Northeastern Michigan at the Land Show.

One of the greatest educational features of a century in the shape of the great land show has just drawn to a close at Chicago.

The different transportation lines, agriculture colleges, state and county bureaus, real estate firms irrigation and reclamation companies, have all joined in showing to a land-hungry public the best they had to offer in their respective sections, as inducement to people to cast aside the grind of the large city and get back to the farm.

Certainly a person would be hard to please and of a very undecided character were he unable to suit himself in all the varied array of products of the land presented for his consideration.

Among the most important exhibits in the building and one which was especially interesting to that class of people actually looking for land for home or investment, was that of the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau. This exhibit occupied eight hundred feet of floor space and contained almost everything that grows in a temperate climate.

Variety was its keynote and the exhibit was composed of products in their state as they come from orchard and farm. This fact brought forth unending expressions of recognition from those seeking information.

They seemed to warm up to the Mr. Squash, Pumpkin, Onion, Potato, Ruta Baga, and Celery in its every day clothes and stopped to yarn with him a bit.

Messrs. Johnson, Buttles, Spencer, Jackson, Benton, Hayward and Pomeroy, the regular bureau crew were on deck to make the introductions, and these men are thoroughly versed on the different localities in northeastern Michigan, a lot of information relative to this district has been imparted to thousands of people.

The clover and alfalfa exhibit attracted a great deal of interest among cattle and sheep growers. These men constitute a class who have watched lands come up in value and who have profited by the unearned increment. They are anxious to find sections where the conditions will enable their sons to do likewise.

The clover seed, pea and bean exhibits attracted market attention, while the representation of the sugar beet and chicory industry caused wonder at the extent of, and importance of these industries.

The different members of the bureau were represented on the floor in several instances, and in interviews expressed themselves as follows: C. W. Comstock, of Lost Nation, Iowa, representing the Michigan Home Colony Co., of Lewiston, Mich., said: "This is certainly a great testimonial for Michigan, while on account of the lack of proper orcharding methods the apples from this part do not show up as well as those from the west, still all that will remedy itself when the fruit growers use the right methods. The strong point about your country is the grasses and forage crops, and I have shown them to a lot of good, strong men from Iowa this week, and they are well impressed. The work of the Bureau is certainly along the right line and should be pushed all along the line especially at such places as the Springfield, Illinois and the Des Moines, Iowa, state fairs."

D. G. Fraser, of Gladwin, Mich., representing Gladwin county, and the individual members of that county says: "I cannot say too much for the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau exhibit, the manner in which it is handled or the good effect it is bound to have upon the public relative to this part of Michigan. The pity is that we had not started sooner and supported an organized publicity movement more liberally. The time has come that we have to get out and tell the world what we have, as it will not come and look unasked."

James A. Welch, representing the Farm Realty Co., of Sandusky, Mich., says: "In my opinion the land show is one of the greatest educations ever brought to the public, and is located at a good point.

The effect of the exhibit on west Michigan is bound to be reenacted on northeastern Michigan the coming year as its exhibit is a creditable one and places that district in line with those sections of the west and south which have been settled and popularized by such publicity measures."

Mr. Slade, circulation manager of the Michigan Farmer, says: "I was here last year and saw the effect on western Michigan through its bureau exhibit. Northeastern Michigan has a very creditable exhibit and is bound to benefit by it. Constant, persistent work along this line is bound to bring results."

C. S. Bliss, of Gladwin, Mich., says: "I have looked over the exhibits at the land show and am well pleased with the showing made by the northeastern Michigan. We have a variety of products necessary for all around farming and stock raising second to none. We will get the apples, too, when we get down to business the same as the western."

Assistant General Passengers Agent Underwood, of the Michigan Central Railroad, says: "You have a very meritorious exhibit, and it is a surprise to a great many people who have hitherto had not dreamed of the possibilities of your part of the state. The bureau work this year has been a very good one in my estimation and well carried out. Continued publicity along this line is bound to bring very satisfactory results."

Chas. E. Greening, of Greening's Nurseries, Monroe, Mich., says: "This exhibit, together with the one made by the bureau at the state fair, is bound to attract a lot of attention of northern Michigan. When people come to know the value of the soils of that section of Michigan as I know them they will be considered among the most valuable in the world. They contain the elements necessary to grow apples of unsurpassed flavor and texture and color can be given them when proper methods of pruning, spraying, etc., are followed."

