How Thackeray Worked.

If ecarte is to be held responsible for Thackeray's appearance as an author, his erratic methods of work contributed equally to his early death. He wrote invariably with the printer's devil in attendance.

"I can conceive nothing more harassing in the literary way," wrote Motley to his wife in 1858, "than Thackeray's way of living from hand to mouth. I mean in regard to the way he furnishes food to the printer's devil. Here he is just finishing the number that must appear in a few days. Of course, whether ill or well, stupid or fertile, he must produce the same amount of fun, pathos or sentiment. His gun must be regularly loaded and discharged at command. I should think it would wear his life out."

Art Leads Language and Science.

The fact is that art is working far ahead of language as well as of science, realizing for us, by all manner of suggestions and exaggerations, effects for which as yet we have no name; nay, for which we may never perhaps have a direct name, for the reason that these effects do not enter very largely into the necessities of life. Hence alone is that suspicion of vagueness that often hangs about the purpose of a romance; it is clear enough to us in thought; but we are not used to consider anything clear until we are able to formulate it in words, and analytical language has not been sufficiently shaped to that end. . . . It is not that there is anything blurred or indefinite in the impression left with us, it is just because the impression is so very definite after its own kind, that we find it hard to fit it exactly with the expressions of our philosophical speech.—Robert Louis Stevenson.

When ironing starched clothes, if the iron is dipped quickly into cold water each time when taken from the stove the starch will never stick and the clothes iron smooth and so quickly you hardly realize you're started before you're done.

Powdered boracic acid sprinkled on lace yoke or collar, then laid away for a day or two, then well shaken out, will remove the soil.

Fasten firmly at the center of back tape or ribbon, which is run through beading in underwear. This keeps it from being pulled half out or lost entirely in laundering.

Linon pieces should never be put through the wringer if you would avoid the little wrinkles that are so hard to press out. Small tucks will iron smoother and look better if ironed on the wrong side. If knit wear, bath towels, etc., when taken from the lines are smoothed with the hands and put on the bars to air, will be ready to put away by the time the bars are needed, for the ironed clothes. To avoid the unsightly fold so often seen on top of a sleeve of starched shirt waists, fold at the seam, from the upper, then the lower side, not letting the iron within an inch or two of the edge; then open the sleeve, fold with the unironed part in the center of the sleeve and press carefully.

Delicious Dessert.

Cut even slices of bread not less than one day old, butter and stack three or four high. Heat fruit juice left from canned fruit or melt a glass of jelly, adding enough water to cover the bread which has been placed in a dish deep enough that the liquid can cover the bread. Have the liquid hot and let it stand on bread until thoroughly soaked and then allowed to get cold. Turn bread out on plate and slice like layer ice cream. Serve with plain or whipped cream. When canning fruit it is a good plan to put any surplus juice in pint cans for this purpose.

Hungarian Goulash.

Cut one pound of good round steak into inch cubes and add an equal quantity of thinly sliced onion. Put one-half cup butter into a large saucepan and when it bubbles put in the meat and onion. Let it brown slightly, then stew slowly for three hours, or until the meat is tender. Do not add water, as the juice from the meat and onion will make a gravy. One-half hour before it is done add salt, paprika, and a little stewed tomato. Be sure to add entire amount of onion. Is none too much.

Corn Pudding.

Scrape half a dozen ears of corn, beat two eggs together, add half a teaspoonful of salt and a tablespoonful of sugar and mix with the corn kernels. Stir in one and a half cups of milk and pour the whole into a pudding dish. Bake the mixture two hours and serve as a vegetable.

Water Sponge Cake.

One egg, one-half cup sugar, one-half teaspoon lemon juice, three table-spoons cold water, two-thirds cup flour with one even teaspoon baking powder. Beat yolk, add sugar, and beat again; add lemon juice and water, then flour, lastly the white of egg beaten stiff.

Holy Roman Empire.

The Holy Roman empire, or German-Roman empire, began with Charles the Great, king of the Franks, who was crowned emperor of the west in 800. He proclaimed himself the representative of the ancient Roman emperors and asserted theoretical authority over the nations of west and central Europe. This empire was called holy because of the interdependence of the empire and the church. In general it comprised the German-speaking nations of central Europe and had for a long time a close relationship with Italy.

According to one authority the Holy Roman empire was in reality the German-Italian empire established by Otto I, the Saxon king who was crowned in Rome by Pope John XII, on February 2, 962.

