About 125 members of the order and the D. of R., gathered at the Temple and after listening to a most enjoyable literary program sat down to an elaborate banquet. The evening was one long to be remembered by the participants.

Insinuating remarks about its business prospects, its industries and its general conditions are not the kind which help to make a town prosper.  The directors of the agricultural society met at the court house Monday afternoon and voted some changes in the premium list. Among the additions was a prize of \$25 to be divided among the Granges of the county for the best exhibit made by them at the fair this fall. The money will be divided \$12 for the best exhibit, \$8 to the next and \$5 to the third. The exhibits must be composed of farm products.
 An order has been issued by the U. S. P. O. department requiring postmasters to keep a count of each piece of mail in each class, which passes through their offices between the 1st and 31st days of May. It not only requires the sorting and counting of all mail, but also the number of times each piece is handled and the time required to handle it. This will require an immense amount of extra work on the part of the postmasters.
 The Presque Isle News tells of the progress of the new industry at Calcite, near Rogers City, to be made by the Michigan Limestone and Chemical company. The sum of \$300,000 will be spent this summer in a stone crushing plant and machinery. Two immense steam shovels, two locomotives, the immense stone crusher and a magnificent power house are features of this plant. Business amounting to 1,000,000 tons of crushed limestone per year is already on the books of the company. Thirty-five men are already at work and the plans are to increase the force by fifty just as fast as men can be secured.

Rev. Webb Dead.
 The news of the death of Rev. R. T. W. Webb, former rector of Christ's Episcopal church, which occurred at Detroit Tuesday morning, came as a shock to his many friends in the Tawas, where he was universally beloved and respected. The Detroit News says:
 The smiling face of Rev. Webb was known by every person among the sixteen hundred communicants of St. John's parish.
 Death came suddenly to Rev. Webb early Tuesday morning. The preceding afternoon he had attended a parish meeting and seemed to be in his usual health. He was stricken with paralysis after retirement that night and passed away at about 2:30.
 Rev. Webb was born in England in 1860. At the age of eleven, his father having died, he came with his family to Canada. His training for the ministry was begun as a lay reader in rural missionary work. He was made a deacon in 1883, a priest in 1884, by the Bishop of Niagara. After a five years' rectorship in Grand Valley, Ont., he came in 1889 to East Tawas, Michigan, to take up the work of that mission under Bishop Davies. There he built a church, and then, in 1895, came to Grace church, Mt. Clemens, of which parish he was pastor for 10 years.
 Rev. Webb's association with the church in Detroit dates from 1905, when he took up the work at St. Philip's mission and, after two years there accepted the invitation of Dr. Faber to become assistant rector of St. John's.
 For the past five years he has been secretary of the diocese and for six years was secretary of the Sunday school institute of the church, from a meeting of which he had returned when stricken.
 Rev. Webb is survived by a widow, three sons, a daughter and three brothers. Two of the brothers are in holy orders in the Church of England and are engaged in mission work in the province of Alberta, Canada.

Death of a Pioneer.
 Mrs. Matilda Beemer passed to her eternal rest at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur E. Bigelow, in this city, Tuesday, April 18, 1911, at the advanced age of 84 years, one month and three days. The deceased was born at Beverly, Ont., and was united in marriage to Peter Beemer November 12, 1845. They came to Iosco county in 1880, where they resided on a farm in Alabaster township for a few years, when they removed to this city. Her husband died in 1897 since which time the deceased has resided with her children, making her home most of the time with her daughter, Mrs. C. L. Bonney, of East Tawas. Her death was the result of two strokes of paralysis which she suffered within the past few weeks. One son and seven daughters survive her.
 The funeral was held from the Tawas City M. E. church, of which she has long been a member, Thursday of last week, Rev. Dibley officiating. Six of her grandsons, George, Charles and Allie Bigelow, Bert Bonney, Alva and Wyatt Misener were pall bearers.
