The democratic state nominating convention will be held at Grand Rapids, August 3.

The republican county convention to nominate county officers will occur one week from next Wednesday, July 27.

The July crop report says the indications are that the wheat crop in Michigan will be a poor yield, but a good quality.

Hon. L. T. Durand, of Saginaw, has written a letter withdrawing as a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor.

Mayor Sweet, of Grand Rapids, and Hon. Geo. D. Jackson, of Bay City, are at present the two most prominent candidates for the democratic nomination for governor.

M. V. O'Brien, the well known lumberman, of Bay City, is being mentioned in connection with the democratic nomination for congress from the tenth district.

Judge Parker's effort to inject the money issue into the present campaign will cost him thousands of votes throughout the country which he would have received had he withheld his now famous telegram.

The democratic National convention closed its labors at St. Louis early last Sunday morning, after one of the most remarkable conventions in the history of the country. Judge Alton Brooks Parker, of New York, was made the nominee for the presidency and ex-Senator George H. Davis, of West Virginia, for the vice-presidency. The platform adopted is a strong one, and deals with all live issues of the day in a most explicit and able manner.

The efforts of the Detroit Free Press to belittle William J. Bryan are at least amusing. The time was when the Free Press had influence and standing in the democratic party, but its course during the past eight years has placed it where it cuts but little ice, and its present policy in attacking the man who today stands higher with the masses of the democrats of the country and who wielded more personal influence than any other man at the St. Louis convention, are most sickening.

Twining Defeated.

A most exciting game of base ball was played here last Tuesday afternoon between the Twining team and the Tawas City boys. Butzloff and Wuggazer were the local battery, while Darley brothers appeared for the visitors. The locals scored five in the first three innings while the visitors were blanked. In the fourth round the Twining boys got five and the locals nothing. The fifth gave the visitors six and the locals one. In the next four innings Twining increased its number to 14, while to the last half of the ninth inning our boys could only bring their score to 8, but at this point they began a bombardment on pitcher Darley, and with the aid of a couple errors by the visitors succeeded in running in 7 tallies thus winning the game by a score of 15 to 14.

THREE KILLED.

Pfeifer & Burch's Mill, Near Petoskey, Wrecked, Killing Wm. Frank of this Place.

Early last Thursday morning the boiler in Pfeifer & Burch's mill near Petoskey, blew up, killing Will Frank son of Alfred Frank, of Lawas township, and William Ward and Thomas Dickerson, two other employees. John Fortune, of Whittemore, had a leg broken and was badly scalded, but will recover.

The accident is of local interest from the fact that the firm were formerly located in this county and well known here, as was also many of their employees. The following account of the accident is taken from the Petoskey Independent:

The most serious disaster that has occurred in this section of Michigan this year is that of Thursday morning at Wabemee, four miles below here on the G. R. & I., in which three men lost their lives and another was badly injured in a boiler explosion at Pfeifer & Burch's mill.

The explosion occurred at 5:45 o'clock, just before the time for starting the mill, the others having not yet arrived. Just what caused the explosion cannot be learned, but something suddenly let loose and sent two men to eternity instantly, one died in a short time after, and still another is not sure of recovery, so badly is he injured.

The boiler, engine and mill is terribly wrecked. Pieces of the boiler weighing hundreds of pounds were hurled into the air and now lie some three hundred feet from their original location, cutting off heavy timbers, twelve inches in diameter, in their path. Brick and other debris may be found in any direction at least one-fourth of a mile from the scene, and the Resorter reporter picked up a wrench that had been hurled over 1,000 feet. One of the smaller pieces of iron was sent flying through the corner of the house in which the engineer, who was killed, lived with his family, some thirty rods or more away.

The only two men in the mill at the time of the accident, who were not injured, were the foreman, O. A. Judd, and a settler, Gus Davison. The former was standing on the top line shaft and the large steam dome passed close to him as it went up out of the mill. He was hurled a distance of twenty feet and received a few bruises, but nothing serious. Davison was also thrown the full length of the mill, but escaped injury.