At best this empire of history was ideal rather than real. It never actually existed in the form of a genuine central government, fully recognized by those within its boundaries.

A Good Thing! Push It!

The Gladwin Record says: "T. F. Marston, secretary of the Northeastern Development Bureau, will appear before the board of supervisors Friday afternoon to ask that Gladwin county become a member of the bureau. This organization is less than a year old, and already is working wonders in advertising this part of Michigan. The recent exhibit at the state fair has done more to attract attention in this direction than any one thing that ever happened, and the exhibit to be made at the big land show in Chicago will be of much greater importance. It behooves Gladwin county to get into the band wagon and help boost.

The Clare County Cleaver, in speaking of the work of the bureau, in a recent issue said:

"The experience of recent years proves beyond reasonable doubt that co-operation will accomplish more than individual effort. The raisin industry of California, the tobacco growers of Kentucky, the several fruit and vegetable marketing associations throughout the entire United States have accomplished more in this manner and with less effort than has ever before been deemed possible. We would further hazard the guess that more has been accomplished for Clare county with the \$200 paid the Northeastern Development Bureau than for five times the amount spent in individual displays at the state fair. More tangible results have been obtained by a single season's united effort than have been seen before in all the years that the products of the district have been scattered through the exhibition building. It is to be hoped that at the coming session the county legislature will not be so short sighted as to overlook the good already done. A healthy sized appropriation for the continuation of the work would be about the proper thing for the good of the county."

The Saginaw News says: "The bureau is doing splendid and effective work. One of the best strokes of advertising consisted of an exhibition at the state fair of the products of this part of Michigan which up to comparatively recent date was known as a worthless pine barrens." How does it strike people who have lived and prospered here, to continually hear this harping about "pine barrens?" Now is the time to help the bureau change this impression which so many people hang to so tenaciously even in Saginaw.

E. W. Gallagher, editor of the Frankenth News, after attending the Northeastern press meeting at Cheboygan, said of the possibilities of this part of the state: "We must say that the trip opened our eyes to the fact that the half has not been told even by its enthusiastic boosters. The once thought to be worthless lands are bringing forth fine crops, and in a few years this portion of the state will blossom into fine farms." And this is a sample of impressions no farther distant than Saginaw which a little effort would change as Mr. Gallagher's notions were changed. And the county would benefit thereby.

The Great American Can.

To the Malay peninsula every year go about 1,300,000 one-gallon tin cans, containing American petroleum. Thousands of the cans are used as water buckets. The interior of a Mejar, a Tamil, or a Chinese home contains American tin cans of all sizes and shapes, put to some useful purpose. Sieves are made by puncturing holes. Thousands of dust pans are made from the cans by removing one side, curving two sides and attaching a large wooden handle. Baking and cooking utensils of all kinds are also skillfully manufactured from them and may be seen in thousands of homes.

For storing articles of food against ant onslaughts the tin can is a blessing. Hundreds of men are engaged in manufacturing tin cans into funnels, pepper and salt casters, cocoanut and nutmeg graters, lamps, biscuit tins, tea and coffee pots, ladies, mugs, cake patties, Chinese pipes, oil pumps, money boxes and the framework for false teeth.

So necessary has the American tin can become to these people that to be deprived of its manifold uses would cause a real hardship.—Consul-General DuBois, Singapore.

