

Good Roads A National Issue

neld in Washington last week prove that the question of securing ad quate highways has become as much a national as a local issue. Travelers from European countries have been quoted frequently as marveling that the Americans, eager for improvement in so many fields and far-seeing in pushin projects for the general betterment have permitted their reads to remain disgrace to the nation. It has jurisdiction of federal and state authority no such comprehensive plan of roadbuilding as has been carried in France, Germany and Great Br is possibly here until each comm

It has been suggested that the docume of the 'new nationalism' could properly be extended to building great roads connecting such centers of population as New York and Chicago. While there are sane features to this contention it is better at present to confine the educational propaganda of the dollars and cents value of good roads to the states and counties. Farmers and city dwellers should unite in providing these channels for mutual trade and no time should be wasted in discussing which class benefits the most. The farmer needs good roads to haul his produce to market and the city man benefits by having the way opened for receiving foodstuffs. The automobile, too, has brought home to the municipalities their responsibility for the highways in the surrounding districts and contribute toward their maintenance. That the public is becoming aware of the necessity for better methods and a better plan of improvement is evident by just such instances of awakened interest as this convention in Washington.

Do The Farmers Get Their Share

slowly but surely drawing in their lines toward the formation of an association which will demand more money from the sugar factories for their beets. Bay City has been selected as the place for representatives from the beet growing districts to assemble and put into legal form a state organization. Farmers claim they do not get enough for their time and trouble. The factories say they are getting all they are entitled to a and more.

A sugar factory not more than a thousand miles from Bay City which is capitalized at \$200,000, has since it started running, paid off its bonded indebtedness of about \$400,000 and in the campaign of 1908 paid to its stockholders a dividend of 35 per cent, on the capital stock, while last year it paid a dividend of 40 per cent., besides retaining in the treasury \$75,000 with which to build an addition, the same having been built this year and put into operation for the purpose of working up a by product.

It is announcements of this sort that make the farmers sit up and take notice, and convince them that the slice of pie cut for them ought to be somewhat larger —Bay City Times.

Usually at this point, rapid detorioration commences. Tenant farmers, as a rule, cannot be relied upon to keep up the farm.

It is extinated that nearly 300 young men will avail themselves of the opportunity to occure practical knowledge in a short time in the following shortcourses. 
