| Electric Lights. <br> More or less-really more-criticism has been found with our city lighting plant since it was installed. In fact the mode of operating it has been most unsatifactory. It seems that the time has now arrived when something must be done to permanently remedy the condition. At the present time we have a temporary arrangement with East Tawas for furnishing electric current which will continue until June I. That city also has offered us a contract for three years as stated in our last issue, but the sentiment seems to be almost wholly against accepting it, and strongly in favor of installing the necessary power to furnish our own current. <br> A petition is being circulated this week, and largely signed, asking the city council to submit the question of bonding for a sufficient amount, e ettinaled at from $\$ 3,000$ to $\$ 4,000$, be sulmitted to the tax payers at the coming the necessary boiler and engine. The queation will come before the council at its regular meeting this evening. <br> It would seem to us that this would be the sensible solution to the problem. There seems to be every reason to believe that the plant could easily be placed on a paying basis if properly handled, and an economical, fuel saving boiler and engine installed.
