An Open Letter.
To the Editor of the Isosco County Gazette:
In the last issue of your paper you stated that in the suit brought by Mr. E. E. Kunze to recover the special tax of one per cent, which he and others paid under protest, that the city was put to the expense of employing Hon. Devere Hall, one of the best attorneys in the state, to defend the case; also that the suit was forced on the city. As I understand it the tax is illegal, as, according to the special act of the legislature, the city only had authority to raise \$10,000, to be spread over a period not exceed five years. And that the amount, with the exception of about \$300.00, had already been spread upon the tax rolls of the city and that if the council had used all the special tax collected on the roll of 1908 for the purpose for which it was raised the outstanding orders would have all been paid, and there would have been no call for any special tax for 1909.
As to the city being forced into a law suit, it looks as though the city council was forcing the city into one, and taking a long chance on the results, and that as long as the taxpayers (not the council) will have to settle they are willing to take the chances.
As a taxpayer who paid the illegal tax I do not want to be put to the expense of helping pay high-priced lawyers to defend a tax that any school boy, that could read the special act and figure up the amount previously spread, could see was illegal. If someone does not put a stop to such things there will be no limit to the amount of tax the council will spread on the roll, and we will all be compelled to pay up or fight.
Can the Editor of the Gazette explain what authority the city council had to order the special tax spread on the tax rolls of the city in open defiance of the law relative to the raising of money for city purposes by city councils, thereby involving the city in the present law suit? Not Mr. Kunze and two or three others. Also, why should it be necessary for the city attorney, by order of the council, to employ the Hon. Devere Hall or any other attorney, which increases the expenses of our city administration, in a case which involves only about \$60.00.
I supposed that the rights of the individual taxpayer should be protected and had the right to justice in the courts when necessary.

What's the Matter With Isosco County?
Why just nothing at all!
Its a wonderful county, good soil, good climate, finest water, fine people, the great majority at this writing being out of jail.

Buyers will not come until they know our fruit is sprayed and properly cared for. Spray pumps are cheap, spray material is cheap. The increased yield from one tree will buy an outfit. Just now if you will get one gallon of **Rex Lime Sulphur** and three pounds of **Arsenate of Lead**, mix with fifty gallons water, you will have enough material for twenty good sized trees. This will cost 95 cents—less than five cents per tree. Use it on your apples, cherries and plums, repeat twice later on, total cost per tree 15 cents for the season.

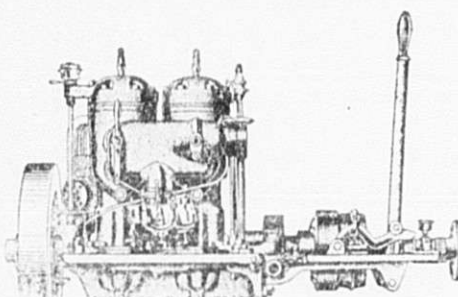

Peculiar Situation.

Lansing, June 16—Politics is a strange game but it has remained for the newly appointed Chief Justice Bird to face the latest in oddities. Briefly, he is facing two elections, and very soon. After serving less than a year in his present office, he will face an election and again in the spring he will have to go through another campaign before he can secure a full term.

In the first place he has been appointed to fill an unexpired term and under the law such appointments hold good only until the first election, which is this fall, and before filling out the rest of the term for which Montgomery was elected the people pass upon him. Also Mr. Montgomery's term would have ended this spring which will force Mr. Bird into another election.

The same conditions apply to four circuit judges in the state, Judge Collingwood of Ingham, Judge Kendrick of Saginaw county, Judge Wilthey of the Osceola circuit and Judge Flannigan of the upper peninsula.

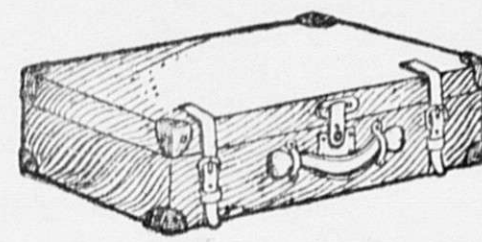

Detroit Industrial Exposition.

President Taft will start the wheels of the Detroit Industrial Exposition in motion on the evening of June 20th.

This exhibition of home products is to be given under the auspices of the Detroit Board of Commerce, and will cover the period from June 20th to July 6th. The committee in charge consists of 275 leading manufacturers, representing a capital of \$150,000,000, and the plans have been made on a liberal scale. One of the largest temporary exhibition halls in the country has been erected, and will be used in conjunction with Detroit's most spacious auditorium, the Wayne Pavilion. It is estimated that the total value of the exhibits will exceed \$1,000,000, and it is Detroit's claim that its exposition will be one of the largest of its kind ever conducted.

The exposition site is on the beautiful Detroit river, and one of the features will be a riverside garden. The products of Detroit's many factories will be attractively displayed, and the processes of manufacture will be shown, with electricity, gas and water power propelling the great variety of machinery.

The exposition will include an automobile show, a food fair, a machinery display, a furniture exhibit, an electrical show, and interesting exhibits of other lines of production.

There will be a decorated approach a half mile long, leading to the buildings, 25,000 incandescents being included in the general illuminating scheme.

Aside from the exhibits of manufactures, there will be displays by civic institutions, and among the entertainment features will be afternoon and evening programs daily by large concert bands.

The fact that the exposition will be the greatest civic event in Detroit's history has led the committee to announce that it hopes to establish a new American record for indoor attendance.

University Summer Session.

The seventeenth annual summer session of the University of Michigan will open July 5, 1910. Courses will be offered in the departments of literature, science and the arts, of engineering, of medicine and surgery, of law, and in the school of pharmacy, in the school of library methods and at the biological station. The session continues until August 26, in all departments except in the department of medicine and surgery, in which courses will close August 12, and in the department of law, where work continues until September 10.

The work of the summer session embraces all instruction given in the university during the summer months. It is under the official control of the board of regents and forms an integral part of the university. The courses offered in the several departments are under the charge of the faculties of those departments, and the instruction is given, with but few exceptions, by members of those faculties.

There are no formal requirements for admission to the summer session and its courses are open to all persons qualified to pursue them to advantage.

In a general way the courses offered may be classified as follows: undergraduate courses, intended for students regularly matriculated in other colleges or in this university; graduate courses designed for students qualified to enroll for a higher degree; special or technical courses for teachers, librarians, engineers, lawyers, and physicians in active practice; and special courses for college entrance.
