TAWAS SUGAR FACTORY.




Photo by Emery, of East Tawas

Bay county has lost her fight to prevent the detaching of Gibson township from that county and its annexation to Arenac county, the bill having passed the legislature and only awaiting the governor's signature.

Death of Mrs. K. Monroe.

The news of the death of Joanna, wife of Kenneth Monroe, at her home in Laurel, Miss., came as a shock to her many friends in this city. While her expected illness was known to her intimate friends here, the news received last Friday of her serious condition was a surprise. Her brother, John McRae and wife, of Rose City, left Friday evening, but her death occurred Saturday night at 12 o'clock, and before their arrival there. Her remains and those of the little son arrived here Wednesday afternoon at 3.10 and the funeral was held from the Presbyterian church immediately after the arrival of the train, Rev. E. O. Sutherland officiating. A large concourse of sorrowing friends met the casket at the train and accompanied the remains to their last resting place in the Tawas City cemetery.

The deceased was born in Ontario, September 15, 1863, and came to this city with her parents when about three years of age, where she remained until her removal to Laurel about three years ago. She was united in marriage to Mr. Monroe eighteen years ago last New Year. Besides the sorrowing husband, she leaves a daughter, Gertrude, and only brother, John McRae, of Rose City, beside a large circle of relatives and friends. The deceased was most highly respected and beloved by all who knew her, as was attested by the large attendance and beautiful floral offerings, notwithstanding that the hour of the funeral was not known here until nearly noon Wednesday. The bereaved relatives have the heartfelt sympathy of all in their affliction.



The Cow ?

There has been a good deal of talk during the past few weeks relative to cows running at large in our city. Some people agree that it is a hardship on the part of poor people who have a cow, to compel them to hire pasturage. We doubt this assertion for this reason: A cow running at large is driven by people and chased by dogs until there can be no doubt that both the quantity and quality of milk is decreased, and it is a safe guess that the loss so sustained is greater than the cost of hiring pasture. Besides this there is another class of poor people who are equally as much entitled to consideration, and those are the ones who have no cows, but are endeavoring to improve their condition by raising a little garden. It is a most common occurrence to wake up in the morning and find a good garden ruined by someone's cow.

Another thing, the damage done every year, by cattle to the sidewalkers, shade trees and other property would more than pay the expense of pasturing every cow owned in the city. The disgraceful decorations of our sidewalks is enough to appeal to all people to prohibit the running at large of cattle, even if it was not in direct violation of the state law.

A petition signed by a large number of taxpayers has been prepared and should have been presented to the council at its last meeting, but for some reason was not. It will no doubt be presented next Tuesday evening, and the council will fall short of its duty if the matter is not acted upon, and the prayer of the petitioners granted.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

The following crop bulletin has been issued for the week ending Monday, May 25, 1903.

The mean daily temperature for the week ended May 25 was 63.3 degrees, or 7.9 degrees above the normal; the average total precipitation was 0.86 of an inch, or 0.03 of an inch above the normal; the sunshine averaged 56 per cent of the possible amount.

The week has been warm with generous showers in most localities, except the extreme southwestern counties, where the rainfall was insufficient for present needs. Generally, wheat, rye, oats, barley, meadows and pastures have been improved; wheat is still somewhat backward, but has taken on a much better color and made fair growth. The warm showers have been very beneficial to the germination of corn and late oats, and have improved the soil for plowing.

Corn planting has made good progress in all counties of the Lower Peninsula, and the early seeding is germinating finely. Sugar beet seeding is well advanced and has germinated finely; the early seeding is sufficiently advanced; early potatoes are growing nicely, and in the extreme southern counties are receiving their first cultivation. Plowing for buckwheat and beans is in progress in the southern and central counties. Pasturage is good in most counties, but meadows are backward and need more rain to mature a full crop.

Apples, late peaches, pears and late strawberries are blossoming heavily; early peaches, early strawberries, cherries and plums will have short yields on account of frost damage.

In the Upper Peninsula the season is advancing nicely; spring wheat, oats, peas and meadows are making good growth. Fruit is coming into blossom and looks very promising.

Breakfast Food Out West.

A kindly Massachusetts man was timidly wending his way through the west and chanced in a restaurant in one of the frontier towns. The waiter was armed with a sorrowful towel tied about his waist, a dented tin tray and a couple of "guns." The easterner looked him over in a gentle way and asked him if he had any breakfast food.

