The Presque Isle County Fair opens at Millersburg next Wednesday, September 7 and continues through the 8th and 9th. It promises to exceed all previous fairs in exhibits, attractions and attendance. More interest in exhibits is being taken by farmers this year than in previous years and a much larger entry list is in sight. Special attractions in the way of a balloon ascension every day, the Onaway city band and ball games have been arranged.

Bro. Gallagher, of the Frankenmuth News, last week issued a most excellent 16 page illustrated edition, giving a history of the settlement of that township in 1845 by 15 hardy Germans, and the building up of the largest Lutheran congregation in the country, as well as the development of one of the finest townships in the state. The special edition was issued in commemoration of the 65th anniversary of the organization of the St. Lorenz church, the home of the largest Lutheran congregation in this country, having a total of 2220 communicants.

Drowned off Tawas Point.

William H. Turcott, of Oscoda, was drowned off Tawas Point Monday night when the gasoline fish boat in which he was sailing was swamped. It seems that the young man with two others came to East Tawas Monday forenoon and that Turcott left there alone to return at about 1 o'clock Monday night. The life saving crew found the wreck of the boat in the breakers about 300 yards south of the fog station, but no trace of the occupant could be found. The life saving crew have spent much time since grappling for the body, but without success. The young man was about 24 years of age and the son of Joseph Turcott, the well-known foundryman, of Oscoda.

1910 Census.

According to the census figures issued last Saturday Michigan has a population of 2,810,173, a gain of 389,191, or 16.1 per cent over the figures of 1900. The larger portion of the gain has been made by the cities, 26 of the agricultural counties showing losses.

Isco county's population is given at 9,753, as compared with 10,246 in 1900, a loss of 493. This loss, as is the case with many of the shore counties, is caused by the removal of the saw mills. Arenac county has 9,640, or 181 less than 10 years ago. Ogemaw county has 8,907, a gain of 142, while Alcona has 5,793, a gain of 12. While the figures on city and country gain and loss in these counties has not yet been issued it will beyond doubt show that the losses have occurred in the towns while the farming population has increased.

Tawas City Schools.

All third grade pupils will report at the Central or High school building.

The Normal does not open until Oct. 3. We have had many letters of inquiry concerning board and room. Have you any spare rooms?

We have all of last year's teachers with us again and so expect a very successful year. We expect to do work from the first day and every day thereafter. There will be work enough in each grade to keep all busy.

All pupils for first and second grades as well as beginners who live east of the street running by Mr. Armstrong's store and Mr. Hamilton's store, the Methodist and Baptist churches will be expected to attend the Ward school.

One of the chief requirements for entering the Normal is that the candidate has completed the work of grades 9 and 10. No one can be admitted who has not done the work of these grades. The Department at Lansing expect us to enforce this ruling.

School is a business and no pupil should consider it as anything else. It is not a place for idleness nor for play. Do the work of the grade and let the next grade alone. You will be kept busy if you do it well. Our high school is prepared this year to do better work than last year, and we expect to do it.

New Congressman.

Washington, August 29.—Whether Michigan shall gain in its representation in congress because of its 16 per cent, increase in population will depend on the basis of population which may be fixed.

At present, with a population of 2,420,932, the state has twelve members, which gives a large fraction of almost a hundred thousand over the number necessary to carry that number of congressmen. If the basis should remain as at present the fraction and the gain in population combined would entitle it to a membership of 14.

With an increase of the base to 2,900,000, which is the most probable figure the state would fall 50,000 short of the number necessary to bring the representation up to 13; but with a majority fraction amounting to more than 170,000, there could be little doubt that an increase of one would be allowed.

Col. Loud's Platform

To the Voters of the Tenth Congressional District:

It is perhaps opportune that I take occasion to briefly enunciate my position upon questions of national and state concern which affect the interests of the people.

I believe the tariff should measure the difference between the cost of production in this country and foreign countries to protect home labor, but nowhere to create monopolies or promote "special interests." I believe the burden of national expenditures should be so adjusted as to be borne upon the shoulders of those best able to bear the same and not to oppress the common people.

The conservation of our national resources is vital to the future welfare of the nation, and if re-elected I shall, in the future as in the past, give most earnest and cordial support to this great work which is absorbing the attention of the government of the nation and the states and the people in general.

