FROM THE PHILIPPINES.

Another Interesting Letter From Dan McRae, Who is now in Cebu.

Maga, Ile de Cebu, Oct. 2, 1899.

Dear Mother:—We were in Manila about two weeks and then left for Iloilo and Cebu. The second battalion stopped at Iloilo and we came on to Cebu, to relieve the Tennessee boys. The first battalion remained at Manila. We remained in the town of Cebu about a week and then went into the mountains to stir up the robbers. They have some very strong fortifications, but we routed them out of six in two days. The first day we found some stores and knives and stopped to destroy them. We found an old fort in which they had killed some two thousand Spanish soldiers, but they left us in possession of it. Only one bothered us and we threw some dirt on him and left for the mountains. In about two hours we were in a creek at the bottom of a high mountain, topped by a breast-work from behind which they fired upon us, but failed to reach us. Our advance guards were in a narrow path when they began rolling rock down on them, none were hurt although some had narrow escapes. Part of the company went back and climbed a steep hill from which they fired on the insurgents, driving away their scouts, and advanced along the ridge, while we advanced up the ravine. When about half way up, word was sent back that they had captured one outpost but no prisoners. The insurgents had two cannon, but we could find neither of them. They either buried them or threw them into a deep ravine. They carried off their dead and wounded. We burned their shacks and tore up their works and then left.

I went on guard that night, but all was still. The valley was lit up by burning shacks. One of our sentinels fired on a burning shack, taking it for a person with a light. The next morning we left the ruined outpost and marched over the mountains to attack the main post. On the way we killed one of the enemy's officers who was scouting to near. All the bamboo shacks were burned as we went along. Part of the time we were up in the clouds. We had the worst hill climbing we ever saw, and some of us were at Santiago a year ago. We had about 75 men with us from each company, the one remaining in town when we were here this week and one Co. of the 24th marched around by a road until they reached the base of a high ridge. They then marched around this and an outfit they were opposite the breastworks of the bandits, shot them off killing one man and wounding five or six more. The artillery helped them somewhat, but much as the distance was, they were not able to do much. They were striking near the breastworks. We captured a cannon with this post.

We went to sleep and got ready for the next morning's march. We went along the top of the mountains now and when the bandits saw us they deserted, leaving their dead behind them. Thus 225 men turned the whole face of affairs, and we camped in the works this night. There were two fortifications one on a lower hill, and one up on the top. There were also two smaller works that were taken, where we stopped only to set them on fire. We waited all the next day for orders, when we got them to go to town and leave for Maga. I went down into the valley, but could not see much as it had been over run by Co. K, and the Tennesseans, but we got some chickens which we roasted and ate. They would not allow us to forage or we might have had lots of meat and some fruit.

The next morning started back and arrived about 11 o'clock a. m. We had been out four and a half days and captured and destroyed six breast-works drove the bandits out of the

sand men could not take those works.

We rested that night and left for Maga the next afternoon in a sail boat towed by a steam launch. We arrived here that night and slept in an empty building. The next day we took the Tennessee boys place and settled down to business. Maga is a small place owned by a rich family who own the whole country side. The people love the American soldiers and would do anything for us. It is a nice quiet place, but I don't like it, and would rather be at home. We are divided into three divisions, I am with the captain at Maga. The others are out along the coast about seven miles each way. We may be out in the hills again after bandits. I was out to Lieut. Lawton's division a few days ago. Alfred Borlan is out with one of the lieutenants. He is well and was out in the hills with us.

