## Cannonism Condemned.

The Chicago Tribune, the leading republican newspaper of the central states, has just completed a poll of the republican and independent newspapers from Ohio to the Pacific coast, which includes answers to the following two questions: "Is Hon. Joseph G. Cannon, of Illinois, your choice for Speaker of the next Congress?"

Do you endorse the Aldrich-Cannon tariff law, or the Aldrich-Cannon organization of the senate and house?"

To the first question 546 republican editors, and 31 independent editors answered yes, and 2,653 republicans and 541 independents answered no.

On the second question 812 republicans and 27 independents answered yes, and 2,686 republicans and 577 independents answered no.

The Michigan vote was, for Cannon 29 republicans and one independent. Against Cannon 206 republicans and 39 independents.

For the Aldrich-Cannon tariff 47 republicans and two independents voted yes, and 177 republicans and 47 independents no.

These figures coming directly from republicans through the leading republican journal of this section would indicate that the present republican policy was not satisfactory to even that party.

## Against the Government.

The publishers and printers of the United States are up in arms against the government, and rightly they should be. The government is now one of our greatest competitors in the job printing department. They are printing envelopes for one-third less than most small offices can buy blank envelopes and pay freight on them for, let alone print them. This should not be, declares the Elmer (Okla.) Record. The merchant or banker that uses them kick like a bay steer if an editor or printer send away from home for an article that they usually keep in stock to sell, but what is the difference? Printing envelopes or other stationery is part of the publisher's living and should do the work that now goes to the government printing office. A publisher fights the people's battles for them, why not give the publisher your envelope printing and other stationery work? They say they are cheaper; that may be true to some extent, considering the grade of goods; so can we order goods and get them cheaper many other places than we generally can from a home business, but the publisher believes in patronizing home industries, though they be a little higher. The government raises a great howl every year of a great deficit in the postal earnings. The printing of envelopes is one of the greatest causes for that deficit. The time has come when every publisher in the United States should sit down hard on a candidate for congress who will not vote for a measure to eliminate this distressing ordeal. Patronize home institutions if you are a lover of home prosperity.

## Amend the Constitution.

A proposed amendment to Article VIII, Section 12 of the Constitution will be submitted to the electors at the election to be held on Monday, April 4, 1910, as follows:

"No county shall incur any indebtedness which shall increase its total debt beyond three per cent of its assessed valuation, except counties having an assessed valuation of five million dollars or less, which counties may increase their total debt to five per cent of their assessed valuation."

The effect of the proposed amendment is to give counties, having an assessed valuation of five million dollars or less, the right to increase their total debt to five per cent of the total assessed valuation.

## Michigan Fruit.

Paul Rose, the fancy fruit grower, located near Frankford, western Michigan, spoke as follows when recently asked what varieties of fruit do well in this region:

"I can say that so far as apples are concerned, I have yet to see a variety that does not do well here. There are varieties better adapted to this section than others. All early varieties and all ripening with the Baldwin, Greening and Spy. I like the Wealthy as a money maker. Would plant Spy and Wagner for fillers, also Baldwin and King. There are many good varieties that might be named but these will always sell.

"As regards peaches, I would plant largely of Elberta and keep them sprayed. No use to plant Elberta unless you spray before buds open with Bordeaux mixture for leaf curl. Would also plant Gold Mine and Bronson. None of the early varieties, nor none of the late ones.

"Plums—Quackenboss and Blue Damsion."

Cherries—for sour varieties I would plant Montmorency, Louis Philippe, May Duke and English Morello. These must be sprayed when in full leaf with Bordeaux mixture to secure healthy foliage. In sweets, I would plant Black Tartarian, Schmidts, Windsor-Napoleon, Bing and Lambert. Would plant only Bartlett pears with Worden's Sockel for pollinizers."

## Decrease Shown In Coal Mining.

Decreased output, decreased number of mines in operation, decreased working days, decreased number of employees—a general decrease, in fact, in the coal mining industry—are recorded for Michigan for 1909. The mining inspector's report has just been placed on file at the labor department.

Thirty-one mines were, on the average, in operation during the year against 32 in 1908. The average number of employees was 2,960, while in 1908 it was 3,087. The average number of hours worked was the same for the two years, being 7.8. The aggregate wages paid during the entire year of 1909 amounted to \$2,117,865.42 and in 1908 the aggregate was \$2,260,196.88.

The total output of coal last year amounted to 1,758,020 tons. In 1908 the output was 1,839,927 tons. The aggregate cost of mining the coal last year was \$2,905,573.07, the average cost of each ton being \$1.65. In 1908 the aggregate cost was \$3,088,956.79, and the average cost per ton \$1.67.

## Rebel Money Good, Sells Above Par.

A silver half dollar which it would take 5,000 whole silver dollars to buy, is on exhibition at the New York Numismatic club. It is the half dollar of the confederate states and is said to be the only metallic coin of the lost cause.

The coin is exactly like the United States half dollar on the side bearing the figure of liberty, but on the reverse it bears a shield with seven stars and seven bars with a wreath of cotton plant and sugar cane.

