Under the law passed by the last | Harvey A Brown, Jno L Frazer. legislature the date of holding all county conventions will be on the same day throughout the state, and cannot be held before the first Tuesday in September. The dates will be set by the state central committees of the various parties, and the place of holding such conventions will be named by the various county committees. There being some question as to whether this law applied in counties where the primary law was not in effect an enquiry was sent to Attorney General Bird and his reply was as follows:

"I have your communication of of children in each of the townships May seventh, in which you ask whether Section 43 of the General O Primary Election Act refers to 00 county conventions not under the o primary system, and whether all county conventions shall be called o after the first Tuesday in September. Replying thereto would say. o said Section 43 applies to all county o conventions of all political parties, or regardless of whether such political o parties are operating under the Prio mary Election Act.


