Enroll Anytime.

Secretary of State Martindale has issued the following circular relative to the primary enrollment law:

The opinion seems to prevail that voters will be afforded the opportunity to enroll only on an enrollment day, which is Monday, April 1.

No elector shall be deemed a qualified enrolled elector who has not enrolled since August 1, 1911.

In many cases it will not be convenient for an elector to appear before the board in person on April 1 and the law provides that an elector may enroll at any time by delivering, in person or by mail, to the city or township clerk, or the officer in charge of the enrollment book, a written request for such enrollment, accompanied by affidavit setting forth that he is a qualified elector and that it is his bona fide intention to affiliate with the political party with which he seeks to enroll. If a voter enrolls by affidavit on or before June 26 he will have the right to vote at the August primary. A voter who has not enrolled either by application and affidavit or on an enrollment day (except as specifically provided) cannot participate in and will not be permitted to vote at a primary election.

If a voter neglects or refuses to give name of his party, or if he has none, he shall not be enrolled by the enrollment board.

In some sections, owing to local conditions, voters have enrolled as "independent," "citizens," "socialist," etc., who affiliate in state elections with some other political party. If such enrolled voter desires to change party affiliations to republican, democrat, prohibition, etc., in order to participate in the August primary, he can only do so by personally making application on April 1, and not by written application and affidavit.

Cannot Advertise a Chance Game.

The U. S. postal authorities are drawing the line very strictly in reference to lotteries, says the editor-postmaster of the Ithaca Herald. Many things which were formerly permitted are now absolutely forbidden. Not only are the mails not to be used to advertise lotteries or announce prize winners or distribute tickets or prizes, but as now construed, any scheme is a lottery in which the element of chance enters, whether any money is required for entering or not. Guesses or estimates as to how long a candle will burn, how many beans or peas or pennies are in a pile or dish, advertisements of the contest of or any raffie or quilt drawing or announcements of the winners are forbidden and newspapers containing them are to be excluded from the mails. If anything is to be given away, but does not state the method, it becomes the duty of the postmaster to find out from the advertiser the method of distribution, and if he refuses to tell and it is found to depend on lottery or chance, to exclude the paper containing this advertisement from the mails.

The several wards and townships will be entitled to representation as follows: Alabaster 1, AuSable township 2, Baldwin 1, Burleigh 1, Grant 1, Oscoda 3, Reno 1, Sherman 1, Tawas 3, Wilber 1, AuSable City, 1st ward 1; 2nd ward 1, 3rd ward 1, East Tawas, 1st ward 2; 2nd ward 2, 3rd ward 1, Tawas City, 1st ward 1, 2nd ward 1, 3rd ward 1, Whittemore, 1st ward 1; 2nd ward 1. Total 28.

New Woodman Rates.

Many readers of the Herald are interested in the affairs of the Modern Woodmen of America, either because they are members or beneficiaries of the insurance certificates carried by a father, husband, brother, or son, but not all are familiar with the details of the recent changes made in the rates. Briefly, the change consists of two general plans—whole life protection and term protection running to ages 50, 60 and 70. In addition to these two general plans, as recommended by the committee, the Head Camp adopted resolutions providing the natural premium or pure current cost, whole life plan and two other plans permitting members to continue the payment of their present rates either as term or whole life rates for the full value thereof.

The future level rates of assessment for whole life protection after January 1, 1913, will be higher than the present rates, but by the adoption of the natural premium or step rate plan and the term plans, safe protection can be obtained at a very low cost, in the majority of cases at a lower cost than the present rates of the Society. Under the term to age 50, protection can be furnished at 40 cents per month per thousand at 18, 45 cents at 25, 50 cents at 30, 55 cents at 35, 60 cents at 40, and 65 cents at 45, while in the step rate plan the rate, ages 18 to 30, inclusive, 35 cents per thousand and gradually increases until the rate reaches \$1 per thousand per month at age 55. By the adoption of these plans of insurance, the young man who so desires may obtain the greatest possible amount of insurance at the smallest outlay, during the period when his family needs the greatest protection.

