

The fruits of independent voting are about to be reaped, if the promises of Congressman Champ Clark, the future speaker of the new house, that he favors leaving the selection of committees to a committee of the house rather than have the speaker usurp this functiion, as under the old methods, and that he favors the revision of the tariff, a schedule or an item at a time, rather than as a scramble, are to be accepted as an assurance of the performance. Any un easiness that may have existed as to the actions of the democratic congress may well be allayed by these encouraging announcements, coming from the future speaker after earnest conferences with the members-elect of the sixty-second

Congressman Clark proposes to do no nore than has been agreed on all sides should be done, and that had been promised, without fulfillment, by the retiring congress, to make an honest effort to revise the tariff downward, schedule at a time, taking the more fragrant schedules first, and being careful to cause no outward commercial disturbance. That the meat, wool and teel schedules will come in for careful consideration within the next two years s an assured thing. Trusts that are under indicment for violations of the Sherman law thus offer their callous sides to the congressional surgeon, who can operate carefully and leisurely with the scalpel, and without any more tremors on the part of business in genral than business in general now reaps rom trust thumb-screw methods. In this respect the democrats seem to have read aright the mandate of the people.

The first time I ever saw a motley crowd of half-grown pelicans I thought nature had surely done her best to make something ugly and ridiculous. It was a warm day, and the birds stood around with their mouths open, panting like a lot of dogs after a chase, their pouches shaking at every breath. When I went near the youngsters went tottering off on their big webbed feet with wings dragging on this side and that as if they were poorly hand ed crutches. The youngsters huddled together by hundreds in a small place. Those on the outside pushed and climbed to get near the center, till it looked worse than any football scrimmage I ever saw.

In this wide area of low islands and water it was necessary, since we wanted to study the pelicans at close range, to adopt some method of hiding. We took a large wagon umbrella covered with a piece of green canvas, that hung down around the sides. This we planted among the tules at the edge of a large colony, and covered the top well with reeds. The whole vironment, while from the inside the camera man could point his camera out through a narrow slit in the canvas, take pictures and make observa-