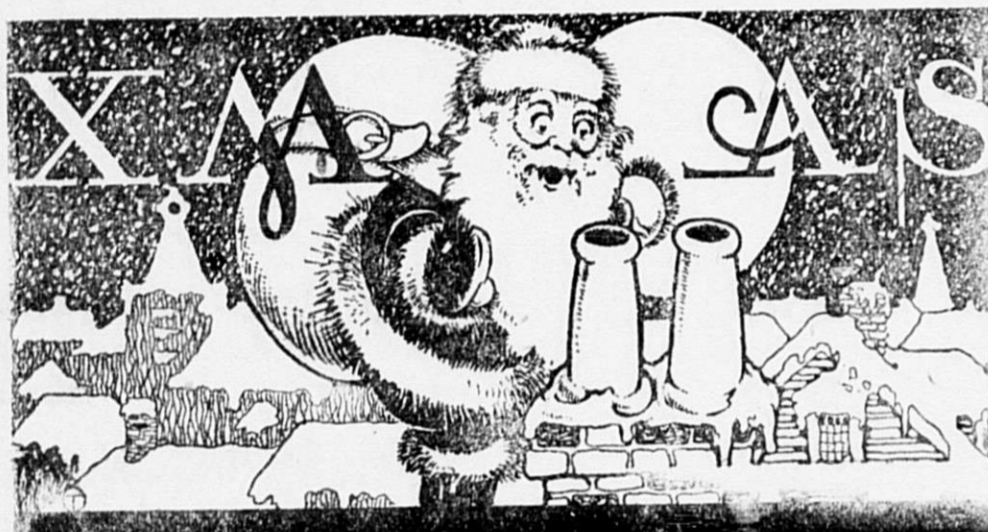

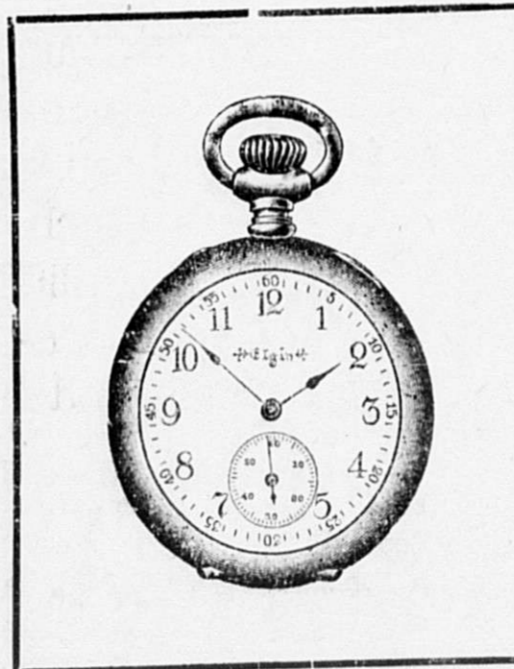

ment Bureau certainly has a good showing here, and it is bound to do a lot of good to our section of Michigan."

H. K. Gustin, of the Gustin Land Co., of Alpena, Mich., says: "It is to be regretted that we are not yet in shape to take our proper place in showing apples. The westerner, owing to his perfect methods is still a long ways in advance of us. It is a question of carrying on a campaign of education along these lines until our fruit growers will get down to business. On other products of the land our section seems to hold its own with any and take the lead of most sections in variety and quality. The bureau work is good and should be carried on persistently."

Mr. Knowliski, representing the Saginaw Valley Land Co., says: "Certainly this is a great show and bound to do good to any section represented. I feel sure my company will be benefited by being on the floor."

O. J. Miller, representing O. J. Miller & Co., says: "I am thoroughly taken up with the work accomplished by the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau. It has already paid me many times for my membership and will do the same for any other member who will follow up the work. Of course, a person must follow up the work of the bureau. They cannot sit back and expect the bureau to do their local work. I am well satisfied."

A. R. Code, land commissioner of the AuSable and Northwestern Railroad, says: "The exhibit is a good one and reflects great credit on the bureau. It is attracting its share of attention and is bound to do a great deal of good for the district."

The Gustin Land Co. and the AuSable and Northwestern Railway each contributed forty acres of agricultural land to be devoted to a bean guessing contest.

These contests created a great deal of interest, and the voting place was constantly crowded to the utmost. To get a farm in Michigan seemed to be the object of thousands.

Michigan certainly is looking good to a lot of people just at this time, and if the present campaign of publicity is continued it is bound to go ahead faster than any of her competitors
