AN ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

Was that Held at Bay City for Organization of the Northeastern Michigan Development Association.

At Bay City, on Thursday of last week was held what is beyond doubt the most important meeting-at least to the northeastern portion of Michigan-that ever assembled in that city. Nearly one walks of life, representing every county hundred representative citizens from all on the east side of the lower peninsula from Saginaw to the Straits of Mackinac, assembled in the city hall for the purpose of organizing the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau. The object of the organization is to settle up the new unoccupied farming lands of this

The meeting was called to order by Mayor E. E. Evans of Bay City, who was made temporary chairman. J. Burt Kiely, of Roscommon, was made temporary secretary. A committee composed of Frank Buel, of Bay, William Stone, of Aranac, A. W. Black, of Iosco, W. A. Blackburn, of Alpena, Frank Ford, of Cheboygan, and Senator Foster, of Gladwin, were appointed to formulate plan for organization.

While this committee was at work the neeting was addressed by Secretary of State Martindale, who gave a description of the plan mapped out by the state pubic domain commission for the handling of the state tax lands, in this section. Addresses were also made by State Land Commissioner Russell, and others.

The committee on organization reported in favor of the election from the deletes present, two directors from each county which board should proceed to the election of officers; also for the appointment of an executive committee and a committee of ways and means, which report was adopted.

Saginaw county, which was not included in the original call for the meeting, had delegates present and requested membership, which was granted. The reliminary meeting then adjourned.

At 7:30 in the evening the board of directors met and proceeded to organize by the election of officers and appointment of committees. The officers elect-

President-V. S, Maloney, Cheboygan Secretary-T. F. Martson, Bay City Treasurer—R. Hanson, Grayling.

The directors from Iosco county are . J. Patterson and A. W. Black Under the plan of organization the directors elected at this meeting will serve until the January meeting of the various boards of supervisors when these bodies will elect two directors to serve for the

The executive committee appointed was instructed to meet at once and draft a constitution and by-laws which are to be submitted to the directors at a meeting to be held in Bay City December 28, at which time the objects and plans of the organization will be completed and reports prepared to submit to the various poards of supervisors at the January

The meeting was one which could not fail to broaden any one who was present either as a delegate or spectator. Enthusiasm for the building up of this secion of Michigan was the key note. Not knocker was present. Boosters everyone. State officials, representatives of the railroads, farmers, business and professional men from every walk of life. All enthusiastic to see the dawn of pros-

perity for this section, and believing that that prosperity lies in the settling by actual farmers, the lands that are now unoccupied and which are only awaiting the practical men in search of homes to come here where they can secure good lands at a low figure.

The realization of the great wrong that has been done northern Michigan by the fake real estate agents who have brought settlers in here and sold them sand plains at a big profit to themselves must be overcome, and must be one of the prime objects of this association. If we in secure settlers for the good lands the will take care of itself.

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

The time comes in every young man's life when he is disinclined enter a college or university. The Michitions are not pressing. The work given and Jas E. Dillon's. is also useful to those reared in cities or trained for scientific or professional pursuits, who desire to engage in the agricultural pursuits.

Last year over two hundred men and women were registered in these courses. In the same classes were to be found the farm hand and the capitalist; side by side were sixteen-year-old youths and men whose hair was tinged with grey; the university graduate was there also. As the object is to teach practical agriculture, wide variations in preparatory raining of the individuals of a class does not present the unsurmountable barrier that would arise in connection with purely scientific or classical training. No entrance examinations are required. Anyone who can read and write ought o derive some denefit.

The following are the subjects included in the First-year General Agriulture; viz: Stock Judging, carpenry and Blacksmithing, Veterinary Science, Soils and Crops, Stock Feeding, Fruit Growing and Vegetable Gardening, Business Arithmetic, Bookkeeping and Correspondence. The Second-year General Agriculture includes advanced work in some of the subjects named, with Dairying, Farm Engineering, Concrete Work and Agricultural Chemistry and Soil Physics in addition. The courses in Creamery Janagement, Cheese Making, Poultry and Forestry are equally well suited in heir arrangemeut.

Eight hours constitutes the prescribed lay's work, at least half of which is pent in training the hand and eye. in addition to the mind, in shop and aboratory. A large, well equipped ibrary and reading room is available when classes are not in progress.

These courses all begin January 4th, 910, except the Cheese course which begins six weeks later.

### Rules of the Road Revised to Date,

A copy of the new Michigan vehicle aws, effective January 1, 1910, has been received. A number of radical hanges and additions have been made n the rules governing the use of autonobiles, and owners of autos will be vise if they take the trouble to post hemselves on the provisions of the new aws before they become effective.

By its provisions all registrations hall expire December 31 of each year and may be renewed at a cost of \$1. The fee for new registrations has been increased from \$1 to \$3 per year. Owners of automobiles who desire to retain the number at present in use on their machines may do so by making application before January 1.

The purchaser of a second-hand machine must deposit \$1 with the secreary of state and the person making the ale must within 10 days report the ame to the secretary of state, stating the name and business address of the purchaser and the number under which the ehicle is registered.

Numbers shall be displayed conspiciously on the front and rear of all cars, the numbers being of a shade differing from that of the background to which they are attached. The numbers must be attached in such manner that hey will not swing with the motion of he car. Different colors of numbers and plates shall be designated for each rear, that a glance will serve to show he season for which it is intended.

The law makes it imperative for the lriver of a vehicle which is obstructing a highway to turn aside in order that an automobile may pass. The driver of the car is required to use every precaution to avoid frightening horses attached to the vehicle passed, and it becomes the legal duty of each member f an auto party to render to the owner of such teams as are passed on the highway every assistance in their power to prevent trouble.

While the laws recognizes the right of towns and villages to regulate the speed of autos within their precincts, it distinctly states that in no case must a peed in excess of the state law of 25 miles an hour be allowed, and within the corporate limits shall not be in excess of 10 miles an hour in the business section and 15 miles an hour in the


