William Drager was born in Ballenberge, Germany, Nov. 30, 1830, and died at his home in Tawas City, Oct. 29, 1908, lacking but 25 days of being 78 years of age. AuSable's Power.

L. H. McHenry, representing the Eastern Michigan Power Co., was in Saginaw yesterday in connection with matters relating to the supplying of wrong. Saginaw and Bay City and adjacent territory with electric current for light and power. This company is developing the AuSable to Mio, a dis tance of about 100 miles. The company claims that power can be transmitted to any point within a radius of sweeter. 250 miles of AuSable, and declares that it is simply a question of whether or not the cities of Saginaw and Bay City desire a cheap current.

The development of the river for power purposes is rather unusual. The total amount of power that can be developed is declared to be approximately 50,000 horse power, and this to be obtained by the erection of 10 or 12 dams, ranging in height from 25 to 40 feet, located at different points along the river, according to fall and local conditions. The lands on both sides of the river for practically the entire distance, for at least 95 per cent, of the way, have been purchased and the engineers of the company are now and have been for several months past running their lines and drilling the various dam sities. The total outlay for the completion of the work will be several millons of dollars.

The company says its policy is to develop the territory that will be supplied for power and light purposes, and to bring in and foster, as far as it is able, new industries which will be located in the towns and cities served. The welfare of the various communities, of course, reacts to the benefit of the company. 
