In its issue of Oct. 29, the Chicago Packer produces a "Potato Map" of the United States showing the average crop of potatoes in each state during the past ten years. New York leads with an average of 34 million bushels, Michigan comes second, yielding 22 million bushels. Wisconsin is third, having 21 million. These are followed in order by Pennsylvania, 20 million, Maine 16 million, Iowa 14 million, Illinois 13 million, Ohio 13 million, and Minnesota 11 million. These are the only states whose average yield exceeds ten million bushels per year.

### James M. Walker.

Died at his home, in this city, Thursday, November 3, 1910, James M. Walker, aged 69 years, 8 months and 12 days.

The deceased was born at Pine Creek, Armstrong county, Penn., February 22, 1841. His father died when he was 11 years old, and being the eldest child much of the care of the family fell upon him. His boyhood thus spent in caring for others taught him habits of industry and economy. At fifteen he united with the Baptist church, and at 20 was ordained a deacon by Rev. C. H. Prescott, and served some church in that capacity until his death.

He enlisted in Co. A, 61st Penn. Infantry in 1861 and served during the war, participating in the battles of Fair Oaks, Seven Pines, Malvern Hill, Wilderness, Antietam, Fredricburg, Gettysburg and many others. He was wounded at Matvers Hill.

In April, 1865, he was united in marriage to Mary E. Fairbanks, who with the five children born of this union, survive him. The children are Edward and Ernest, of Sault Ste. Marie, Herbert of New York City, Richard, of Raber, and Miss Edyth, a teacher in the city schools at Jackson.

A gentleman ever courteous in speech, and thoughtful for the comfort and happiness of others, Mr. Walker was highly esteemed by a large circle of acquaintances. He has been a resident of this city for nearly 30 years, all of which time he has been in the employ of C. H. Prescott.

The memorial services at the Baptist church last Sunday were largely attended, and the tributes to the memory of the deceased by his comrades of the Grand Army and his neighbors, eloquently told of the high esteem in which he was held by those who knew him best.

### The Dairy Cow.

The dairy cow does more than bring financial success to the dairy farmer. She makes him a better citizen than he would otherwise be. Her influence upon home conditions is a most pleasing contribution to those factors which are responsible for the changed conditions which prevail in the farm homes of today. Thousands of these homes are now characterized by comfort and happiness where formerly they were blighted by drudgery and unhappiness.

Better financial conditions have contributed to those change, and the dairy cow has been in no small measure responsible. She has contributed in still another way. The dairy cow teaches kindness. Her owner soon learns that only by treating her kindly can secure the highest possible returns from her, and she responds quickly to the kind words and proper care. Her disposition is one that the human family might well emulate. She is patient and long suffering, acquiescing mutely in the arrangements made by her owner for carrying on the dairy business, striving at all times to repay him for every effort made for her care and comfort.

The members of the family, as they come in contact with her and her kindly disposition, are influenced for good. As they appreciate the financial benefit to come from caring for her well they take a deeper interest in her, in doing so they unconsciously cultivate those qualities which make them better citizens.

The dairy cow—the prototype of man's best friend—is wielding a greater influence than she is generally credited with. She has always been found in the front ranks in the march of civilization and no agricultural country can long prosper without her. She is a potent factor in the upbuilding of such a country, financially, and socially, and wise people will appreciate her and encourage the industry of which she is the foundation.—The National Dairy Union.

