TAFT A WINNER

SWEEPS THE COUNTRY AND WILL HAVE AT LEAST 309 ELECTORAL VOTES

WARNER SLAUGHTERED

With 125,000 Republican Majority in State His Election is Still in Doubt.

IOSCO COUNTY REPUBLICAN

LaBerge and Dillon, Democrats, Make Their Republican Opponents Go Some

HADWIN WINS FOR SHERIFF

As early as possible to ascertain the majorities in Iosco last Tuesday are all republican and as follows:

Republican electors 520
Warner for Governor 35
Loud for Congress 474
Foster for Senator 429
Yeo for Legislature 448
Wier for Probate Judge 26
Hadwin for Sheriff, plurality, 440
Mark for Clerk 303
Stockman for Treasurer 148
Crandall for Register of Deeds 438
Rawden for Prosecuting Attorney 285
Black for Circuit Court Com. 389

Tuesday's election resulted in a land slide for Taft, and he will receive at least 306 electoral votes.

Michigan rolls up 123,000 majority for the republican national ticket and returns a solid republican delegation to congress.

George A. Loud is elected from the 10th district, but his majority is reduced from that of 1904, when he was last opposed by a democrat.

Lawton T. Hemans, the democratic candidate for governor has made a wonderful run, and the result is still in doubt. Warner has an apparent majority of less than 5000 on the incomplete returns.

Iosco county gave her normal republican majority of 520 on the national ticket, but below that the majorities are greatly reduced.

James LaBerge, the democratic nominee for probate judge made a wonderful run, being defeated by only 26 majority.

W. K. Dillon for treasurer made a splendid run losing out by only 148. The three-cornered fight for sheriff resulted in George H. Hadwin's election, he getting 967 votes, just one-half of those cast.

We were unable to secure the full vote on coroners and county surveyor, but the republican candidates are elected by about normal majorities.
