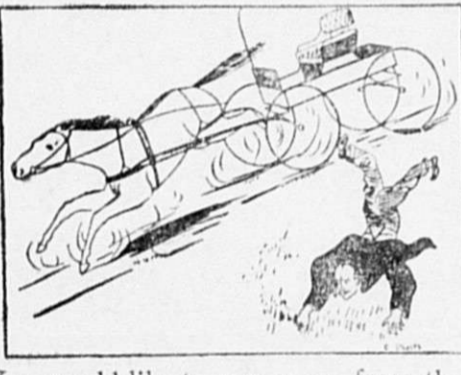

Halley's comet will not be visible to the naked eye until about the first of April when it will be seen before dawn in the eastern sky. The earth and the comet will at that time be rapidly approaching each other and the comet greatly increase in brilliancy. On the night of May 18th the earth and the comet will pass by each other, and the earth will probably sweep through the tail of the comet. After this the comet will attain its maximum of splendor in the evening sky, and in a few days its glory will begin to fade. The comet is visible now in the eastern sky with the aid of a telescope.

Of 664 correspondents reporting on the condition of wheat to the secretary of state for February, 147 stated that that cereal sustained injury during the month, while 517 reported no damage. Some of the correspondents in the southern tier of counties were of the opinion that wheat has been severely injured by ice. It is estimated that there are still 3,000,000 bushels of wheat in the possession of growers.

Postmasters were notified that a new one-cent postal card will be issued shortly by the department at Washington. It will be the same size as the present "McKinley" card. It will be painted on light blue board and in bronze blue ink. The profile of Wm. McKinley will adorn the address side of the card.

Gov. Warner has named Attorney General Bird to succeed Justice Montgomery as justice of the supreme court, and Judge F. C. Kuhn, of St. Clair county to succeed Mr. Bird as attorney general.

**How Nature Grinds Lime.**

Take up whatever farm paper you may happen to lay your hands on, and at the merest glance through its pages you will be impressed with the stress placed on the matter of maintaining lime in the soil. The topic is not being exaggerated; there is no room to doubt the need of lime for the profitable growth of crops.

We find abundant experimental and scientific proof that pulverized lime is a better form than burned lime. But "How fine should I reduce limestone for my acid soils? This question has been put to the writer over and over again. I have a letter, sent me several years ago, answering this question, which says: "In fact, you will need the mills of the gods, for it must be ground fine—sixty, eighty or even ninety mesh."

I at once set about what I thought would be an easy task, the purchasing of this machinery. I soon found a machine would not do this work, that it would take two or more machines, and further, that they were high priced, rather complicated, expensive to keep in repair and requiring skilled mechanics to operate them. So that their output of this fine lime per day was insignificant, compared with the cost. The more I learned on the question: "How can the farmer secure fine-ground lime at a price he can afford to pay," the farther away the answer seemed to be.

Thus it occurred to me to ask a certain soil on my farm, known to be very acid and in need of lime, the question: "How fine should the limestone be reduced?" The answer seems to be any size from two inches down, so long as the chunks are not so large as to be a hindrance to cultivation.

Five years ago (1905) I put small pieces of limestone (Knox Dolomite) in this soil, varying in sizes from two and one half inches long down to one inch. The field was plowed and sown to wheat and grass twice during the five years. To-day I find the pieces averaging two and one half by one and one fourth by five eighths inches have been reduced to one and one half by three fourths by one half, or over fifty per cent, while I could not find the one-inch sizes at all; only here and there a white speck could be seen, which I took to be what was left of those one-inch pieces.

Yes, "the mills of the gods grind slow, but they grind exceeding small." In this case the processes of Nature had been working night and day, never ceasing, never tiring, doing their work without cost and at a rapid rate. All limestone may not break down and give available lime in so short a while, but, at any rate, if all the stone was reduced to one-fourth of an inch and smaller or even one half inch, sixty to seventy per cent of the lime would be available at

the time of application and the remainder will all become available in a short while, about as soon as the soil needed it.

Like every good rule, this one has its exceptions. There are certain hard limestones, the kinds that make good road material and building-stone, that are very slow about becoming available, unless finely ground. Where immediate results are necessary, also, the finer rock is desirable. But balancing economy against results, it is safe to say that with most limestones and for most soils we farmers need only to take the first steps and then let the forces of Nature, "the mills of the gods," do the rest.—O. P. R. Fox, in the Farm and Fireside.

**Judgement Against Mail Order House.**

Sears, Roebuck & Co., the Chicago mail order house, has been ordered by the courts to pay damages of \$13,750 to Charles A. Stickney & Co., St. Paul, Minn., manufacturers of gasoline engines. It is the result of a suit in which it was shown that Sears, Roebuck & Co. had fraudulently listed gasoline engines in their catalogues at a higher horsepower than the engines possessed.

In the first trial, judgement was given against Sears, Roebuck & Co. for \$10,000. An appeal was taken and a new trial granted on technical grounds, but the second award was even higher than the first—\$13,750.

It was shown in court that Sears, Roebuck & Co. had tried to involve Stickney & Co., in the alleged wrongdoing by asking them to make the same fraudulent claims of horsepower in the Stickney catalogue. This they did not succeed in doing.

It was shown in court that Sears, Roebuck & Co. listed a 2 1/2 horsepower engine in their "Big Book" as a 3 horsepower engine, one of 4 1/2 horsepower as a 5 horsepower engine, one of 5 horsepower as a 6 horsepower engine and so on all along the line. It is estimated that Sears, Roebuck & Co. made from \$15 to \$20 additional on each engine by means of the higher rated horsepower.

