Up to the Publishers.

The meeting for the organization of the Northeastern Michigan Press Association, at Bay City, March, 16, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved: That the members of the Northeastern Michigan Press Association take steps to have the newspapers of this district using ready-print service eliminate all matter from these columns which advertise lands other than that in our own section.

The full meaning of this resolution is that it was the sense of the meeting that the publication of advertisements in the papers within the territory of the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau advertising western and Canadian lands was detrimental to the work of the Bureau and therefore detrimental to the best interests of the publishers.

In addition to the advertisements of the ready-print service, a New York advertising firm is at the present time asking for rates on a series of special plate matter advertising Canadian lands from the publishers of this section.

While this may be legitimate business we believe that it is to the best interests of the territory it not be accepted.

Recently published statistics show that 514 farmers from Michigan have entered homesteads in the Canadian northwest during the past year, and that a total from the United States reaches 9,019. These men were induced to go to that country thro advertisements appearing largely in the country papers of this and other states. That they have bettered their conditions is very doubtful.

Past events show that probably a majority of those who go to the west and northwest are disappointed in their hopes and return to Michigan wiser but poorer.

This district contains better lands for farming and fruit-raising purposes, than can be found in the Northwestern States or in the Canadian Northwest, and can be bought here for much less than half the price paid for inferior lands in the western states. The lands in the Canadian Northwest are practically free, it is true, but it is all those lands are worth to live so far beyond the boundary of civilization, in that North Pole climate.

Are You Enrolled?

For the instruction of voters who may not be registered we publish the following information relative to the enrollment to be held on April 4th:

Section 4, of the Public Acts, No. 281, provides: "That the voters in the various political parties shall be offered an opportunity to become enrolled voters of particular political party with which they are affiliated on the first Monday in April, preceding the September primary election, whether they are registered or not."

Not all the voters are enrolled, and inasmuch as candidates for the office of governor, lieutenant governor, congressman and state representatives must be nominated at the primaries, it is a matter of the highest importance to all electors that they enroll in April.

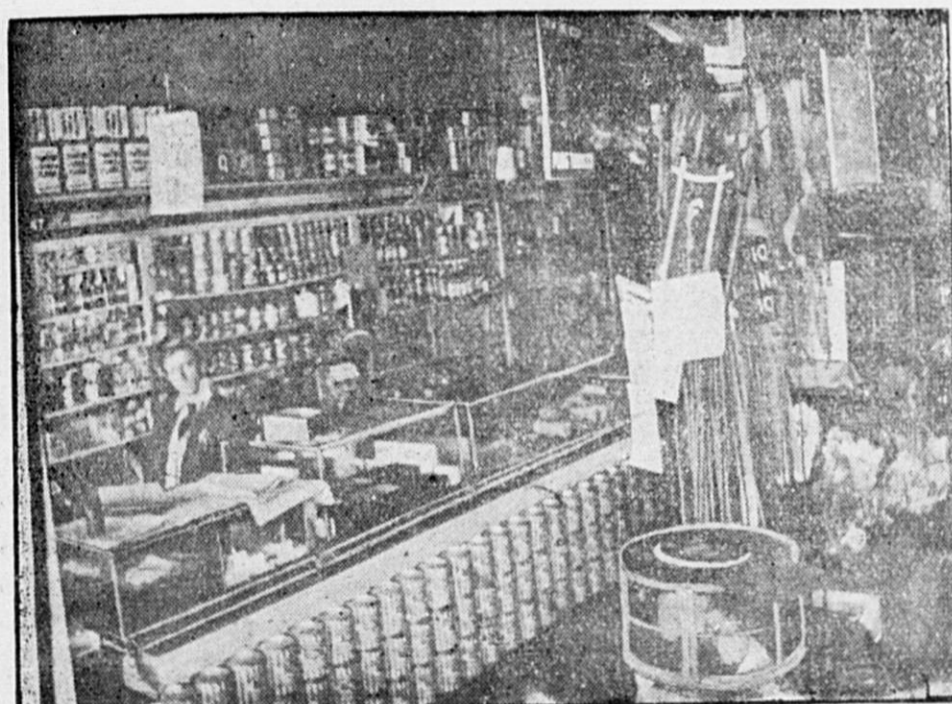

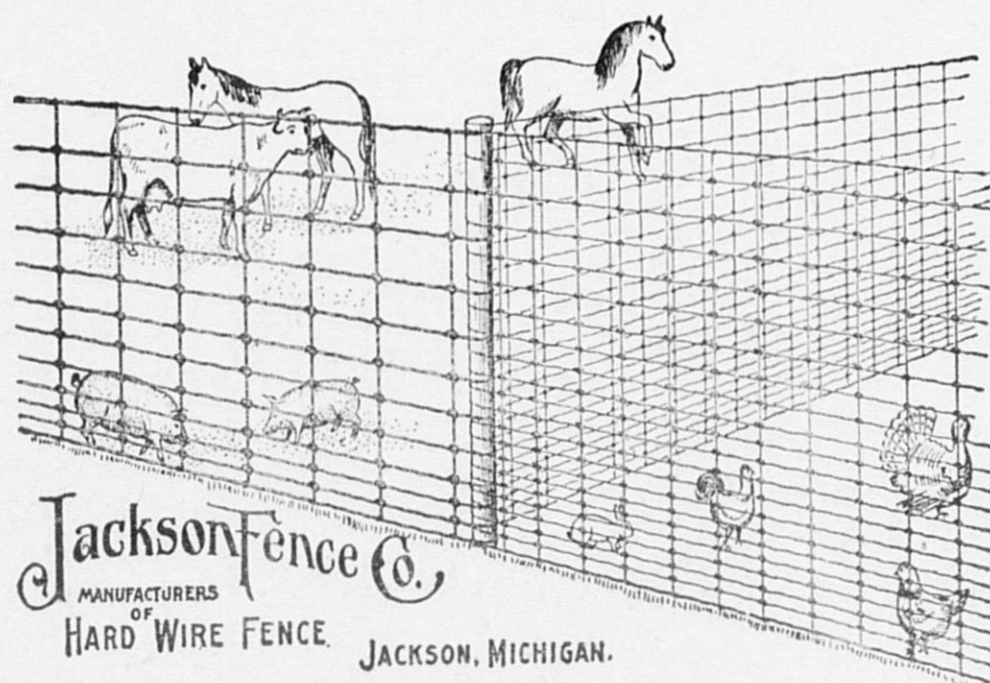