The cause of the accident cannot be located. The mill was erected only two years ago and at that time the boiler was purchased second hand in Saginaw. It had not been officially inspected, but was considered perfectly safe. It was equipped with automatic low water gauges and other modern safety advantages and only a few minutes before the explosion the steam was heard to blow off by scores of people in the vicinity, so that no one can be blamed for carelessness.

Coroner Nihart and Sheriff Smith were on the ground early and empanelled a jury who investigated the matter fully rendering a verdict which fully exonerates the employees from all blame and responsibility, having found the facts to be as above stated.

Mr. Dickerson was the only one of all the men killed or injured who carried insurance, and his policy was for only \$100, on the accidental plan. The bodies of the victims have been taken in charge by Undertakers Henika & Co., but it is not likely that any of the funerals will be held until after communicating with the several families.

The loss to Messrs. Pfeifer & Burch will be large, as the mill, valued at \$10,000 is a total wreck, the machinery being worth only the price of a scrap heap, and there was no insurance. The question of what will be done with the property will not be disposed of until the arrival of Mr. Pfeifer, who is now away on business. However, it is thought that the vast amount of timber the firm controls in the vicinity will cause them to rebuild at an early date.

WHITTEMORE, July 12.

MR. EDITOR—An article published in last week's Gazette regarding the Whittemore Fourth of July base ball game, if not corrected will leave the impression that the Whittemore players are not gentlemen. In former years our boys have been complimented on their gentlemanly usage of visiting teams. The A. S. Leaders began in the very first inning to adopt tactics contrary to the spirit of the national game. Almost in a body they stood along the third base line instead of occupying the players bench which our boys did during the game, when not in the field. Catcher Nordstrom was injured by covering the home plate and blocking the runner, who was sliding in, an accident which frequently occurs even among professionals. The simple facts in the case are: The Leaders were defeated fairly with an inning to spare; their two pitchers being batted out of the box, our boys making two two-base hits, four three baggers and one home run. When they objected to the umpire they were given the privilege of substituting one of their own choice.

Gen. Toral, who commanded the Spanish garrison at Santiago when that place surrendered to the United States forces, died Sunday at Madrid, Spain, in an asylum for the insane. The general became insane brooding over his captivation.
An exchange fitly describes the meaning of the term "local enterprise." If you can think of anything that can be done to beautify or build up your town, go and do it. Keep your capital at home; patronize home industries; help your merchants to sell more so they can sell cheaper; always get your work done in your own town if possible; subscribe and pay for your home paper, don't steal or borrow the reading of it. If you follow these suggestions add your town does not improve and build up, it will not be your fault. Try it.

Main's circus exhibited to a big crowd Tuesday. This is not the largest show in the world, but is certainly one of the cleanest, and presents many features that are unexcelled. Owing to their late arrival from Alpena and the trouble experienced in getting through the sand to the show grounds, it was necessary for them to cut out their street parade.
The grading of the grounds of the Western State Normal at Kalamazoo is well under way and the first building will be ready for occupancy January 15th. During the summer term the sessions of the school are being held in the commodious high school building. In the fall the Normal will be housed in the lower College building. The training school will have splendidly equipped rooms in the new sixteen room grade building now under construction.
A series of articles on "Home Gymnastics," by Alberta J. Cory, Physical Director or the Harlem Young Women's Christian Association, is to be inaugurated in the August number of the New Idea Woman's Magazine. The designs and plans for "A Village Chapel," by Frederick B. Freeman, will interest the people in small communities where funds for public buildings are limited. Timely articles and good fiction make the literary part of the book unusually interesting.

Annual School Meeting.
The annual school meeting of Dist. No. 7, was held at the high school building last Monday evening and was very slimly attended, only 17 voters being present. The report of the treasurer showed a balance of \$2,764.40 on hand, and it was voted to raise \$1600 by taxation. The following estimates were made for expenses for the ensuing year:
Teachers' salaries.....\$3000
Heating plant..... 1500
Fuel and janitor..... 600
Incidentals and directors salary..... 300
James Hamilton was re-elected a member of the board for a term of two years.
It was also voted to adopt the County Normal system, under which the state allows the sum of \$500 per year for each teacher. But ten schools in the state are allowed each year to adopt this system, and an application will at once be made to the superintendent of public instruction.