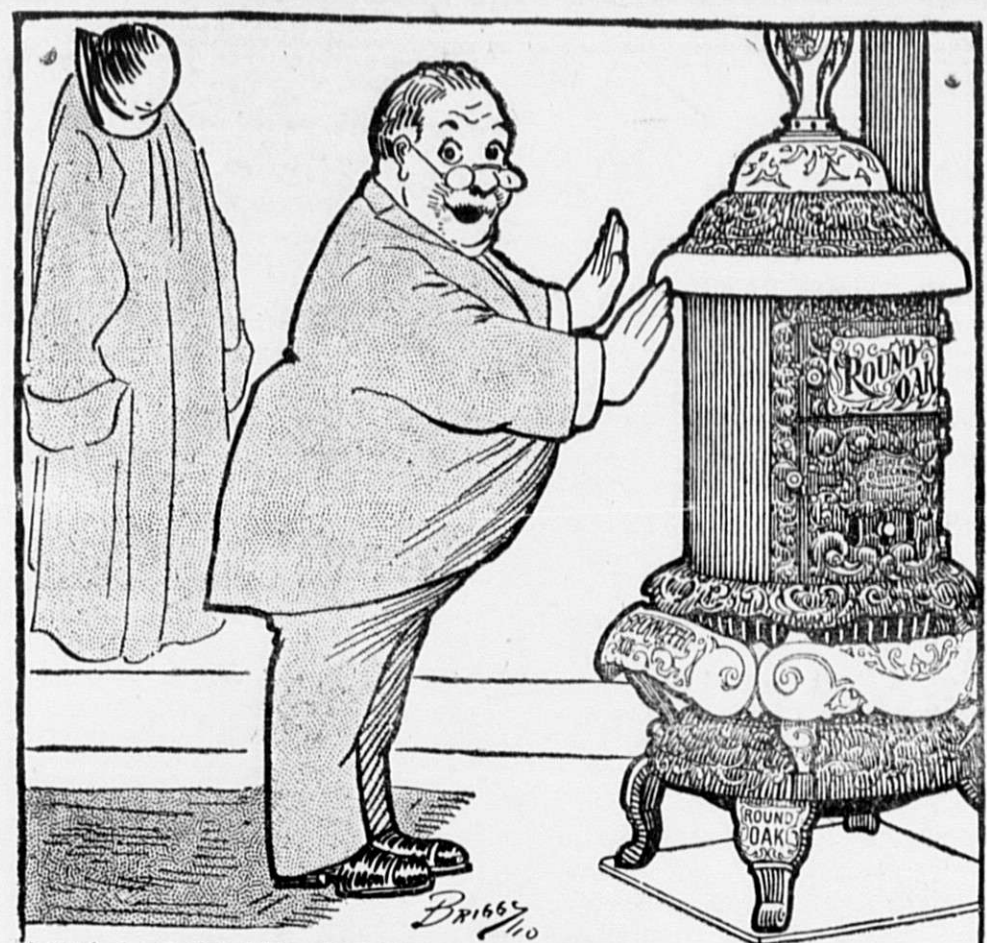

ALABASTER SCORCHED.

The U. S. Gypsum Company Mill and Warehouses Destroyed by Fire Last Sunday.

About 2 o'clock last Sunday afternoon the United States Gypsum Co.'s mill at Alabaster, six miles south of this city, was discovered to be on fire and was entirely destroyed, together with the large store houses and the barn. There were several hundred tons of manufactured plaster in the warehouses awaiting shipment, and the loss on the mill and stock will reach nearly \$225,000. There was considerable insurance on the plant and stock.

How the fire started is a question, but it is supposed to have been caused by hot plaster. The watchman had been thru the mill but a few minutes previous and had not noticed any fire, but when discovered it had gained such headway and burned so fiercely that all efforts were without avail, notwithstanding the prompt arrival of men and the fact that they have excellent water supply.

Superintendent T. F. Robinson informs us that what will be done relative to rebuilding the plant will not be known until the officials have arrived and the insurance adjusters have made their reports. It is generally believed, however, that a new mill will be built with the least possible delay.

The plant furnished employment to upwards of 200 men in the year round, practically all of whom are now out of employment. The destruction of the plant will be felt in the Tawasess, as many of the men reside in these cities, besides being the trading points for the larger portion of the residents of that village.

The Alabaster quarry is one of the largest and best gypsum deposits in the country and notwithstanding that it has been opened for about 40 years, but a small portion of the rock has been removed. During the past few years very extensive improvements had been made in the mill, as well as in the mode of handling rock, making it one of the best plaster plants in the country.

East Tawas Lecture Course.

Arrangements have been completed whereby a Lecture Course will be given at East Tawas, this fall and winter. A committee of the citizens of that city has signed the contract and become responsible for the course and tickets are being sold for same.

The course will consist of four numbers which will be given on the following dates, October 29, December 14, January 12, and February 8.

The first number will be given by Miss De Barie Gill, harpist and reader Saturday evening, Oct. 29, at the Opera House.

The price of the course has been placed at \$1 for adults and 50 cents for school children. The price of reserved seats for either class of tickets has been placed at 25 cents for the entire course. Arrangements have been made with Henry Hanson and the reservation of seats will be made on October 24, commencing at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. It is hoped that this venture will be successful as the continuation of the course depends upon the success of this one. Any profits realized out of this course will be used in the library fund of the high school.

Rescued by Tawas Life Savers.

