Where the Coal Goes.

Who uses most of the coal? First and oremost of any single industry, the ailroads consume from 90,000,000 to 100,000,000 tons a year, and these and teamships probably use nearly 30 per cent of the country's output, which is as nuch or more than is used for all donestic and heating purposes. This eaves approximately one-half of the total production,—principally bitumnous,-to be accounted for by the n lustries of the country.

Coal and manufacturing are terms which are in general practice closely elated, but they are constantly changng their adjustments, which affect and are n turn affected by transportation. For stance, New York is the greatest nufacturing state, yet she possesses no coal mines. On the other hand, West Virginia is the third largest coal pro lucer, but she has comparatively no m mufacturers. The time will doubtless come home when West Virginia, with ping away all of her fuel, largely to physicians to care for all indigent cases, New York and New England, and become a great manufacturing state. It is only necessary to consult the statistics at a close approximation of its relative coal consumption.