I favor such legislation as will restrict the centralization of the wealth of the country in a few hands, and any laws which may be formulated to that end and to promote the general diffusion of the wealth created from the resources of the nation in such form as will confer the greatest benefits among the masses, will command my hearty support.

The resources of the nation should be fostered and the policy of ex-president Roosevelt as formulated at the conferences of governors of the states at Washington during his administration, should in my judgment, be adhered to in order that the beneficial results of these policies may be continued and extended as they may further develop.

I favor such legislation regarding the finances of the nation as will afford the fullest possible elasticity to the currency circulation, and to avoid future monetary troubles which produce business depression caused by stringency of the circulating medium.

I am heartily in favor of federal supervision of public service corporations to the end that the people may not be burdened by unjustly excessive charges, especially such as apply to railway, express, sleeping car, telegraph and telephone charges. The action last week of the Illinois Railroad and Warehouse Commission in ordering a sweeping reduction in the rates charged by the big express companies doing business in that state, meets my cordial approval and in my judgment this should be extended throughout the country. The enormous dividends recently declared by express and sleeping car companies fully justify reasonable reductions.

I also favor such laws as will remedy the evil of excessive capitalization and watering of stocks of corporations to the end that small investors may be more amply protected in their rights and receive a fair share of the results of their investments.

I believe in a navy commensurate with the dignity of our country, adequate to amply protect our flag and citizenship at home and abroad, and to maintain a position that will command the respect of other nations, that being the surest guarantee of the preservation of peace; not rivaling in size that of Great Britain, but equal at least to that of the other great powers. To this end I have cordially worked in harmony with the policies of the administrations of President Roosevelt and his successor, and it was this course that brought to me from President Roosevelt the honor of conferring upon one of the nation's greatest battleships the name of "Michigan."

I have earnestly advocated the removal from the mud in Havana harbor of the wreck of the battleship Maine, and the return to her native land for honorable Christian burial in Arlington cemetery such of the remains as may be found of the sixty-three patriotic American seamen who have since 1896 been entombed within the steel sides of that ship.

The policy of adequate improvement to the rivers, harbors and waterways of the country has been long fixed and is generally approved by the people, and I believe this should be continued to the end that they may best serve our steadily increasing commerce, and to not only be competitive in freight charges, but to the fullest possible extent avoid congested railway business consequent upon our increasing population and expanding internal traffic. The appropriation of \$685,000 for the permanent deepening and improvement of the channel of the Saginaw river from its mouth up a distance of some twenty miles, for which I have given most strenuous effort, is in harmony with this policy, serving as it will not only the present but generations yet to come.

While I admire the rugged personality and recognize the long and useful service in congress of Speaker Cannon, I have believed that a change in the speakership of the next House of Representatives will best serve the purposes of the Republican party and the country, tend to promote harmony instead of discord, and such reorganization of the house leadership effected as will more fully distribute the power which has so long been vested in the hands of the few.

I would most heartily approve of the adoption of a rule which would make any member of the house ineligible more than two terms for speaker, thus preventing the speaker from effecting an organization in the house for the purpose of perpetuating himself in the chair.

I am strenuously opposed to the Cuban reciprocity treaty or any other treaty of like nature with a foreign country which is calculated to work injury to the development of the beet sugar industry in the United States.

I have earnestly opposed the application of the International Fisheries treaty between the United States and Canada to the fisheries in the waters of Saginaw Bay, and shall continue to do so. I have sought, and believe that I have obtained an extension of the boundaries in Saginaw Bay as affected by this treaty to also include the shore lines north and south of that bay, for the better protection of the fishermen on the Lake Huron shore from the obnoxious features of that treaty.

I believe in appropriations for public buildings and that as rapidly as the financial conditions warrant this policy of public building facilities should be extended to the smaller as well as the larger cities.

I am thoroughly in harmony with the most generous recognition of the inestimable services of the patriotic soldiers in the Civil and Spanish-American wars in the matter of pension appropriations. I have cordially supported this policy in congress and shall continue to do so.

I am in favor of the most liberal policy in the extension of the mail service of the country, and approve of the establishment of a parcels post system from the originating point of the rural delivery route to patrons living thereon.
