The Board of Supervisors.
The board of supervisors met Monday in compliance with the law, to canvass the votes cast at the local option election on the 3rd inst. A temporary organization was completed by the election of George Sutherland as chairman. A committee was appointed to canvass the votes, and after they had been at work some time it was found that certain errors existed in the returns from Tawas City and Oscoda and it was found necessary to summon the election boards of these two precincts, and an adjournment was taken until Tuesday when the work was completed. The official canvass showed a majority in the county of 70 for local option.
By unanimous consent the board met Tuesday afternoon and organized permanently. Mayor George Sutherland, of AuSable, was elected chairman for the 13th consecutive year. Supervisor Karus, of Baldwin, was elected chairman pro tem. The regular routine of business was then taken up.
An adjournment was taken until Monday, June 26, at which time the board must meet and equalize the tax rolls of the county and make their report to the state board of equalization, which meets in August.

Now to Enforce It.
Local option has carried in Iosco county by a majority of seventy. Now comes the important question of whether we are to have a real prohibition in the county for the ensuing two years or a farce. The most important part of the battle will begin May 1. It is up to the temperance element of the county to see that the law is enforced strictly. A lax enforcement of the law will result in greater harm than the open saloon.
We believe the officers of the county will do their part, but to make a success of the matter every law abiding citizen must do his part, and there should be no shirking by any who have voted in favor of prohibiting the sale of liquor in the county.
There can be no doubt but what "blind-pigs" will be started. "Boot-legging" and all other lines of violation will be attempted. Unless the most stringent effort is put forth by the decent element of the county, these undesirable conditions will exist, and the result will be most deplorable. We believe that with a united effort this can be avoided.
We believe that there are many who did not favor the adoption of local option here who will be found using their best endeavors for an enforcement of the law now it has been adopted.

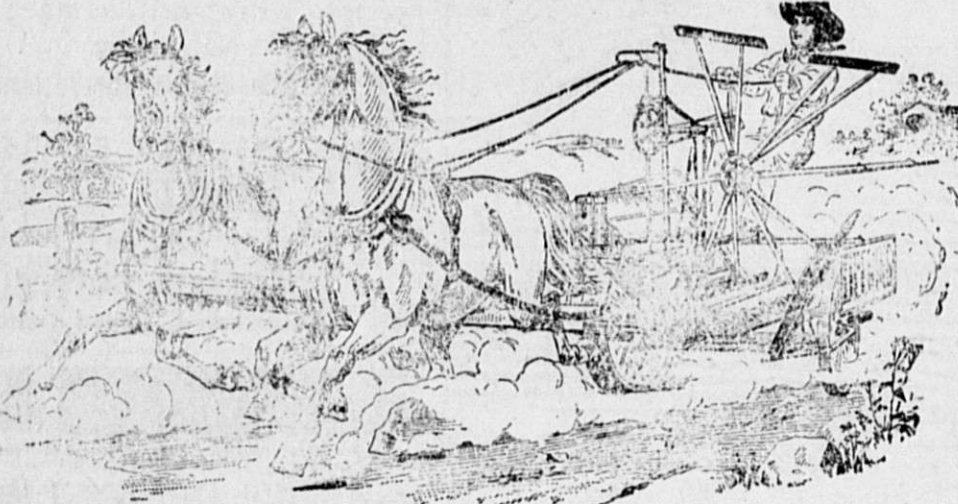



Life would be brighter and more congenial if people were more appreciative and responsive.

The greater the difficulty conquered the greater is the honor of conquest and the influence upon life which it brings.

Temperance reform, like all other reforms, has its ebb and flow, but on the whole it is making steady progress to the very great benefit of all who accept its principles.

The goodness of some people is altogether negative. The most that can be said of them is that they don't do harm. They need to supplement that with a goodness that is positive.

Zion City in Illinois does not seem to be well named. Rival factions and the unlovely names they call each other indicate that peace, goodwill and holiness are conspicuous by their absence.

