Hunting has cost 100 lives in America this year, and has brought serious injury to 37, according to records kept by Chicago newspapers. The deaths numbered the same as last year, but the injured totaled less than half of last year's. Thirty persons killed themselves while hunting, and most of them did it while dragging a gun after them, the hammer catching on twigs, boat gunwales or fences. Bird hunting was the most dangerous sport. Rabbit hunting was the next most dangerous sport next to deer hunting. Michigan had the most killed, 16; Wisconsin 13 and Illinois 14.