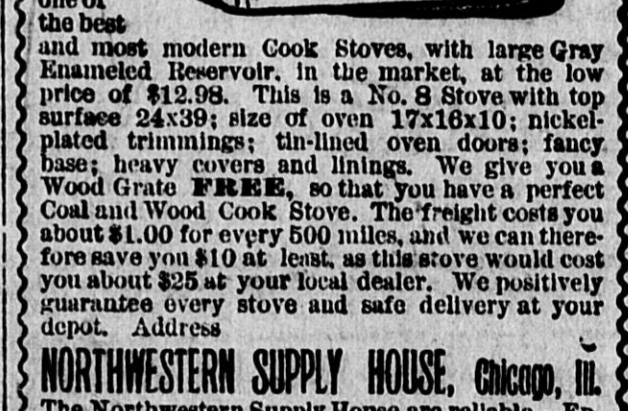

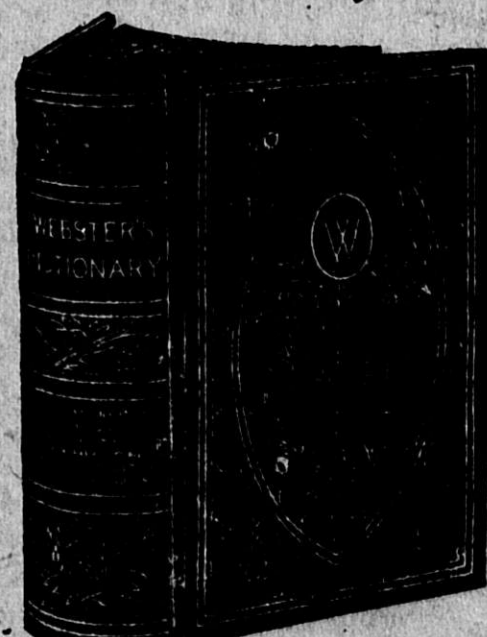

AGRICULTURAL.

Notes for our Farmer-Friends
Gathered from Many Sources

PICK-UPS.

Better work a little hard the nice days in the fall than to have some jobs go over till freezing, snowy weather comes on.

Before blaming the seed for deficient crops, study the situation carefully to see if some mistake was not made elsewhere.

Whenever you undertake any particular line of farming, remember that you must be up to date, wide awake and catch onto the best ideas advanced by the most successful and practical men.

The stock kept on the farm should be as uniform in quality as possible. It will be easier to care for and prepare for market than when close attention is required to keep it up to its best attainment.

Practice more intense farming, raise the standard of the stock higher, take more pleasure in the way of recreation, enjoy what you have, and when you compare your situation with those in other vocations you won't be sorry you're a farmer.

If land owners know just how much money and hard work it takes to build up a run down farm then there would be much less "skin farming" through the country. You must increase your capital, and that means the fertility of your soil, if you would prosper.

Farmers do not always feed the best and cheapest feed, but as a rule it is that which comes handy. Quite frequently it would pay in money as well as a better condition of stock, to sell or exchange something we have for that which is cheaper and better. The feeding problem is to be solved on every farm in the near future.

While the busy season is on the farmer hasn't as much time as he would like to devote to the social side of farm life, but there is no excuse now for the next few months for his closing up like a clam and not trying to meet with his fellows to labor for their mutual benefit. You should belong to some sort of a farmers' organization and do your part by it.—*Guide.*

The boys and girls on the farm do not receive as much encouragement as they ought in their way of taking up scientific work and writing for the press. Theoretical editors are not in the demand as they were a few years since. It is the practical writer that meets present demands. Farmers find they have little time to take up some man's pet theory and work it out to see if there is anything in it.—*Guide.*

The future of the beet sugar industry hinges upon several contingencies, which may be summarized as follows: Development of the sugar industry in our new territories; maintenance of state bounty; continuation of tariff duty on foreign sugars. We therefore think it wise and safest for farmers to grow all the beets required, but to allow capitalists to furnish the funds to build and run the factories.—*Farm News.*

Some farmers are too small for the work before them. They do their work in a small way and are wholly incompetent to reach out and cover the land that is in their possession. Some of us are ten-acre men on hundred-acre farms and we will never be as prosperous as we ought to be until there is a better adjustment of things and we settle down to farming, each according to his capacity.—*Farm News.*
