Onaway, Millersburg and Tower also suffered severe losses, while Cheboygan was threatened by a fire which started in the great sawdust pile there.



The over drawn, sensational reports of the city dailies of the fire conditions in northern Michigan will add many thousand dollars to our fire loss by deterring immigration, Why these papers, who profess to a desire to aid in building up this section, should do it untold injury by publishing unreliable rumors, overdrawing losses, and misrepresenting conditions for a few paltry dollars it bring them in revenue is hard to understand. 'Wednesday's Detroit and Bay City papers report losco county as fire-swept. The fact is that the entire loss is confined to AuSable and Oscoda, and a territory tributary thereto not exceeding five square miles.

Reports relative to the condition in Arenac county are even more exaggerated than here, as are those from the counties farther north.