B. Y. P. U. Against the Divorce Evil.
Detroit, July 11.—Good speakers, fine singing, and a manifest interest exceeding that exhibited at any previous gathering of the convention marked the closing session of the fourteenth annual B. Y. P. U. gathering held Sunday night in the Detroit Light Guard armory, and attended by fully 3,500 people. Three things proved to be points of pivotal interest. The report of the committee on resolutions, an address by Walter Calley, general secretary of the organization, in which the future of the society was prophesied, and a well conducted consecration service, wherein the true meaning and essence of the term was given unusually clear definition.
The report of the committee on resolutions followed the opening exercises of the evening. It was made by the chairman, Rev. J. E. Nottlinger, and in accepting the report, the convention went on record regarding the divorce question, a matter of peculiar importance, as indicating the sentiment of a portion at least of the raising generation.
The resolutions are as follows:
Resolved, That being deeply humiliated by the general thoughtlessness with which the married relation is entered upon and the disregard of the biblical teaching concerning divorce and remarriage, we urge our young people to thoroughly and prayerfully consider God's teachings concerning this, the purpose of the home and the giving of a larger place to home life and the making of the home a power for Christ.
That we most heartily join with other Christian bodies in asking for uniform laws governing marriage and divorce.

Land Commissioner Broke all Records.
Lansing, July 8.—Land Commissioner Wilder has completed his report for the fiscal year, which ended July 1. This report shows that at the close of the year the state held a total of 680,508.85 acres of land of all classes for sale and homestead entry.
The whole number of acres of land held by the state at the beginning of the year was 643,360.79; acres of part paid lands forfeited to the state during the year, 365.07; acres of swamp homestead land forfeited to the state, 1,440; acres of tax homestead land decided to the state by the auditor-general under the act of 1893, 92,715.50; acres of swamp land patented to the state by the general government, 30.95; total, 872,538.72.
The total number of acres of all classes of land except tax homestead, sold during the year was 28,741.12; acres of swamp land licensed, 360; acres entered as homesteads, under act of 1893, 12,098.18; acres of tax homestead lands sold, 150,750.57; acres restored to the state as tax lands from tax homestead lands by reason of certificates of error issued by auditor-general against deeds by which such lands were conveyed to the state and homestead entry, 680,508.85; total, 872,538.72.
The lands held by the state, July 1, 1904, are classified as follows: Primary school land, 44,671.33; agricultural college land, 52,254.12; salt spring land, 240; asylum land, 958.98; swamp land, 28,759.54; tax homestead land, 553,508.85; total, 680,508.85.
The following number of acres of all classes of land disposed of during the year, 198,002.69 for \$296,018.77.
Acting under authority conferred upon the commissioner by the legislature of 1897, the agents of the land department collected, in addition to the amount above named, \$1,670.38 from trespassers upon state tax lands. This sum was transferred to the auditor-general, who has applied it in liquidation of taxes upon such lands, issuing receipts therefor in the name of the commissioner.

We have inspected the steel furniture in the vaults and find it in accordance with the plans and specifications and recommend the acceptance of the same.

We submit the following recommendations as being necessary repairs to be made on court house and grounds:

1. The purchase of a car load of coal for the heating plant.

2. The painting of the wood work of the outside of the jail, also the painting of the well house, &c.

3. The putting of two ventilators in the ceiling of the court room.

4. The purchasing of an office chair for the clerk's, treasurer's, and prosecuting attorney's offices, and one dozen chairs for the several county offices, also a small table for the prosecuting attorney's office.

5. The building of a four foot cement walk from the front of the court house to the closets in the rear.

6. The repairing or rebuilding of the wall under the court house, and the repairing of the basement, making it suitable for a supervisors' room and committee rooms.

We find that the building is settling very badly, and that the repairing or rebuilding of the wall is an absolute necessity. When this work is being done we believe that the additional work of making the basement suitable for the use of this board will be but a comparatively small expense. We recommend that bids be asked for to include specifications and that the committee be authorized to accept the best offer submitted.