"I guess yes," responded the cowboy waiter. "We got ham and eggs, fried sausage, chuck steak, spare ribs, mutton chops, corned beef hash, hog and hominy, light bread, heavy bread, toast bread, apple butter, peach butter, cow butter, coffee, tea, buttermilk and beer. Breakfast food? Well, that's our winner. Name your grub."—Exchange.

Limestone From Alpena.

Arrangements have been made by President James D. Hawks of the Detroit & Mackinac railroad and the Michigan Alkali Co., by which the road secures a large amount of new business, and a corresponding amount of traffic formerly done by the alkali company in Ohio is transferred to Michigan.

The alkali company has been obtaining its supply of limestone from Marblehead, near Sandusky, O. A five-year contract is now being signed, however, by which the supply will be obtained from the Alpena quarries; the stone being carried by the Detroit & Mackinac from Alpena to Wyandotte in 50-ton steel gondola cars provided by the alkali company. The stone is used for soda ash, and is also sold to beet sugar companies. Crushed stone will be sold to Bay City, Saginaw and other towns for paving purposes.

An analysis of eight samples shows the following average proportions: Silica and gangue, .39; iron oxide and alumina, .29; calcium carbonate, 97.96; magnesium, 1.31.

Another analysis, made by the chemist of the Detroit Sugar Co., shows even more strikingly the abundance of desirable qualities in this limestone, and the almost entire absence of undesirable properties, as follows: Moisture, .06; sand, clay, insoluble matter, .78; organic matter, .04; soluble silica, none; oxide of iron and alumina, .47; calcium carbonate, .38. The report says: "Analysis of sample, shows a higher purity than any stone heretofore examined at this laboratory."

By the arrangement made between the alkali company and the Detroit & Mackinac the quarrying and hauling of stone for the big plant at Wyandotte becomes an exclusive Michigan industry. It will require 30,000 tons of Alpena limestone to supply the beet sugar factories, aside from other use.

President Hawks is also closing up a deal with the Hecla Portland Cement Co. which will give his road the hauling of over 1,500 tons of marl a day from the company's beds at Prescott, Mich.—Detroit Journal.

Eyes Are On Denver.

The eyes of every Christian Endeavorer in Michigan are turned on Denver this summer and more than 200 Michigan delegates will attend the international convention of that body to be held there July 9-13. Arrangements for transportation have been made with the Wabash, the Chicago & Northwestern and the Union Pacific railways by Dr. George H. Lau of Detroit, transportation manager for Michigan. A special train will leave Detroit via the Wabash the morning of July 7, arriving in Chicago the same evening, and connecting with a Northwestern special which will arrive in Denver the following day. A special round-trip rate of \$25 from Chicago has been secured, with proportionate rates from points in Michigan. The return limit is August 31. Many western Michigan delegates will go direct to Chicago and will join the party there. Every large city in the state will send several delegates, and many of the smaller societies individual members, while in frequent cases villages or country districts comprising several societies have combined and will send a single delegate. The program for the convention is announced as being the best for any similar convention in years.

Our Inland Seas.

The largest annual steamer tonnage of any port in the world enters Chicago River, according to J. W. Strong, writing in The World To-Day. This ill-smelling inlet of a lake, one thousand miles from salt water, surpasses Hamburg or Liverpool.

There are more boats on the great lakes than on any other waterway. The average lake boat is larger than any ocean steamer except the regular liners.

A single steamer, the Isaac L. Ellwood, has carried on the lakes a record cargo of 8,557 net tons. The Ellwood, like all the modern lake craft, is very long and low, with engines far abaft and cargo holds mid-ship.

Steel ships have more completely supplanted wood, steam has more thoroughly conquered all sail power on the lakes than in all the salt seas.

A year's traffic at fifty-nine lake ports is fifty-five million tons of merchandise.

The third largest fleet in the world is that of the Pittsburg Steamship Company of 113 vessels. Only the German Lloyd and Hamburg-American surpass it.

Of iron ore the lake boats carry twenty-eight million tons a year; the railroads carry all the way less than half a million tons.

The eastern point reached by these vast inland fleets is now Buffalo. The improvement of the Erie Canal will give an all-the-way-by-water outlet to the finest trade route in the world.
