

000 Horse Power.

M. W. Eaton, president of the General Motors Co., and one of the chief personages in the development of the AuSable water power scheme, has returned to New York after a brief visit to Bay City and the site at Cook's on the AuSable, where the first dam is being built. Mr. Eaton says the big dam will develop about 12,000 horsepower, sufficient for all the work the company can get to do in the Saginaw valley during the first year or two after hydro-electric power can be delivered in Saginaw and Bay City. Just what igures the compaay will decide upon is not yet determined. The transmission cost to Bay City, about 86 miles, will be considerable. It is said that it will cost from 5 to 7 mills per d. w. to deiver the current here.

The company will not begin the construction of its tower lines until next spring, nor will it start on the distribution plant at the old New York salt works until early next year. Neither equipment can be used until the dam and generating stations are completed. -Bay City Tribune.