The church, the school, the local paper—these are the three educative forces in a community, and the way in which they are supported determines the amount of intelligence and morality that prevails.

Some people in their gifts make the doer more conspicuous than the deed. They are not of the class who "do good by stealth, and blush to find it fame," yet the graciousness of a deed lies largely in unobtrusiveness of action.

Those railroads which in the past year have not killed a single passenger deserve full credit for the care, competency and good management which that record shows. What they have done other roads can do by following their example as to equipment, management and consideration.

It is to be hoped that the new congress will not imitate the fault of its predecessors in wasting so much time at the beginning of a session in talk and maneuvering for position. To postpone action until almost the very last usually results in many good measures being crowded to the wall, and in the passage of some obnoxious legislation.

Whatever profit a farmer makes is the honest result of honest and intelligent labor. There is nothing of watered stock about it nor of a combination to stifle competition and unduly raise prices. He competes in the open market and so far from imposing upon his fellows he is far more likely to be imposed upon by middlemen and others who control prices.

To the average man the Holy Synod of Russia seems to be one of the unholiest institutions extant, for it is cruel and intolerant in the extreme. The refusal to allow Jews to adopt Christian given names is born of a spirit that is in direct opposition to that of the Christ whom the Synod professes to love, serve and obey. How true it is that under the Russian skin you find the Tartar.

Perhaps it is true that men cannot be made honest by legislation. But proper legislation rightly enforced can make it decidedly unpleasant and unprofitable for a man to be dishonest, and that would be no small gain. Already this is done to some extent, but something more is needed to reach business defaulters and political boodlers who escape through the meshes of legal technicalities.

Probably hazing will never quite disappear from college life, and everybody recognizes that a certain amount of horse play must be tolerated. When mildly exercised it forms a natural outlet for the working off of animal spirits, and it is usually accepted with good humor. But when carried to excess, as is not infrequently the case, it becomes a nuisance and often works untold harm to the victims, besides being subversive of school discipline.

The draining of swamp lands in some sections of our country and the construction of irrigation works in others will transform immense tracts of hitherto worthless land into broad acres of fertile soil producing abundant crops, affording flourishing homes to tens of thousands of people, and materially advancing the prosperity of the states in which the reclamation is going on. This is one of the ways by which the food supply of the future is assured.

Two facts usually strike the public mind as somewhat suggestive. One is that while thousands of vote sellers throughout the country have recently been convicted, it seems impossible to discover who did the buying. The other is that while the official investigation which usually follows a catastrophe never has any difficulty in proving criminal negligence, it is only very rarely that the guilty parties are indicted, and when they are they generally manage to escape punishment.

It is to the great advantage of smaller cities and towns to have the farmers' patronage. But if that is to be secured, one very necessary thing is to have the roads in good passable condition at all seasons of the year. Farmers have been known to avoid towns near at hand, but to which the approach is well nigh impassable in wet weather, and go miles further to buy and sell in towns, the roads to which are kept in good order. To let roads remain in bad condition because it takes money to improve them is exceedingly poor economy.

Any town that does not adequately support its local press is shortsighted and lacking in public spirit. The local paper, beyond all other agencies, diffuses local news, promotes commercial medium for its business men. A paper asks support not as a matter of charity but that it may the more perfectly serve the interests of the community. This is something which in many places merchants and the public generally overlook. But when this support is accorded every rightful interest in the town is a gainer.

Most people will probably agree with the president in refusing to pardon the defaulting bankers, Walsh and Morse. Of course it gives pleasure to none that men who once moved in best circles and stood high in the financial world are now felons. But if men will defraud others they must expect to pay the price if they are found out, and no exception should be made on account of one's former social and financial position. That has been done too often in the past and it has given rise to a good deal of just criticism. Before the law, rich and poor should stand alike.

How Long Will They Stand It?

