Local Option Convention.

In pursuance to the call issued the local option forces of Iosco county met at the court house in this city Tuesday and organized for another fight on the question next spring.

Delegates were present from nearly every township and city and all seemed to be anxious to again make the effort to put Iosco County in the dry column. The meeting was presided over by H. K. Loud, of AuSable, and W. H. Price, of Whittemore, acted as secretary. Mr. Rood, representing the Michigan Anti-Saloon League was present to assist in the organization.

After a thorough discussion of the matter, it was voted to organize for the campaign of 1911, and the following officers were elected:

Chairman—H. K. Loud, AuSable.
Secretary—W. H. Price, Whittemore.
Treasurer—C. T. Prescott, Tawas City.

These officers were named as the executive and finance committee.

An auditing committee was appointed consisting of N. C. Hartingh, J. H. Nisbet and F. F. French.

Nearly \$1000 was pledged by the delegates present to start the campaign. The organization is known as the Iosco County Anti-Saloon League, and will work in co-operation with and under the direction of the state organization.

Primary Election.

The primary election system now in vogue places upon every voter a greater responsibility than he has heretofore experienced, for instead of sending delegates to a convention and trusting to those delegates to do the right thing after a full discussion of the men or measures at issue, as was previously the case, each voter must settle every issue in his own mind and cast his vote accordingly at the primary election to be held September 6th. It is therefore expedient that every man who is enrolled for the primary should be studying the men who are candidates, sifting their records for good or ill, and determining honestly what is the right thing to do when primary day comes.

The Ordinary Man.

The ordinary man ordinarily receives only ordinary wages. The extraordinary man gets the extraordinary income. People generally get about what they reach out for; what they work for; what they hustle for—not what they long for, whine for and grumble for. The lion that plants himself on a rock and roars won't catch any gazelles. The polar bear with his haunches frozen to an iceberg is not in the best position to pick peaches. He must thaw off and loosen up and get a move on if he wants a mess of fish. No man ever got rich by holding down a dry goods box. The arms of this good, great world are wide spread to welcome the honest, energetic hustler.—Ex.

The Age of the People.

These are glorious days for the independent voter. The reversal of sentiment in New York and Massachusetts, as indicated by two special congressional elections, gather with the indications of growing progressive sentiment in California, Ohio, Pennsylvania and even Colorado; the fearless and free expression of right political principles by the republicans of South Dakota, Iowa and Nebraska—and lastly the great victory in Kansas. These are all indications of the success of the assault of the people upon the citadels of Greed.

Yes, Joe Cannon and his kind must go. They are out of date. They belong to the past. The age of the people is here. Like the athlete who finds his strength growing as he increases the strain upon his tendons—so will the wisdom of the individual voter grow with the new responsibilities that are placed upon him.—Lansing Journal.

The Country School Teacher.

Can you give an account of the Toledo War and describe its importance. You will not find it mentioned in the index of Woodrow Wilson's History of the American People for example; but the school commissioners want to know. What must be the diameter of a cylindrical tank whose depth is five feet five inches, to hold five hundred fifty-two and a half gallons? Do the industries of a locality change and if so give the reasons?

Out of twenty examples in mental arithmetic—such as, one hundred and twelve is eight-fifths of how many times nine?—How many can you do in twenty minutes? Can you illustrate a compound complex—declarative—sentence.

The above are culled from one hundred and thirty-five questions which candidates for second-grade teachers' certificates are supposed to answer. Any one who answers most of them correctly can get a job teaching youngsters the alphabet and the multiplication table in a country school at thirty-five dollars a month. Obviously, compound-complex declarative sentence and finding the diameter of a cylinder of a certain depth and capacity are the merest dry bones of pedagogy. The only earthly reason why anybody would wish to know them is that he can't teach a country school unless he does.

Having duly qualified himself by storing this dusty rubbish in his brain—or rather she—walks a mile and a half through the snow, builds her fires empties her ashes, instructs Class B that two times two are four,

and for doing she receives about a dollar per diem. Which is more or less like telling a person that if he will learn to recite Deuteronomy backwards in the original he shall have a bright new cent at Christmas.—Saturday Evening Post.



Johnston, field man, will attend each of these meetings, and the bureau is anticipating much benefit for all parties concerned.

These local associations of business men, and development organizations for the benefit of the particular locality are of vast assistance in the work of the development bureau. Furthermore, they are a good movement as they place themselves in a position to take advantage of the work done by the bureau.

Secretary Marston wishes to state that if any church society, club, or association desires to assist in the work of the development bureau toward the betterment of Northeastern Michigan, and at the same time secure a little money for their society, that they write the secretary at Bay City for information.

The Bay City Cold Storage & Produce Co. has agreed to accept and care for free of charge all fruit shipped to the bureau for exhibition at the fair this fall. Shipping tags will be sent by the secretary of the bureau to anyone having products which they wish to send for exhibition. The plan is to have everything sent to Bay City and then shipped in refrigerator cars to the fair. Products will thus arrive en masse instead of in odds and ends. The bureau has asked for free transportation of the articles intended for exhibition. The D. & M. has granted the request and the others are expected to follow suit.
