

The Michigan National Guards will go into camp at Ludington, August 8, for ten days.

Flint has had the whole Michigan legislature on exhibition at their jubilee this week. This should have been a strong drawing card if it had been well advertised and a guaranteed that they were all properly caged.

After reposing in a cemetery vault in New York city for many years, the remains of Stevens Thompson Mason, first governor of the state of Michigan were Sunday interred with appropriate ceremonies in a stone lined grave in Capitol Square park in Detroit, where stood the state capitol when Governor Mason was executive of Michigan.

Jail is yawning for public officials of Indiana if they do not return their railroad passes before July 1. Governor Hanly has started the crusade and says he is determined to have pass holders after the date specified prosecuted by the new railroad commission, which takes office next month. All state, county and township officers are affected by the governor's order.

Advices from the east are to the effect that Japan is now planning a formal invasion of Siberia. An expedition is being fitted out to go to the island of Saghalin and to take possession of that place. It would be easily taken. Saghalin is a Russian convict camp. The army in Manchuria is to hold the line there while other armies are to be sent to Vladivostok and other ports.

There has been a revival of the proposition to call into existence the half-cent or five-mill copper piece. Five or six years ago bill for that purpose in view was introduced into congress but it seems to have died out of inanition. The call for the half cent comes strongest from the large cities in which there were great department stores though it is quite likely that in all other cities the advent of the new money piece would be welcomed. Competition in trade in the great shopping centers is now so keen that a difference of a half cent in price often determines the mind of a would-be purchaser.

The county exhibits at the state fair this fall will be a big feature, especially from this section of the state. The counties of Ogemaw, Rosecommon, Crawford and Cheboygan have all made appropriations for the purpose of making exhibits, and each of these counties come into competition with Iosco. The appropriation in nearly every case is larger than the committee from this county have to work with. Do the people of Iosco realize that this means that we must hustle if we succeed in holding first place which we secured last year? It behooves every person interested to do some-

thing for this exhibit, and to lend all possible aid to the committee in securing the best to be had. If the proper interest is taken in the matter there is no doubt of our ability to win the coveted prize. The benefit of these exhibits are becoming more fully realized each year, and they are showing to the people of the country the possibilities of northern Michigan.