A good idea of the mad jealousy and suspicion with which the great powers regard each other may be gained by reading of the vast increase made in recent years of the monies spent in building and equipping their war navies. Twenty years ago Germany spent \$22,600,000. In like manner the cost of the United States navy has jumped from \$27,000,000 to \$140,000,000, and that of France, who has been more saving in her expenditures, will cost \$75,000,000 as against \$40,000,000 twenty years ago. Great Britain, true to her tradition that "Britannia rules the wave," and with the instinct of self-preservation, naturally spends by far the largest amount of any nation for naval purposes, it reaching the enormous sum of \$221,500,000, or \$19,000,000 more than last year.

When to this expenditure for naval purposes, is added the expense of the armies supported by these powers, the question naturally arises how long can the nations stand the strain and how long will the masses be willing to be taxed. Already in some nations discontent is quite pronounced and it is bound to increase and spread unless the various governments arrive at some understanding to limit their armaments. Surely with the boasted civilization and religion which these nations profess to have, and do have to some extent, this ought to be possible to the great gain of humanity and peace.

Resolution Ordering Prohibition.

WHEREAS, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the county of Isosco on the 13th day of October, 1910, in compliance with the prayer of certain petitions filed under and in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 207 Public Acts of 1889 as amended, and

WHEREAS, an election was held within the county of Isosco on the 3rd day of April, A. D. 1911, in accordance with said resolution and under the provisions of Act No. 207 Public Acts of 1889, as amended, and

WHEREAS, sufficient returns and statements of votes cast in the several townships, villages, cities and election districts of said county have been made to said Board as required by the act aforesaid, and

WHEREAS, said statement of votes has been canvassed by the said Board and the result thereof ascertained, and

WHEREAS, said result was in the affirmative of the proposition to prohibit within said county the manufacture of liquor and the liquor traffic, the majority of the votes of the qualified electors of said county voting "Yes" in the affirmative thereof, said majority being seventy, and the said Board of Supervisors at a meeting held on the 11th day of April, A. D. 1911, having determined and declared such result as aforesaid, and having entered said canvass of the votes, determination and declaration of the result, together with a tabular statement of all votes cast in full upon their journal of the proceedings of that day, now therefore be it

RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the county of Isosco, That, by virtue of the authority conferred upon them under the provisions of Act No. 207, of the Public Acts of 1889, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto: It is hereby ordered, That on and after the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, the manufacture, sale, keeping for sale, giving away or furnishing of any vinous, malt, brewed, fermented, spirituous or intoxicating liquors, or any mixed liquor or beverage, any part of which is intoxicating, and the keeping in a saloon or any other place where such liquors are manufactured, sold, stored for sale, given away or furnished, shall be and is prohibited within the limits of said county of Isosco; that this resolution of prohibition shall take full effect within the said county of Isosco on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, aforesaid, that being the first day of May after its adoption; that on and after said day it shall be unlawful within said county of Isosco for any person, directly or indirectly, himself or by his clerk, agent or employee, to manufacture, sell, keep for sale, give away or furnish any vinous, malt, brewed, fermented, spirituous or intoxicating liquors, or any mixed liquor or beverage, any part of which is intoxicating, or to keep a saloon or any other place where any such liquors are manufactured, sold, stored for sale, given away or furnished within the limits of said county of Isosco so long as this resolution of prohibition remains unrevoked; that on and after the said first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, the provisions of the general laws of this State for the taxation and regulation of the business of manufacturing, selling, keeping for sale, furnishing, giving away or delivering spirituous or intoxicating liquors, malt, brewed, or fermented, and vinous liquors shall be, and are, suspended and superseded so far as relates to territory and municipalities within the limits of said county of Isosco so long as this resolution of prohibition remains unrevoked.

Provided, however, that all sales of liquor in said county by druggists or registered pharmacists shall be under the restrictions and requirements imposed upon them by the general laws of the State and the provisions of this Act.

And provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prohibit the sale of wine for sacramental purposes, nor the sale of wine or cider from home grown fruit in quantities of not less than five gallons, nor to prohibit the manufacture of wine or cider, nor the sale of wine or cider manufactured in said county to parties who reside outside of said county.

