The cutting of freight rates on western lines by order of the interstate commerce commission will be welcomed by shippers and by business men generally who have long felt that they were paying too heavily and that the long and short haul rule had been persistently broken. The railways at their western terminals have to meet water competition, it is true, but it is not fair that shippers to intermediate points should bear the cost in higher rates.

It is a question with many people whether the Sherman Act does or does not fulfil its purpose to prevent restraint of trade. Certain it is that the trusts which to date have been found guilty of violating the law continue to do business just about the same as ever and that there is no prospect that any proposed reorganization of those same trusts will change matters to any extent. And it is equally certain that the members of those trusts admitted to have been guilty of criminal transgression have not been prosecuted for their offenses.

Germany has been generally credited with blocking the movement for international disarmament and arbitration. Color has been given to this view by United States as to arbitration treaties.

Whenever a person has been bitten by a dog the first thought is and ought Usual Experience of Man Who Starts to be the possibility of rabies. Because of an old superstition it has become common practice to have the dog immediately put to death. Whenever the animal is suspected of having rabies, this procedure is highly fallacious and cannot be too strongly condemned, as it often makes the positive determination of whether or not the dog had the disease impossible. Rabies can only be communicated by animals affected with rabies and only a short time before the appearance of symptoms. The dog should be tied or locked up and closely watched. If symptoms do not appear in the suspected animal within a week, the wound has not been inoculated with the virus of rabies. 
