Among thinking people there has been awakened an intense interest in throwing a better protection around the forests, which grow more important as a natural resource as the timber supply

Although the fire menace has been I serious in all sections, officers of the Forest Service estimated that, the total cost of the forest fires on the National Forests for the season, exclusive of the salaries of forest officers will not be more than \$30,000. This sum is small when it is remembered that it means fire protection for approximately 168,000,000 acres of National Forests, less then two tenths of a mill per acre. Progressive state fire wardens and forest officers, individuals and private corporations having large timber holdings have organized fire fighting forces along much the same line as the government in many cases, and in this way they have given protection to millions of acres of timber which might have been destroyed had it been left unprotected.