Provided, further, That a copy of this preamble and resolution be published without delay once in each week, until the first day of May, next, in the Tawas Herald, Isosco Gazette, and Oscoda Press, newspapers published and circulated in said county.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT

Conducted by the Twentieth Century Club of Tawas City

Two weeks ago the Civic Improvement Committee brought before the public, through the Tawas Herald, the need and object of such a committee.

Our city, no doubt presents difficulties that seem so discouraging, some will say there is no use in trying. It is not such a gigantic task if each individual does his share of the work.

A well kept lawn, a clean back yard free from weeds and rubbish, good substantial steps and a few shade and fruit trees will increase the value of the property more than twice the cost of the improvement. An old rickety board fence is no improvement to any place. Perhaps some one will say "we need the fence to keep out the cows" We believe that one of the most needed reforms is a movement to see that the cows are driven in the middle of the street and not on the walks and foot paths where there are no walks. We have excellent walks which are a credit to the town and they have been kept in good condition during the winter and let the good work go on through the summer. During the warm weather some of our walks are not much better than barn yards.

Our aim is to make our town alive and attractive not only for own personal pride and satisfaction but for the prospective real estate buyer attracted here by the D. & M. Ry. and the Northeastern Michigan Development Bureau. The impressions of our summer visitors are also worth taking into consideration.

Some people seem to think improvements a waste of time and money. Those people are near sighted and live only for a day at a time. If they could be educated to look farther ahead than the end of their noses they could see that improvement meant dollars and cents to them and their heirs.

We need first individual work, then united effort in public work.

Our beach is worthy of a little money and work. Some stairs to make it accessible and some seats to make it comfortable would make it not only more attractive but more appreciated by both residents and visitors.

Again we repeat the town needs water works, an auditorium, water front park, street lights and push, paint and putty.

Boys and Girls.

Can you raise corn? A prize of at least \$10 is going to be awarded to the boy or girl in Isosco county who raises the best 12 ears of corn this year. The plan is by the Isosco Co. Farmers' Institute society, and at least \$50 is expected to be raised to be distributed in prizes for the best corn grown by a boy or girl (age limit 16 years), during the present year. The first prize will be at least \$10.00.

The terms of competition are that each competitor must plant at least one-eighth of an acre, must prepare the ground, except plowing, plant and do all the caring for the corn while growing. Some good don't corn must be used as seed.

It should be remembered that last year the prize offered in Ingham county was won by a 12-year-old girl. Watch the Herald for more particulars.

We have seen the first robin and satisfied ourselves that spring is coming; our officers have been duly elected and the question of whether we will be "Wet" or "Dry" in the various counties disposed of; the more industrious and foresighted have their fishing tackle repaired and in readiness, so now is the time for us to turn our attention to the important work of supporting the campaign of Publicity inaugurated a year ago; for us to see that organized effort is put forth all along the line toward the populating and development of Northeastern Michigan.

Our district will soon be at its fairest, the pleasant time will soon be with us and each of us should see to it that some person shall be introduced to its charms. Our sister states of the south and west and the province of the north are putting forth mighty efforts to get the colonist and immigrant and get him first. They do not take hold of the matter in a doubting, hesitating or parsimonious manner. With confidence in their respective commonwealths they are cheerfully supplying the sinews of war for a great publicity campaign the coming year with perfect confidence in the results of their investment.

So with the afore-mentioned duties and pleasures out of the way, the time has arrived for the people of this district to turn their attention to the carrying on of the campaign so ably started by the Bureau during the year 1910.

This work should be taken up with a determination for continued effort, as through continued effort only can results be obtained. If there are any people in the district who had an idea that all that was to be done was to get out and make a noise for one season, then it is time such people woke up.

The dollar pledged in the beginning of the season can be made as valuable as the tail end because until funds are pledged for the work the officer's hands are tied and resources are eaten up in office expenses to a larger degree than when they can go ahead and have the whole work moving at once.


