinegar law. Letters are published wherein they request investigation of the dairy and food department and guarantee the goods to be pure apple vinegar. The food commissioner shows that from analysis it is only a spirit vinegar colored with burnt sugar. Dealers are warned by the commissioner not to be found with such vinegar in their possession and gives reasons why such concerns without the state cannot be prosecuted, and that it must necessarily throw the burden upon the dealers within the state.

JUSTICE LAIRD, of Saginaw, has a system of dealing with unruly boys. He lectures the boy upon his first offense and puts him on probation. Each Saturday the boy must bring a note from his teacher and one parent giving his conduct during the week. If satisfactory the boy is complimented and allowed to go another week. When reformation is considered complete the case against the boy is dropped. One little fellow thought the judge was fooling and did not show

up. An officer promptly brought him in. The next week the boy did not show up. Whereupon he was confined in jail for 48 hours on a diet of bread and water. Since then he has never failed to bring in his reports. He has six on his list and all report regularly and show improvement. He thinks this plan ahead of fines or reform school.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

NOVEMBER, 15th, 1897.

"Teddy" Roosevelt may soon be out of a job, if he doesn't learn to bridle his tongue when talking in public upon subjects on which the administration's position is officially unannounced. He was given a hint of this when he returned from New York, where he made an after dinner speech on the necessity of our having a fighting navy, if we wished to escape the ridicule of the world, and having declarations concerning the Monroe Doctrine treated as merely so much bluster. "Teddy" used Hawaii for a dummy in order to give the administration's alleged Cuba policy two or three heavy body blows, but the applications was too plain to be overlooked. He has been warned not to do so again.

The administration is playing horse with the Canadian Premier, who, with a party of officials is in Washington, ostensibly to attend the sealing conference, but in reality to sound this government on the probability of negotiating a reciprocity treaty. "The President has swapped" with the Premier and given him a dinner; Secretary Sherman has done the same, and he has been turned over to Mr. Kasson, chief cook of the Reciprocity kitchen, to confer on the subject. He'll get all the conferences he wants, but when England really authorizes her ambassador, or someone else, to try to negotiate a treaty of commercial reciprocity which shall embrace Canadian products, it will be found that so far as Canada's principal products are concerned, it will be an impossibility. The Canadian Premier doesn't seem to know that in a number of states, one of the main arguments used in the last National campaign for republican success, was that it would shut out Canadian competition.

The Spanish minister has begun his entertainment of public men on a scale which indicates that no matter how hard up Spain may be, it has no intention of reducing the amount of money spent in Washington in the attempt to make friends for Spain. The first blow-out of the Spanish minister was an elegant dinner, at the swell Metropolitan club, in honor of a Spanish editor. The administration and the U. S. Supreme court were well represented at this dinner, but either the wily Spaniard must have thought it needless to waste his expensive dinner on congress, or the congressmen asked must have sent regrets. Be that as it may, senator Elkins was the only member of the legislative branch of the government that attended the dinner.

The silk stocking element of the Maryland republicans, headed by senator Wellington, are straining every nerve in their efforts to make sure that the Maryland legislature does not elect representative Mudd to succeed senator Gorman. These men probably know what they are doing, but their activity against Mudd, who

is considered in Washington as the weakest of all the aspirants to senator Gorman's seat, reminds one of going after reed birds with gatling guns.

The Post Office department has officially decided that the interior department was right when it disbarred John Wedderburn and John Wedderburn & Co., from practice before the patent office, for gross frauds upon gullible clients, and has issued a fraud order against John Wedderburn & Co., and the National Recorder, a newspaper owned by them. This order shuts them out of the mails, and will cause all matter addressed to them to be returned to the writers, after being officially stamped "fraudulent". Newspapers which continue to print Wedderburn & Co's. advertisement after knowledge of this fraud order may also be shut out of the mails.

The general opinion among the most prominent democrats who have been in Washington since that republican fight upon the election of Boss Hanna, has appeared to grow to such large proportions, is that the democrats of Ohio should have nothing whatever to do with it. There is, of course, a bare possibility that enough republican members of the Ohio legislature would, if the democrats would help them, be willing to elect some other republican to the senate than Hanna, but the most powerful microscope made would not show the smallest particle of advantage to the Ohio democrats in defeating Hanna and electing another republican to the senate. As long as Ohio has got to have another republican senator Hanna is the best man, for the democrats, both in Ohio and elsewhere, that could be chosen. But even if it would be advantageous for the democrats to knock Hanna out and help to elect some other republican, it would not be advisable for the democrats in the Ohio legislature to become parties to a deal with the alleged anti-Hanna republican members of that body, for the simple reason that Hanna, with the aid of Mr. McKinley, will almost certainly be able, by the use of patronage and other methods, to get a sufficient number of republican votes to be elected. It is a fight between Hannaism and Forakerism, and no democrat should interfere.

Council Proceedings.

(OFFICIAL.)

An adjourned regular meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, was held at the council chamber, on Monday evening, Nov. 15, 1897, pursuant to an adjournment from Nov. 8. Meeting called to order by Mayor Murphy, Present, Mayor Murphy, Aldermen Dove, Murphy, Rollin, Waterbury, Attorney Jahraus and Clerk Patterson. Absent alderman Biglow and Phelps.

The committee on streets and sidewalks reported the work on Halletown road and Graham bridge practically completed.

The committee on ordinances reported an ordinance entitled: "An ordinance for the preservation of the purity of Tawas River, Dead Creek and tributaries thereto in the city of Tawas City and within one-half mile of the corporate limits thereof, and to prevent obstructions of said river and creek."

Moved by Alderman Waterbury and supported by Alderman Dove, that said ordinance be passed to its first reading, by title only. Carried, all voting yes.

The ordinance was then read by title only. The following bills were then read and referred to the committee on claims and accounts, and a recess of ten minutes taken to give committee time to examine bills and report.
