Plans for 1911.

The executive committee of the Northeastern Michigan Development bureau met at Saginaw last Friday and laid out plans for the coming year. The bureau is very well satisfied with its work of last year, having received the endorsement of almost every board of supervisors in the territory. The work of the past year was accomplished under many difficulties and with a limited amount of funds.

It is estimated that it will require Prescott, Jr. Miss Helen Prescott, Allen \$25,000 to carry on the work of the coming year. Of this amount about \$4,000 has been appropriated in membership fees and contributions from the boards of supervisors. Practically all the counties have appropriated their \$200 membership fee, and some of them have given in addition from \$100 to \$800 in the shape of contributions. The remainder of the money is expected to be raised by individual memberships

A bill was endorsed and has been introduced in the senate this week by Senator Foster, of this district, which gives the counties the right to make appropriations for such purposes. The bill is a duplicate of the one in force in California, and provides that a tax of onehalf of one mill may be levied, the total for any one year not to exceed

These little two-by-four Central American revolutions do occasionally result in a little blood-letting in which a general or two gets wounded or perhaps killed. Theoretically those states have a republican form of government patterned largely after our own, but practically they are usually under a dictatorship in which one dictator is supplanted by another with a frequency that prevents monotony.

Too often people take for granted in the home life and without any appreciation for the same, many things which if shown them in the homes of other people would call forth profuse acknowledgement and gratitude. Not unlikely the home life in many instances would be far happier if, instead of taking everything as a matter of course, members of the family would occasionally express appreciation.

It is well to have confidence in others even though occasionally, that confidence may be misplaced. This is far better than being suspicious of every person we meet and of every proposition made. As a rule men are worthy of the confidence reposed in them and the man who reposes that confidence receives that of others in added measure. In truth, without this confidence the whole social and business life of the world would soon come to a standstill.

The ease with which big defrauders of the government (which means big defrauders of the public) manage to escape prison or settle on thirty cents on the dollar, is in striking contrast with grants of land from the government in Judicial Circuit. the equal ease with which small offenders are sent to prison. It reminds one of the story in the play where the rich young thief who forged checks and stole a lady's purse escaped punishment, while a poor, nerveless man who stole the rich young thief's cigaret case received a hard labor sentence.

The believers in medium or large sized families have the authority of science as well as some other things in their favor, for it is learned that in the one-child family only thirteen per cent of children between the ages of two and ten are entirely healthy, while in good sized families sixty-nine per cent are entirely healthy. The reason for this difference is easily seen. In the large or medium families children are necessarily left much to themselves, while the one child in a family is too often pampered, coddled and unnaturally trained.

The Worst Kind of Waste.

And yet financial waste, great as it is is not the worst. A man may get to the end of his money and then financial waste necessarily stops. But the greatest waste is that of energy, strength time and the finer sensibilities, ending at last in moral disaster.

That extravagance in money and extravagance along the other lines mentioned too often go together there are abundant proofs in this present time of great incomes and fortunes. 
