List of Vacant Government Land in State of Michigan.

The annual report of the United States land office contains a table showing the acreage of vacant government land in each of the counties of the state. Demand for this land by homesteaders and under the timber and stone act has been less the past twelve months than in former years, but from the large amount of land open for settlement in some of the counties, it would seem that there are still some desirable quarter sections to be had. The land office cannot give specific descriptions of any of this vacant land, but plats showing their exact location are furnished at \$1 per government township. The acreage by townships is as follows:

New Money Order Form to be Used.

Postmaster Toyatt expects shortly to receive a series of new money orders, which are a great improvement over the old. The new order will come into general use after January of the coming year. The new order is a great saver of time inasmuch as it does away with the old white device or duplicate which used to be retained by the issuing office and mailed to the paying office. The elimination of this feature alone saves \$45,000 in envelopes, besides the extra time taken in sending the advice.

The next order is about as long as the ordinary bank check and consists of three parts, a slip which is retained by the purchaser, and payee. The order proper simply says the "postmaster of etc., will pay the postmaster of." This is signed by the receiver and serves as a receipt. Formerly the advice was kept on file and if the order did not come, notice was sent of the non-receiving. Or perhaps the postmaster as in the case, in smaller cities, did not send the advice, then the receiving postmaster could not enter the orders as paid simply retaining the canceled orders as cash.

Now it does not make any difference when the order is presented, the minute it is done the whole operation of clerical procedure is finished.

The clerks are well pleased with it and the government saves \$45,000 in supplies and an inestimable amount of time of clerks which was used up under the old system.
