What Alpena's State Banking Institution Means to Alpena.

(From The Alpena News of Dec. 15, 1911.)

The condensed sworn statement of the Alpena County Savings Bank, published elsewhere in this issue, is a matter that is interesting not only to the officers and stockholders of that institution, but to this entire section of the state as well.

If one could know how many young people—and older ones, too—had been taught the habit of saving, and some of the successes that they have attained it would make good reading.

We notice, from the report, that the bank has over One Million and Three-Quarters of Dollars entrusted to them. This mirrors the results of the bank's management and the manner in which the people feel toward the institution.

Some of our readers will recall the Opening Day, in April, 1894. The News in commenting on it at that time, said:

ALPENA'S NEW BANK.

A fifty Thousand Dollar Enterprise added to this City. The bank is located in the corner store of the Culligan Block.

Another Turn Ahead for Alpena A RUSHING BUSINESS Is What the Alpena County Savings Bank Did Today.

Their doors were thrown open at 9:30 and the waiting crowd admitted.

The New Alpena County Savings Bank opened their doors for business at 9:30 this morning and the lobby was soon filled with little ones and big ones who were anxious to get rid of their savings and put them where they would be of some use.

Master Arthur Davison, eldest son of W. H. Davison, was given the first book. Master George Holmes and Master Andrew Harshaw were on hand with their cash and drew out books.

The Alpena County Savings Bank do a general commercial and Savings bank business. Its promoters are our own business men and they have shown by the money already expended in getting ready for business that they are here for the purpose of staying and becoming one of the solid institutions of our community.

At that time, the bank had a capital of \$50,000 and no surplus account. Ten years later the bank's management had conserved their earnings so that their capital and surplus was \$75,000.00, and total assets were \$538,000.00.

Three years later, August, 1908, the business had grown to over one million, five hundred thousand dollars. At that time, the State Savings Bank (which had succeeded the oldest bank in Alpena, the Alpena Banking Co.) thought best to amalgamate with the Alpena County Savings Bank, and by combining their business, make such a large strong bank that it could care for the growing business of Alpena and Northern Michigan.

This, briefly, is the history of the growth of the Alpena County Savings Bank. Its assets now are about two million dollars, and among its stockholders and directors are found some of the most substantial, aggressive men, not only of this part of the state, but of Michigan, and they, with the community, can well feel proud of the strong, safe institution which had its birth in December 1893.
