War On Public Spitting.

A state anti-tuberculosis law having been passed, the state association wishing to concentrate its energies during the coming year in securing the passages of anti-spitting ordinance in every town and village in the state of Michigan; further, not only to secure the passage of such an ordinance but to rouse and educate public sentiment to such a degree that the ordinance will be enforced. Inasmuch as spitting is the chief method by which tuberculosis is spread throughout the community, efforts are to be directed to the suppression of this unnecessary, of fensive and dangerous nuisance. The state association has had drawn up for it a model anti-spitting ordinance prepared by Prof. Henry M. Bates of the law department of the University of Michigan. Ionia has already passed this ordinance and the total association of Ypsilanti is working to have its passage in that city. Every effort to stamp out the spitting nuisance in each community is being made.


