## Will the People Be Hoodwinked?

Senator Burrows and Congressman Loud are now trying to convince their backers that they are doing a big thing for the people. Loud, in getting the Maine raised from Havanah harbor, and Burrows in booming the mail clerks, both expecting to be elected through the exploitation of these two schemes. But Congress has set down on Burrows, and has knocked off \$400,000 from the appropriation they made to raise the Maine, leaving only about \$100,000 for the Maine, enough probably to raise one her guns. This, however, will enable Loud to get up a tremendous shriek of enthusiasm until election is over, and then the wreck will probably be blown up where it is. It's a good enough Morgan until after election, and working the people for suckers is all these statesmen are good for. If we don't miss our guess both of them will be knocked out in November, and will never be heard from again.—Cheboygan Democrat.

## New School Law.

The parents or guardians of all children who have completed the studies of the eight grades, should give written notice to their board of education on or before the fourth Monday of June, when such children desire to attend some certain one of the three nearest high schools during the ensuing year. Upon receiving such written notice the board of education shall vote a tax sufficient to cover the necessary expense for such tuition, not exceeding in amount twenty dollars per pupil (unless the voters appropriate a larger sum at the annual meeting) and may vote a tax sufficient to cover the necessary expense for daily transportation of such children. Any surplus moneys in the treasury of such district belonging to the primary fund may be used in paying necessary tuition in lieu of a tax therefor. The tax thus provided for shall be reported to the clerk of the township in which such district is located and shall be spread upon the tax roll of such townships in the same manner and at the same time as other school taxes.

## College Graduates Called to Teach in Foreign Fields.

All college graduates have a teaching field open to them in foreign countries. So great has the demand become that a department of the foreign employment agency has been established in the University of Michigan Y. M. C. A. China leads in the demand, wanting eight teachers. India calls for four, Africa three, Mexico and Japan two, and Turkey, Persia, Burma, Cuba, Porto Rico, Brazil, and Guatemala one man each. Men will be sent to these places as fast as suitable candidates are found. The expenses of the journey will be paid. Salaries range from \$800 to \$2,500 a year.

English, rhetoric, all the sciences, sociology, and engineering subjects are included in the subjects which the candidates are expected to qualify. Only men are accepted.

China, with her government schools, has a constant call for instructors to teach in advanced schools, where all the subjects are taught in English. In the last three years this nation has established more schools than any other nation. In the effort to secure more native teachers, the government sends over a hundred native students to American universities each year.

The Young Men's Christian Association through its central office in New York City, has the responsible task of filling these positions, because of its high standing in the large foreign cities, and because of its influence with the student population in all parts of the world.

## Michigan Better Than Oregon.

"If Michigan boomed her resources as does Oregon she would have no trouble in leading the world," said Rev. Jennette O. Ferris, who has been in charge of two churches in the neighboring towns of Sheridan and Wilhelmina in Oregon for the past year and a half. Mrs. Ferris has just been back on a visit and as soon as she can arrange her work so as to give it in charge of someone else, she intends returning to Grand Rapids to make her home.

"Grand Rapids is the only place for me," she announced. "It is the finest city in the country to live. I like Michigan but I don't like Oregon. That state has tooted its own horn until people think it is a perfect paradise but I tell you they are sadly fooled when they go there. It is cold and damp and unhealthy most of the time. I shiver now to think of those Oregon fogs. Why, they last for two and three weeks at a time. Scenery? Yes, there is scenery, but what good does it do if you can't see it and most of the time you can't. There is once in a while a nice sunny day but then it is so hot you can't endure it. The thermometer goes to 98 in the shade in the middle of the day in the summer and at night it goes down to 60.

"And the people? They are about 50 years behind the times. Slow and careless. The climate makes them so. Eastern methods are too fast for them. The only really interesting people are the home-seekers. They are not really home-seekers either. They just come west to stake out a claim and live on it long enough to own it and then move away, or sell it. The population is constantly shifting.

"O, yes, southern Oregon is better and Portland is a very picturesque city. But I do not care for the West. Their crops are not a bit better than we grow in Michigan. I am taking back some apples that are every bit as good as the apples they raise. But they boom their state and their crops so. Every little town has its boosters club and every town anybody grows an extra large potato or peach or apple they photograph it and build a booklet around it booming Oregon. The railroads are at the head of this boom. It is a perfect shame, too, the way conditions are misrepresented. Nearly everything is overdrawn. If you read anything about the state in these booklets you will need to discount it about 50 per cent.

"But one can't help admiring this booming trait after all. It shows what advertising will do. People are coming into the state in swarms, but there is no land to stake out. These are about all taken by the home-seekers. The only way anyone can get land in Oregon now is to buy it from someone who has a claim and wants to give it up.

