In its issue of Oct. 29, the Chicago Packer produces a "Potato Map" of the United Sates showing the average crop of potatoes in each state during the past ten years. New York leads with an average of 34 million bushels, Michigan comes second, yielding 22 million bushels. Wisconsin is third, having 21 million.