While sailing from East Tawas to the light house early last Monday night in company with First Assistant Brown, of Tawas Light, our little boy Andrew, and niece, Mrs. Wm. Deckert of Sturgeon Point, our boat was caught in a fierce squall about 2 1/2 miles from town and but for the prompt action of Capt. Brown and his handling of the boat, escaped capsizing or being wrecked on the shore.

As it was we had to lay at anchor in a heavy sea with the storm raging for two hours until it subsided and the night being so dark and stormy keen anxiety was felt at the light house for our safety, as our boat was known to have left Tawas, so Capt. Martin Small and his brave crew of life savers launched their lifeboat and went in search of us and soon picked us up wet and cold but safe and very glad to go in the lifeboat and be safely landed at the lighthouse dock.

We are deeply thankful to Capt. Small and his crew for coming to our assistance and landing us safely, and our appreciation of the life saving service is doubly increased by this experience.—Port Austin News.

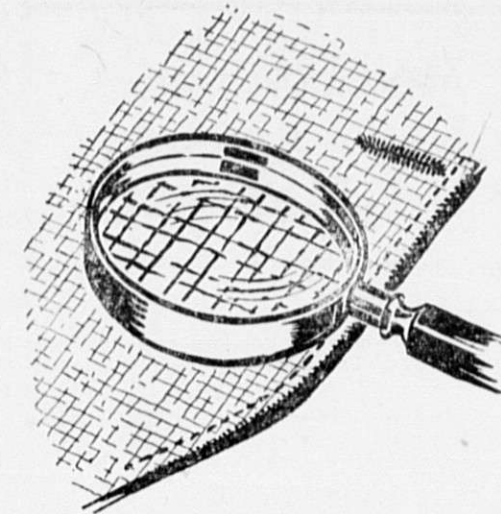

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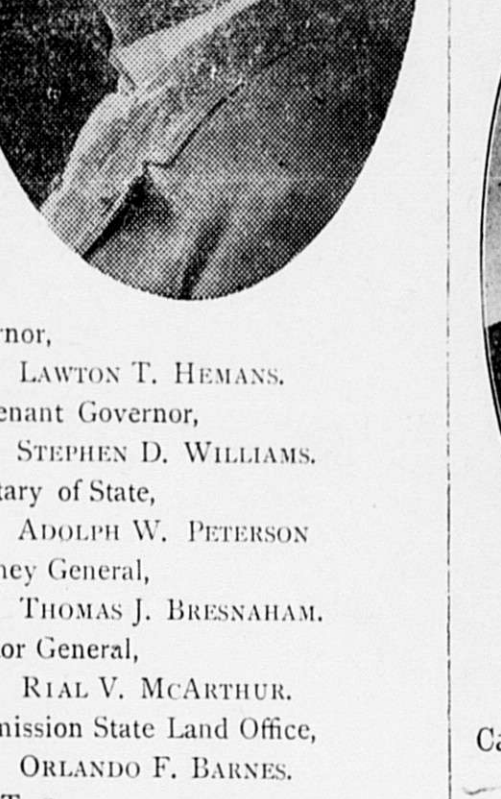
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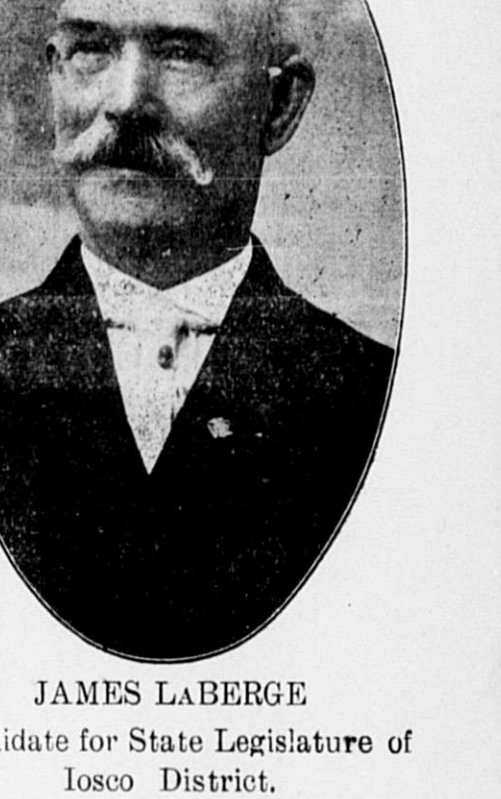
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