"I would like to see Michigan follow the example of some of these western states in advertising its crops. I doubt if there are any grapes produced anywhere better than those in Van Buren county and yet you never hear of them outside the county hardly. One morning I heard that there were 30,000 bushels of peaches on the city market and yet nothing was said about it outside of Grand Rapids. And the farms in Michigan produce crops that are far superior to those in the west or that could if they were scientifically managed. Oh, I like Michigan and I believe in Michigan. One of the best things about being away from home is the getting back again.

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors:

Your committee appointed to report out a proper body of rules for the government of this board respectfully reports as follows: 1. The following shall be the standing committees of the Board: Claims and Accounts, Equalization, Finance and Apportionment, County Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings, Supplies and Repairs, Drains and Ditches, Official bonds, Salaries of County Officers, Judiciary, County Farm and Mileage and Per Diem.

3. He shall appoint all standing and special committees, and the first named member of any committee shall be the chairman, unless otherwise ordered by the board; all committees to be composed of five members each, except committees on County Roads and Bridges, Public Buildings, Supplies and Repairs, and County Farm, which committees shall consist of three members each.

4. The business of the board at its meetings shall be transacted as far as practicable in the following order: 1. Roll Call. 2. Reading and correcting the Journal. 3. Unfinished Business. 4. Presentation of Petitions. 5. Communications from County Officers.

6. Claims and Accounts. 7. Equalization. 8. Finance and Apportionment. 9. County Roads and Bridges. 10. Public Buildings, Supplies and Repairs. 11. Drains and Ditches. 12. Official Bonds. 13. Salaries of County Officers. 14. Judiciary. 15. Resolutions. 16. County Farm.

The rules adopted by the Michigan House of Representatives shall govern the board in all cases to which they are applicable.

Your committee also recommends the adoption of all the following resolutions as further rules for the government of this board: Resolutions adopted: 1. All supervisors who are not present at roll call, and do not remain while the board is in session, shall not be paid for any more time than is actually spent on the work of the board.

2. Game Warden shall receive pay for actual work performed in the enforcement of the game laws of Iosco county. No work shall be done except ordered by the State Game Warden, and no bill shall be allowed unless O. K'd by the State Game Warden.

3. All bills as claims against the county shall be presented to the clerk and filed not later than 1 o'clock p. m. of the first day of each session. All bills presented to the clerk after such time shall be laid over until the next meeting of the board.

4. Committees shall receive in addition to the per diem compensation heretofore allowed, the same mileage as allowed to the members of the board by statute.

5. In the expenditure of money for public buildings, repairs, fixtures and labor in and about the property of the county, everything being considered comparatively equal, contracts for such purchases, repairs and labor be made with citizens of our own county.

6. Sheriffs and deputy sheriffs attending court by the order of the Judge shall receive \$3 per day for such services.

7. A United States flag shall be displayed at all meetings of the board and on occasions require in matters of county business.

8. The board heretofore shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary practice adopted by the House of Representatives of the Michigan Legislature and such special rules as may be adapted from time to time by the board.

9. County Road commissioners shall be allowed same mileage as members of the Board of Supervisors.

### The Black Death.

The terrible plague known as the "black death" began in China about the year 1333, and from China it went by way of the great caravan route to the north of the Caspian, through central Asia to Tauris and on to Constantinople, reaching Europe by 1348. It raged for more than twenty-six years, with a mortality that will never be accurately known, and to this day the results of its ravages are visible. The disease was bubonic in character and oftentimes was fatal within twenty-four hours after its attack. It was attended by a burning thirst that nothing could allay, and many of its characteristics were too horrible to mention. It is estimated that at least 25,000,000 human beings perished from this great plague.

### Oliver Plunkett.

"Blessed Oliver Plunkett," whose beatification has been approved by the Vatican council, is the famous primate of Ireland who was executed at Tyburn, July 1, 1681, on a charge of high treason. There is an excellent contemporary portrait of him in the National Portrait gallery, Trafalgar square. In 1679 he was arrested on the charge of conspiracy to bring 20,000 Frenchmen into Ireland, and of having levied money from his clergy for the purpose of maintaining 70,000 men for an armed rebellion. The principal witnesses against him were some disreputable priests and friars whom he had suspended for bad conduct. His head is still preserved in a convent at Drogheda.

### Steel Barrels.

Not all barrels are made of wood; there are barrels made of metal. A steel barrel that comes from Germany, used in the importation of aniline dye in powder form, is made with a flat band of the metal, perhaps eight inches in width, around the middle, at the bulge of the barrel, while the two ends of the barrel, tapering from the middle section to the heads, in the ordinary barrel fashion, are made of corrugated steel with the corrugations running lengthwise.  
The dyestuff is heavy, 600 or 700 pounds to the barrel; but the steel barrel remains rigid and carries its heavy load securely without racking or twisting.
