Will Protect Germany's Interests.

In view of the discussions anent the attitude of Germany toward the United States because of the invasion of her markets by the products of this country the utterances of imperial Chancellor Count you Bulow in the early hours of the present session of the reichstag are significant. He said that he wished that there should be no mistake regarding the government's attitude toward the commercial treaties. The government considered the renewal of the treaties of long duration to be most desirable, but Germany purposed ar-



ranging them on a basis satisfactory to herself. The interests of other nations would be met in a spirit of reciprocity and fair dealing, but Germany was ina position to give effect to her wishes with the same emphasis as other countries. She need show no more diffidence than they. As for the utterances of the foreign press the government would not be driven a hair's breadth from the path marked out nor suffer, dictation touching German rights and interesta.



### RESISTANCE TO FROST.

Study In Strawberries-Nine Strong Varieties.

Throughout a large proportion of the strawberry growing localities light frosts often occur in the late spring, killing a variable percentage of the flowers and recently set fruit of the strawberry. The injury from such frosts appears first in the blackening of the pistils, which occurs within a few hours after the frost. Fruit upon which the pistils have been injured by frost either fails to develop or produces a small berry of irregular form.

On the grounds of the Montana str tion it was observed that a consider able variation prevailed in the resistant power of different strawberries to

In general it was found that injury to such fruits was confined to the achenes or seeds of the strawberry. The pulpy mass or receptacle was in no case injured, and the surface of the pulp did not become blackened or show any other changes which would indicate injury from the frost. The seeds in varieties which suffered injury were killed by the frost and rapidly showed discoloration and a decomposition of their tissues.

Upon studying thin sections of injured and uninjured strawberries of different varieties at the same immature stages of development it was found that in those varieties which did not suffer from frost the seeds were more deeply imbedded in the substance of the pulp than was the case in those varieties which were injured. #### CURING BACON.

Careful Trimming, Scalding and Packing In Straw or Hay.

The hog having been properly fatten first fruits ripened were upon the three ed and killed and the offal removed, let the carcass hang until the flesh is firm In comparing plants grown in pots enough to cut well. Cut up as usual. as possible. There is no waste in this, as all the trimmings go to the lard or sausage tubs. As far as possible try to have the surface of lean meat. Rub well and pack down. Use an ounce of saltpeter and three to four pounds of sugar to fifty pounds of salt. Arrange for drainage and cover well with salt.

When well salted, which will be to size of hog, have a kettle of boiling water and immerse each piece in this or about one and a half minutes. This will make a hard crust on the flesh side and will also harden the skin, making it almost impervious to insects, and the scalding will destroy all insects and fermentation germs that may be on the surface. This I consider the second point in importance.

Oak of any sort is excellent, ecause it is rich in pyroligneous acid, which gives to smoke its value as a reservative and also contributes its haracteristic flavor to the meat. When sufficiently smoked, scald again, rub with black pepper and pack in boxes with straw or clean, sweet hay, and The Lorillard was the variety used in the meat will keep indefinitely. Hams and shoulders should be salted separately or, as is usually done, placed

on the top of the pile, In the southern part of the state I would stick a kuife straight into the joints of the hams and shoulders, letting out the sinuous fluid and filling the hole and joint with salt. I have cured as nice breakfast bacon as any person could wish in the city of Galreston and in midsummer by packing n salt for three days and scalding and smoking in a sugar hogshead. A Cheap Smokehouse.

Any one having a small amount of meat to smoke and not caring to depend on the neighbors' smokehouses can build one himself without use of hammer or nails, says a correspondent of New England Homestead. Simply take an old hogshead and saw a hole near the bottom for a stovepipe to enter. Get an old cast iron teakettle and cut a hole near the bottom for draft. Now procure at least five lengths of stovepipe; better, ten; less than five will burn the meat. Set your hogshead at least two feet above the level of the kettle. Fill the latter with kindlings, including some hickory wood and cobs, and place the elbow of the pipe over the top of the kettle. Start a fire and hang your hams in the hogshead. The damper should be used when fuel is put in. This will do the work. I have used it for years and find it practical.

Storing Cabbages. To have cabbage good and fresh in the winter it is best to put it in the ground, says a New Jersey grower in American Agriculturist. I open a double furrow with the plow and put the cabbage in a single row with the heads down and the outside leaves drawn in under the head. I then plow two furrows to them. The first furrow covers the cabbage, and the other I draw up over roots, smoothing along on top with a shovel so that it will shed the water. If I want to use the cabbage through the winter, then trash is thrown over it to keep the ground from freezing to it. I have been successful in keeping cabbage this way and have it to sell to my neighbors in the spring when theirs rotted by leaving the roots uncovered.