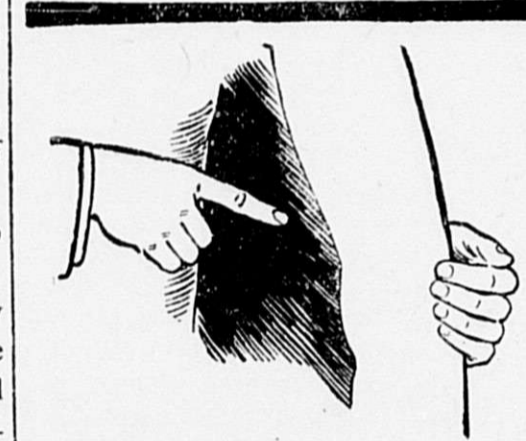

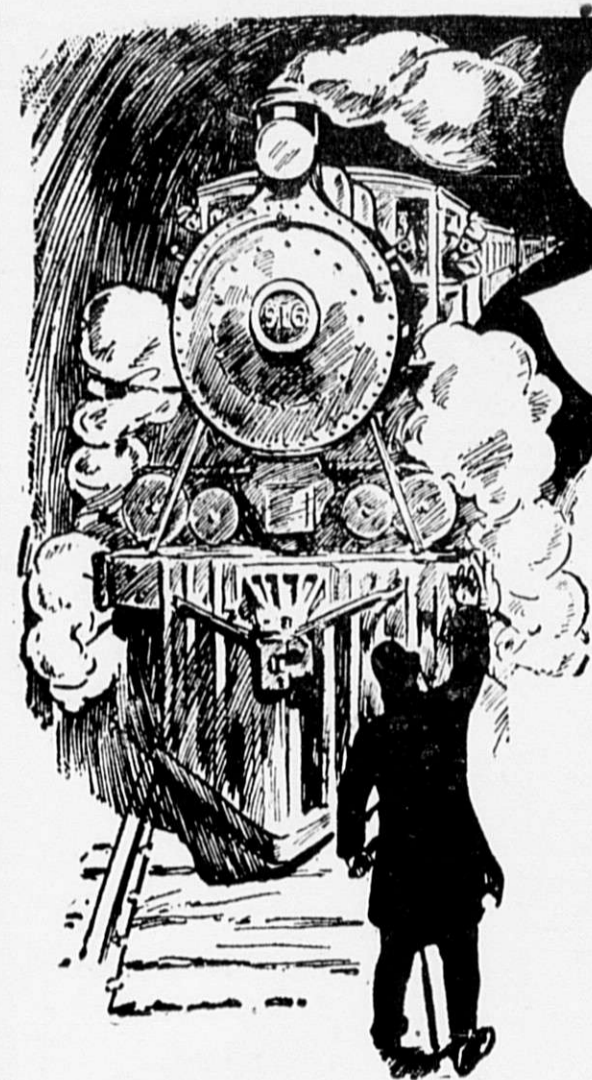

at Blacks corners.