Only four impressions of this coin were made, one being sent to Jefferson Davis and the other three to prominent confederate officials. These three subsequently disappeared. The coin is now the property of Edgar Adams, a Brooklyn collector.

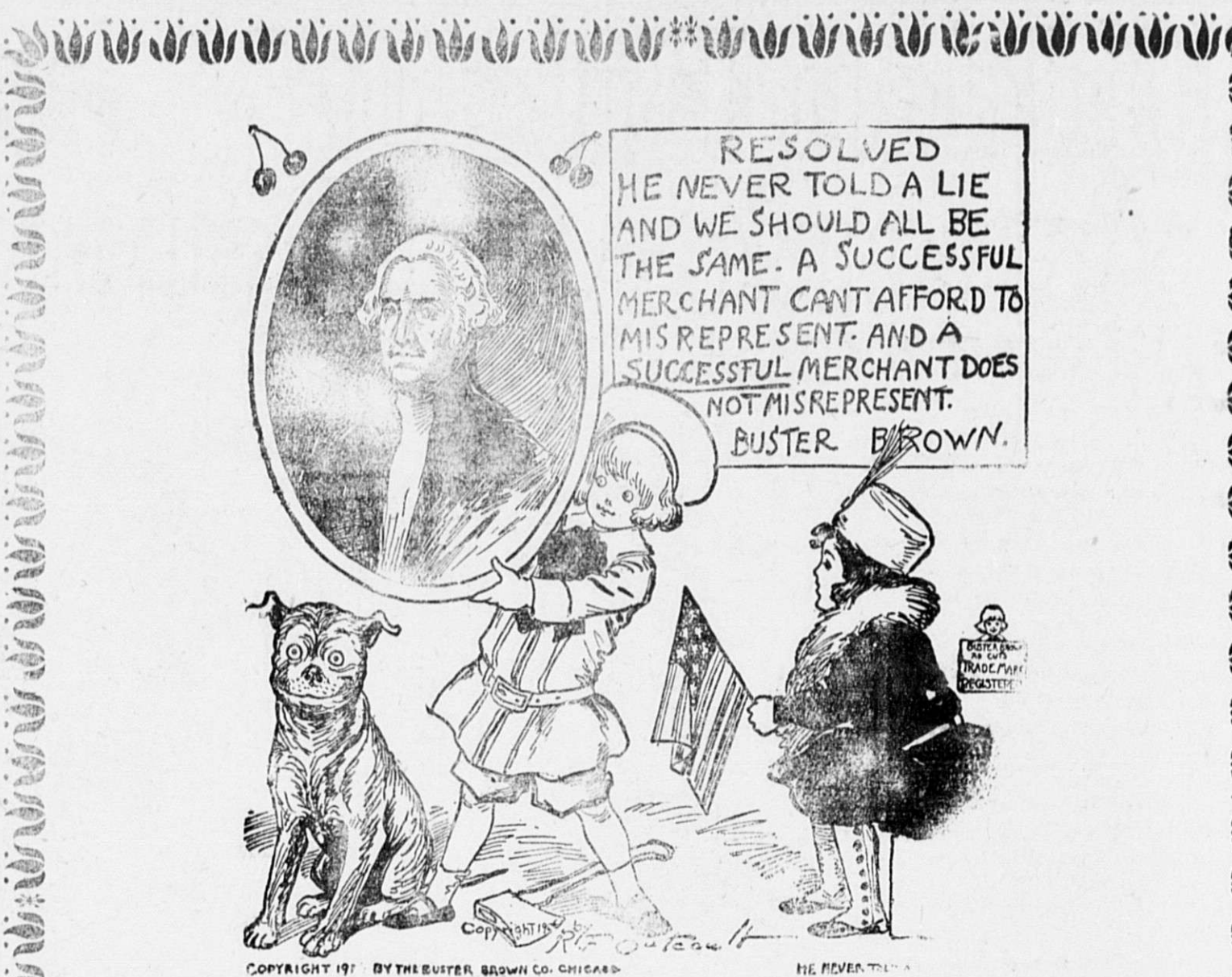

Article III—Officers. The officers of this association shall be President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer. Section 2.—Duties of Officers. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at each meeting of the association, to appoint committees, to perform such other duties as are herein after provided, and to look after the general interests of the association.

Section 3.—It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to perform the duties of the President in his absence.

Section 4.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer as Secretary to keep a record of the business transaction of the association and such correspondents as his office may require.

As Treasurer, he shall be custodian of all funds of the association and shall keep an accurate account of the same. He shall be required to collect fees and dues, give receipts for the same, and report to the board of directors all members whose dues are in arrears. He shall make a full report at each annual meeting.

Article IV—Members. This association shall consist of the following members or schools: Tawas City, East Tawas, AuSable, and Oscoda. Any other school of Iosco county may become a member upon written application sent to the secretary at least thirty days before any event in which such school desires to be represented, provided such application shall be approved by a majority vote of the board of directors.