It is an easy matter for dealers to advertise that they sell goods cheaper than other dealers, but when it is shown in court, as in this case, that the goods are not of the quality advertised, it is wise for people who send their money to catalogue houses to know that they get what they order before they crowd over their neighbor that they are buying so cheaply.—Furniture Record.

### New Law Gives Women the Right to Vote in Certain Cases.

According to Act No. 206 enacted by the legislature in 1909 women may vote at any election held in any village, township, city, county, or school district at which any question involving the direct expenditure of public money or the issue of bonds shall be submitted to a vote of the electors, every woman who possesses the qualifications of male electors and has property assessed for taxes in any part of the district or territory affected by the result of such election shall be entitled to vote thereon.

At the coming village and township registration days the names of women will be received for registration but there are no questions to be submitted at either election on which women may vote.

Women who are qualified are those who are eligible to vote under section one article three of the constitution and are tax payers owning property in the district affected, those who are owners of property on joint deed and who are paying taxes on property bought on contract.

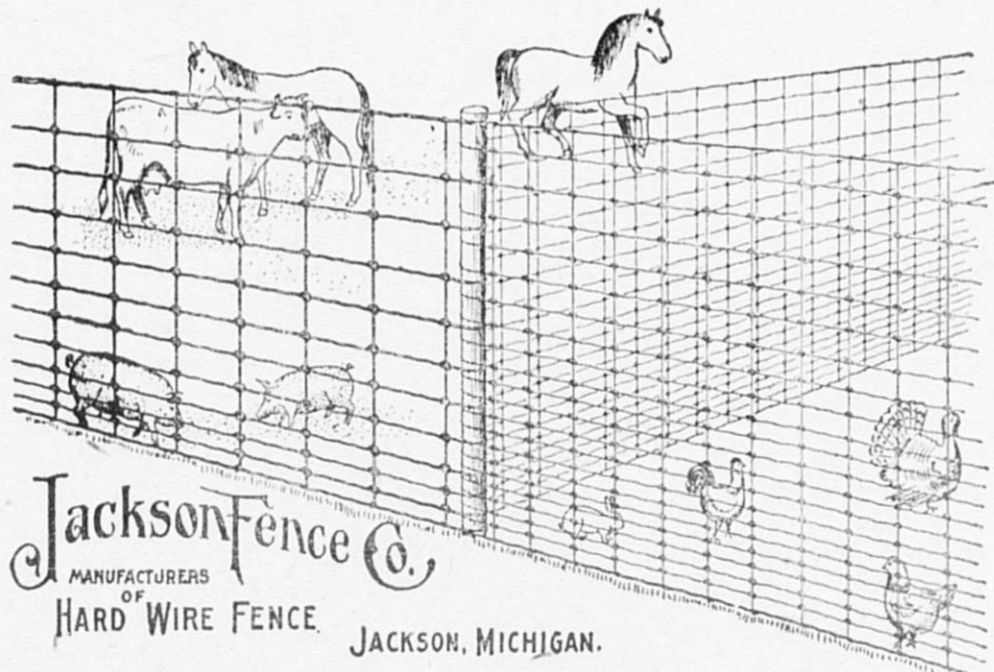

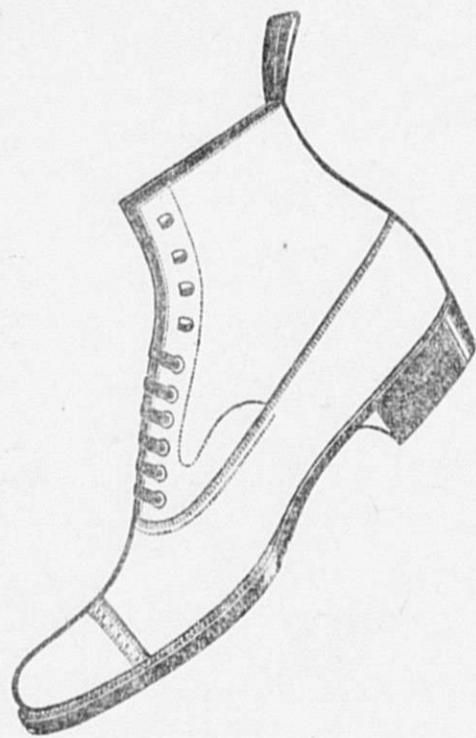

### Electric Lights.

More or less—really more—criticism has been found with our city lighting plant since it was installed. In fact the mode of operating it has been most unsatisfactory. It seems that the time has now arrived when something must be done to permanently remedy the condition. At the present time we have a temporary arrangement with East Tawas for furnishing electric current which will continue until June 1. That city also has offered us a contract for three years as stated in our last issue, but the sentiment seems to be almost wholly against accepting it, and strongly in favor of installing the necessary power to furnish our own current.

A petition is being circulated this week, and largely signed, asking the city council to submit the question of bonding for a sufficient amount, estimated at from \$3,000 to \$4,000, be submitted to the tax payers at the coming election, for the purpose of installing the necessary boiler and engine. The question will come before the council at its regular meeting this evening.

It would seem to us that this would be the sensible solution to the problem. There seems to be every reason to believe that the plant could easily be placed on a paying basis if properly handled, and an economical, fuel saving boiler and engine installed. That the number of users of light could be largely increased there is but little doubt, and this with what the city would otherwise have to pay for street lighting would meet the expense of running the plant.

The Herald will have more to say on the subject after the action of the city council this evening.
