

Needn't Pay For Fire Victims.

That the Detroit & Mackinac railroad not liable for the death of the refugees who lost their lives on a relief train while being carried through a forest fire a short distance from Metz during he fall of 1908, and that the road will not be compelled to pay some \$50,000 damages in claims of \$5,000 each to the relatives of those who died, is the decision of the circuit court at Rogers City in the case of John Konieczny, administrater of the estate of Euphrozina Konieczny, against the railroad company. The suit was a test case for nine similar claims made by relatives To the Republican Electors of Iosco of the deceased. It will be appealed to the supreme court.




