A bill has been introduced in the legislature making it lawful to accept security companies on liquor bonds.

It begins to look as if there was need of an arbitration treaty between President Roosevelt and the U. S. Senate.

Gov. Warner has vetoed the bill repealing the consolidation of the Bay Cities and thus their hopes for divorce are shattered.

A bill is to be introduced in the legislature to extend the terms of the governor and other state officials, including the members of the legislature.

An acute observer says that trying to do business without advertising is like winking at a pretty girl through a pair of green goggles. You may know what you are doing, but nobody else does.

The Grand Duke Sergius, of Russia, was assassinated in the streets of Moscow last Saturday. As he was driving in his carriage a bomb was thrown, the explosion of which literally blew him to pieces.

The state association of supervisors has recommended among other things the payment of county officers by salaries rather than the present method of fees and salaries combined. It is to be hoped that the legislature will pass such a law. It will insure the county officers getting adequate pay and will protect the counties from graft.

The United States is still placed far below Russia as a naval power, and is yet far ahead of Japan. Still Japan has sunk half Russia's navy, and the rest of it dare not go east. There is no doubt that the United States navy is at least third power today, and in a few years will be second only to Great Britain's, and then the Monroe doctrine will be absolutely secure.

The city of Colby, Kas., had 1,000 meal tickets printed and distributed among the housewives of the place. The tickets are good for one meal when countersigned by the city marshal. When a hobo appears at the back door and asks for a handout he is given one of these tickets, which the marshal will redeem for two hours' work on the streets. Unless the tramp follows this procedure he goes hungry in Colby.

The state tax commissioners have reduced the assessments of Michigan railroads \$11,625,000.00. President Kummerly of the State Supervisors Association should ask for their removal as a retaliation for the action which the commissioners have started against him for refusing to increase the assessment of his township in accordance with their instructions. There is no doubt but what every assessing district in the state is assessed at nearer its true cash value than are the railroads.

The man who kindles the fire with the catalogues from the department stores, and gives all his trade to his home merchants, is the man who helps to put a better value on your property. The more a town grows and the more business it does, the greater the increase in the value of property—both city and farm. The man who patronizes the city department stores in preference to his home merchants, thinking he may thereby save a few pennies, is simply detracting from the wealth of his own community.—Lexington News.

Don't throw potato parings into the garbage box, but into the stove, and thereby save yourself from the annoyance of having to call the fire department to put out a chimney fire. The damp weather breeds favorable condition for chimney fires. The burning of potato parings prevents the gathering of soot. A man who is keeping up a strong soft coal fire in his kitchen

range every day during the winter says you can never find a trace of soot on the lids, the bottom of the kettles, or any part of the stove, as potato parings are burned daily.—Ex.

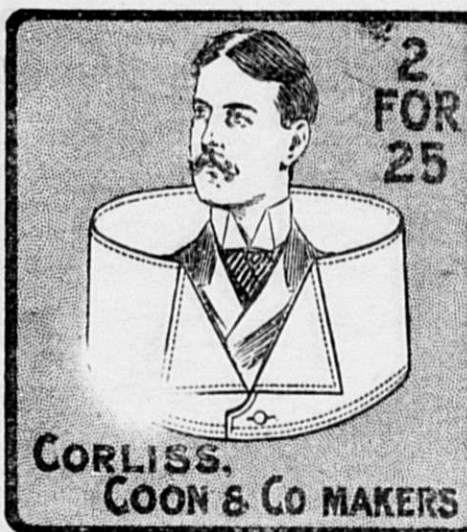
