What Alpenas' State Banking Institution Means to Alpena.

[From The Alpena News of Dec. 15, 1911.]

The condensed sworn statement of the Alpena County Savings Bank, published elsewhere in this issue, is a matter tha is interesting not only to the officers and stockholders of that institution, but to this entire section of the state as well. Another Turn Ahead for Alpena A RUSHING BUSINESS Is What the Alpena County Savings Bank Did Today.

The New Alpena County Savings Bank opened their doors for business at

9:30 this morning and the lobby was soon filled with little ones and big ones who were anxious to get rid of their savings and put them where they would be

> of some use. Master Arthur Davison, eldest son of W. H. Davison, was given the first book. Master George Holmes and Master Andrew Harshaw were on hand with their cash and drew out books. Miss Nina Tallman was on hand early and took a seat on the steps and waited for the door to open. The teller, Will Prince, was kept busy handing out books, and for some hours the bank did a hustling business. On Saturday evening, from seven until eleven, an "open house" was kept and the beautiful room was continually crowded, and the elegant fixtures, safes, vaults and deposit boxes, etc., were thoroughly examined.

The Alpena County Savings Bank do general commercial and Savings bank business. Its promoters are our own business men and they have shown by the money already expended in getting ready for business that they are here for the purpose of staying and becoming one of the solid institutions of our community."

At that time, the bank had a capital of \$50,000 and no surplus account. Ten years later the bank's management had conserved their earnings so that their capital and surplus was \$75,000.00, and total assets were \$538,000.00. The increasing business of the bank necessitated more capital, and in March, 1904, the stockholders voted to increase the capital stock to \$75,000.00 and surplus to \$37,500.00. This made the Alpena County Savings Bank the largest bank in Northeastern Michigan. In 1905 it was again found necessary to increase the capital stock, as business had very materially increased and the total assets were then about one million dollars.

Three years later, August, 1908, the business had grown to over one million, five hundred thousand dollars. At that time, the State Savings Bank (which had succeeded the oldest bank in Alpena, the Alpena Banking Co.) thought best to amalgamate with the Alpena County Savings Bank, and by combining their business, make such a large strong bank that it could care for the growing businessof Alpena and Northern Michigan. To do this, the Alpena County Savings A fifty Thousand Dollar Enterprise Bank's capital was increased to one hundred thousand dollars and its surplus to one hundred and twenty-five thousand. Mr. Comstock, president of the State Savings Bank, was added to the board of directors of the Alpena County Sav ings Bank, and the State Bank's stock holders, received Alpena County Savings Bank stock in lieu of their own.

This, briefly, is the history of the growth of the Alpena County Savings Bank. Its assets now are about two million dollars, and among its stockholders and directors are found some of the most substantial, aggressive men, not only of this part of the state, but of Michigan, and they, with the community, can well feel proud of the strong, safe institution which had its birth in December 1893.
