## Mortgage Tax Law Repealed.

One of the really commendable acts passed by the outgoing legislature is with taxes on mortgages and substituting in its place a requirement that after the recording fee, there shall be no further assessment against the

The mortgage tax law was designed to place on the tax roll money which had hitherto escaped. The holder of the mortgage was to pay a tax upon good use of it. To amass great riches the property on which the mortgage was placed, was taxed as if it repremay give the possessor a certain amount double taxation of property was brought Toledo to the following points on the value of his land and the owner of the wood (Linwood Park), for \$6.00; Aumortgage on the amount represented in Gres. Twining, Prescott, Rose City, the instrument. This law resulted in the holders of mortgages trying to evade taxation. Another result was that people in Michigan would have the mortgages made out in the name of some non-resident, who would make an assignment in his favor. The mortgage to the non-resident would go on record, but the assignment would not.

## HOW RICE PAPER IS MADE

Pulp of Aralia Tree Is Used and Not Rice as is Popularly

The so-called rice paper is not made from rice, as its name implies, but from the snow white pith of a small tree belonging to the genus Aralia, a genus represented in this country by the common sarsaparilla and the spikenard. The tree grows in Formosa, and, so far as is known, nowhere

The stems are transported to China and there the rice paper is made. It is used, aside from a number of other purposes, by the native artists for water color drawings, and sometimes it is dyed in various colors and made into artificial flowers.

The tools of the pith worker comprise a smooth stone about a foot square and a large knife or hatchet with a short wooden handle. The blade is about a foot long, two inches broad and nearly half an inch thick at

the back, and it is as sharp as a razor. Placing a piece of the cylindrical pith on the stone, and his left hand on the top, the pith worker will roll the pith backward and forward for a moment until he gets it in the re-

quired position. Then, seizing the knife with his right hand, he will hold the edge of the blade, after a feint or two, close to the pith, which he will keep rolling to the left with his left hand until nothing remains to unroll: for the pith has, by the application of the knife, been pared into a square white sheet of uniform thickness. All that remains to be done is to square the

If one will roll up a sheet of paper, lay it on the table, place the left hand on top and gently unroll it to the left he will have a good idea of how the feat is accomplished.