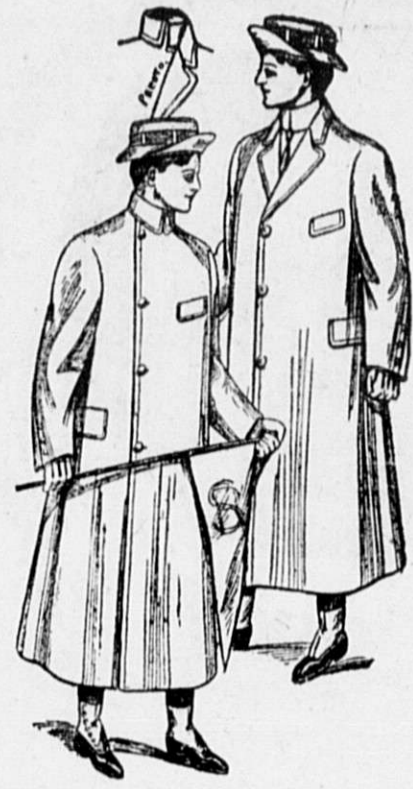
Alex Willett's Point AuGres skunk

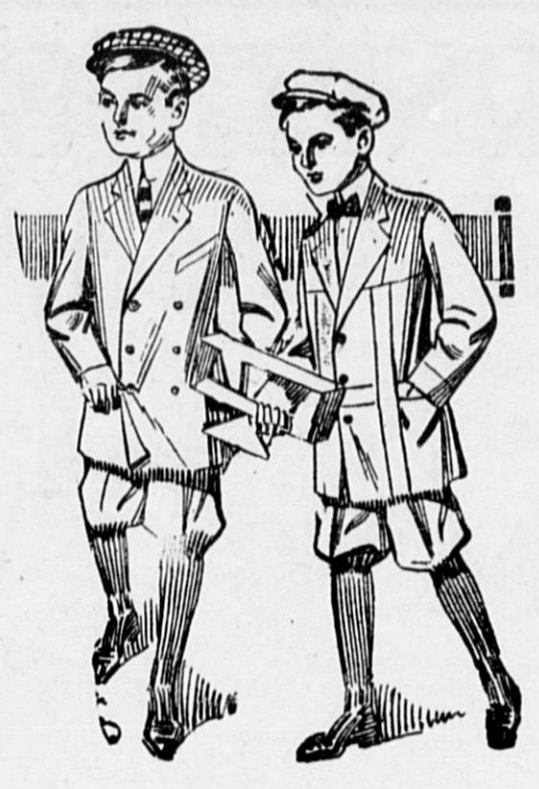

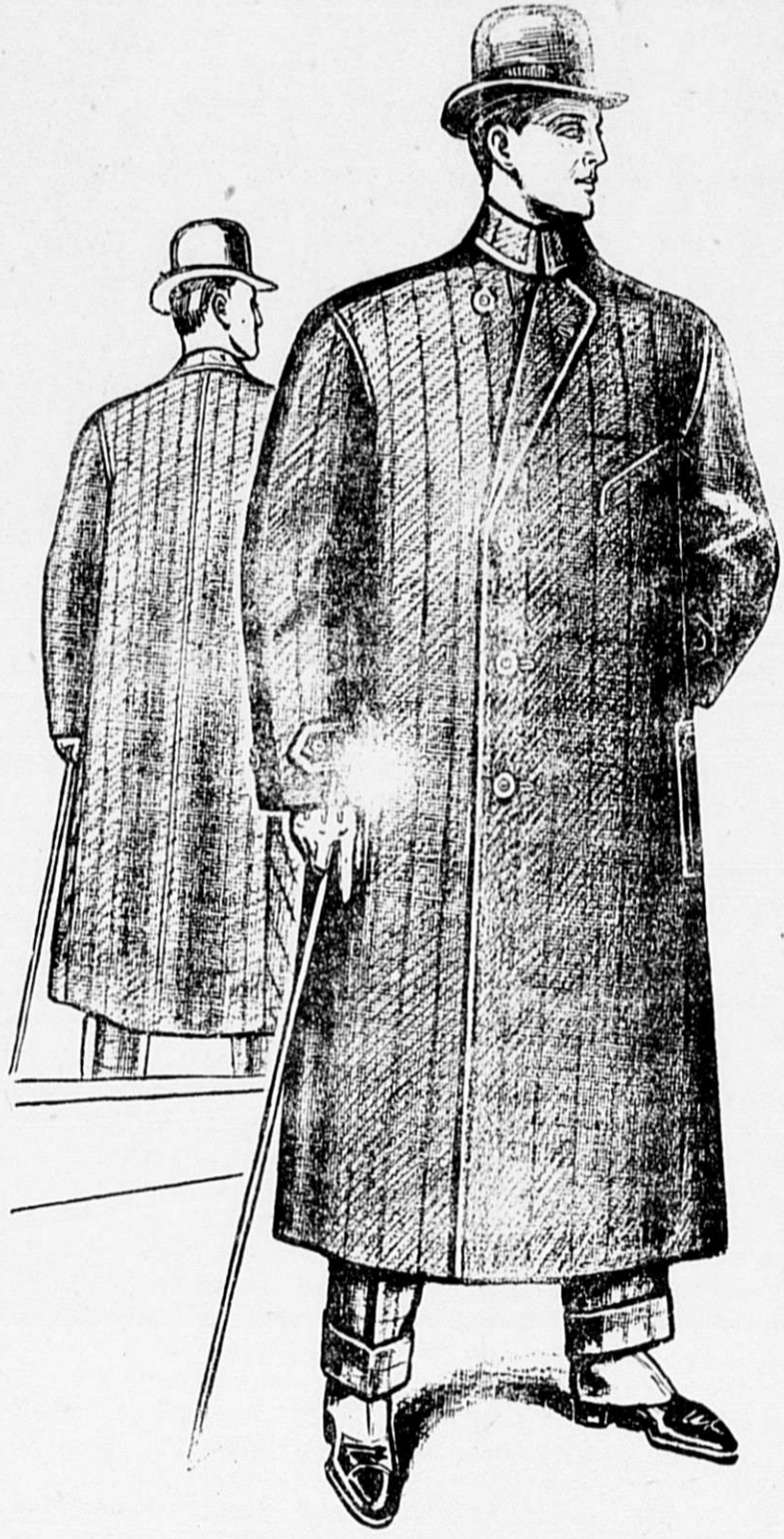
