Three Million Matches Struck each Minute.

By the end of the brief minute taken to read these paragraphs the nations of the civilized world will have struck three nillion matches. This is the average for every minute of the twenty-four nours of the day. Fifteen billion is the enormous number for the entire year, and those living under the American flag are said to be responsible for the consumption of one half of this amount.

The importance of the industry which urns out the little splinters of wood ipped with sulphur or some other material ignited by friction is only recognized when the average smoker tries to contemplate his predicament if he had to go back to the time when he had to coax a spark from a tinder box. Of course, the answer is, he would smoke a great deal less because of the difficulty in getting a light, or else, on the other hand, smoke continuously in order to keep alive the fire at the end of his stogie or Havana, Small and insignificant as it is, the match demands perhaps as much atention in the choice of the wood going into its manufacture as any other forest product. Only the choicest portions of the best trees are suitable. Sapwood, knotty or cross-grained ti mber will not do. Instead of being a by-product of other articles of manufacture the little match is turned out at hundreds of mills over the country where the by-products are bulky objects like doors, sach, shingles, siding, posts, and cord-wood. The pines, linden, aspon, white cedar, poplar, birch, and willow are the most suitable match timbers.

The match makers-not the matrinonial kind-are already finding that the amount of choice timber available s dwindling. Forest conservation, if applied to the holdings of the match comparties, like it is on Uncle Sam's National Forests in the West, will do much to make the supply sufficient for a logger number of years than would be the case if the old-time wasteful lumberp.g methods of a few years ago should continue. The rapid increase in stumpage prices is one of the chief factors in encouraging the wise use of the forests where suitable match timber is available.



How the Zuni Indians Have Marked the Supposed Spot by a Crude Shrine.

in the Zuni cosmogony, the earth s conceived of as flat, and shaped like a pancake. Being a chosen people of the gods they were commanded early in their tribual career to go to the exact center of the world, and there build their homes; and one of the most interesting legends of the people relates the story of their wanderings in search of the middle place, and tells how they knew it when they reached it. It is about 200 yards south of their village in western New Mexico, 35 miles south of Gallup, on the Santa Fe route. It is marked by a crude shrine, built like a bake oven, out of flat stones. Two large removable flagstones close the entrance, which faces the rising sun.

On the top are a number of concretionary formations, known to the Indians as thunder stones. In the interior are large numbers of feather tufted prayer sticks, and several earthenware vessels filled with sacred meal. Numerous ceremonial dances, in the nature of rainmaking rites, are performed around this holy place.



NEVER TOUCH THE SURFACE

What Happens When Drops of Water Are Scattered on Top of a Hot Stove.

It is impossible to throw a few drops of water on a redhot stove. The water can never touch the stove at all. What is seen is a few drops rolling rapidly over the surface, gradually getting smaller until they disappear. If the drops are on a perfectly level place one can see under them to the other Age limit, 21 years and over on the side of the room, thus proving that

What actually happens is that the bottom of the drop changes at once to steam or vapor on coming close to plied by the drop as it gradually goes away. So the drop rests on a cushion of vapor until it is entirely dissipated. This state of water is known as the spheroidal state, and is of interest on account of its peculiarity and seemingly paradoxical behavior.

The reason why the drop is not immediately evaporated or changed to steam is also very interesting. The water vapor that intervenes between its under surface and the redhot stove is a very bad conductor of heat and consequently the full intensity of the heat cannot get into the water itself. only the amount transmitted through the vapor being available for this purpose.—The Sunday Magazine.

Up in Arms over New Log Rates.

A Millersburg dispatch to the Detroit Free Press says that the lumbermen and mill owners in the small towns along the D. & M. north of Alpena are much exercised over the new freight schedule on logs from that vicinity to Alpena.

The new rates were forced from the D. & M. railway by the railroad commission recently, on complaint of the Alpena Shippers' association, formed of Alpena lumbermen. The old rates on logs into Alpena from this section were from \$2 to \$2.50 per thousand feet higher than corresponding rates into Onaway and Millersburg.

On the face this looked like a dis. crimination against Alpena lumbermen. But Alpena has water shipment and can put lumber into the market about \$2,50 per thousand feet less than lumbermen here can by rail. To protect the inland towns the D. & M. railway had maintained a higher log rate into Alpena, counterbalancing the reduced cost of water shipment.

Now the railroad commission has cut the rate. The result is that Alpena lumbermen can come into these places and pay more for the logs by the amount of this \$2.50 per thousand feet than can the local sawmills and manufacturing plants, thus securing practically all the timber.

It means ruin to the local lumber interests. Sawmills and industries depending on purchasing their timber in the open market from farmers and small timber owners will be frozen out.

A concerted effort will be made by lumbermen all through this section to have the log rates into Alpena put back to the old schedule. The D. & M. railway has already secured an injunction against the putting of the new rates into force and it will be heard in Detroit after the hoidays.

Is Out of the Woods.

The Hillman branch of the Detroit & Mackinac railway is finished to Hillman in Montmorency county. The steel was laid Saturday.

The site of the depot is about three blocks south of the Wenona hotel, near the church. Steel will be laid about a mile beyond the depot to provide a "Y" so that trains can be reversed.

The depot at Lachine is about completed. It is a substantial frame struc-

Lachine is located about a half mile above S. W. Flanders' on the Snyder farm, in the center of a fine farming country. Lachine is the only regular station on the branch between Hillman and Alpena, but there will be a freight house and way station near Emerson's.

The telephone line has been completed to within three miles of Hillman. The first rail in the branch was laid in the fall of 1907. The last 15 miles of steel was placed since July 17, last. It is stated that the branch will be extended into the hardwood forests

The injury to his knee cap at present looks as if it would give him the most trouble. Mr. Bischoff has been the victim of two or three serious accidents prior to this one.

Mr. Bischoff's mother, Mrs. Ferdinand Bischoff, and little sister, came up from East Tawas Tuesday, but had to return thither again yesterday.—Onaway Outlook.

Short College Courses for the Farmers' Son.

The Michigan Agricultural College offers six short courses to meet the needs of the farmers' son who can only leave the farm for a few weeks during the winter. All courses begin January 4th, 1910, except the cheese course, which begins February 14th. The first and second years in general agriculture and the poultry course continue eight weeks; the creamery course six weeks and those in fruit growing and forestry four weeks. The most applicable work of the college is offered in a condensed, simple, practi-, cal form. No entrance examinations.






