Own Party.

A better democratic campaign document than is contained in the revised statement of the platform of Dr. Bradley, republican candidate for governor, has not been issued in years. Dr. Bradley calls impressive attention to the record of extrayagance in the administration of Michigan's government. Since the admission of the state 73 years ago the total amount of taxes raised from general property, exclusive of railroads and other corporations, is \$78,357,000. Of this amount, \$25,000,000, or practically one-third of all the taxes borne by the people of Michigan, have been levied in the last eight years. In other words, the expenses of state government since 1900 have been half as much as they were during the entire period from 1835 to The largest mass of ice in the 1900. Certainly here is something abuse and misuse of the taxing and spending powers yested in the state government of a most flagrant char

Dr. Bradley is seeking to defeat

Governor Warner for renomination, but his arraignment is not of the governor. He arraigns his partythe party to which he looks for approval of his candidacy. The record of extravagance and debauchery of public funds he holds up to view is that of republican legislatures for the last eight years. But whether the reckless increase of expenditures and of taxes is all to be charged to this period is of small consequence. Since the civil war the democrats have had but two governors, both for one term each. The squandering of public moneys in the manner pointed out by Dr. Bradley has run through 38 years of a practically unbroken republican administration. Republican legislatures have easily controlled a long line of weak governors and have run riot with the public exchecquer. Even Governor Warner, that automatically purified and self-discovered reformer, has been unable to stem the spendthrifts. Does Dr. Bradley imagine he would be able to curb the politicians at Lansing any better than have his republican associates? Of course he does not. He is merely using the vices and abuses of his own party as a stepping stone into an office he thinks he couldn't capture by any other method. It is idle nonsense to suppose that if he were nominated and elected, and with him a republican legislature, that things would change one whit at Lansing. How even a candidate for office can consistently ask the intelligent people of Michigan to support a party and its nominees with a record such as he has held up to view is something that only a professional politician can comprehend. 