An Historical Mission.

Outside of California, few people realize that the oldest mission on the Pacific Coast is in the city of San Diego. Once far away in the outskirts of the city, in what was called "Old Town," the rapidly growing metropolis of the southwest has engulfed and swallowed up the adobe building and its surroundings, even to its more than century-old olive garden where the padres walked and told their beads while absorbed in pious meditation. Those gnarled olive trees, suggesting the trees of the Garden of Gethsemane, seem enlivened with perpetual life. Today they blossom and yield fruit and seemingly they will continue to do so for many decades to come. As for the mission itself, fate has been less kind to it, for its walls show the ravages of time. Still, it is a relic of exceeding interest. Travelers pay homage to it, and many look on the quaint old shrine with deep religious awe.



Newsey Little Paragraphs Gathered from Exchanges

Harrisville is considering the question of a new school house.

Handy Bros., of Bay City, are preparing to open up another large coal mine south of Bay City.

Cheboygan is trying to have the Crown Chemical Co. remove their turpentine plant from Grayling to that city.

A civil service examination will be held at Harrisville on the 30th inst. for candidates for rural carriers in that county.

Two large barns on the Potter Riverside farm west of Alpena, together with 62 tons of hay, were destroyed by fire Tuesday.

A Wheeler, of Au Gres, who made a big success in growing onions last season, will plant 20 acres this year, and also 20 acres of cabbage.

Selah Sheldrake, of Omer, was on Thursday of last week arrested on a statutory charge, alleged to have been committed in Midland county.

C. F. Smith, of Cheboygan, was re-elected president of the Northern Michigan Bee-Keepers Association at their meeting at Traverse City last week.

J. D. Rogers, of Onaway, left last week for Baxter county, Arkansas. Nothing peculiar about this except that he expects to walk the entire distance.

Dan P. McMullen has resigned as postmaster of Cheboygan after ten years service. Frank McIntyre has been named as his successor and will take the office April 1.

George Osgood, residing near Lengsville, was struck by a Michigan Central snow plow last Friday while walking on the track near Pinconning. He escaped with slight injuries.

Herb Baker, of Cheboygan, speaker of the house at Lansing, is being boomed by the Detroit News as a successor to Hon. William Alden Smith as U. S. senator from Michigan.

The government has discontinued the cases against Patrick Culligan and F. W. and R. E. Gilchrist, the well-known Alpena lumbermen, who were charged with making fraudulent entries for government lands in Oregon.

Arenac county will vote on the question of bonding for \$5,000 to build a court house at the April election. The Standish Independent announced last week that it has been discovered that it requires 20 days notice to township clerks instead of 30 as was first supposed, and that the required notices have been served.

Miss F. M. Towle, postmaster of Gaylord, who has been connected with the postoffice as either postmaster or clerk for the past 35 years, died Monday. She was approaching 66 years of age and had been in poor health for several years. She went to Gaylord with her parents in 1877, when Gaylord was a mere hamlet. She was appointed assistant postmaster under C. F. Doore in 1877.

Two children of Edward Yoder, aged respectively six years and eight months, burned to death Wednesday morning when the home in Comins township, Oscoda county, was destroyed. The mother had lighted a fire in a stove and left to go a short distance after water, leaving the children sleeping. When she returned the house was in flames, and she was unable to rescue the children. The father was absent from home.

Practically all of the women's organization in Bay City have banded together in order to work more effectively for the public welfare. The organization which is known as "The Welfare Alliance," is headed by Mrs. C. J. Smith, of the Women's Improvement Club, and includes 17 bodies which, while working together for this general purpose, retain their identity each for the particular line of endeavor for which it was organized.

In the circuit court at Standish last Thursday the jury returned a verdict for \$3,000 in favor of the estate of Miss Edith Barhite against the D. & M. Ry. Co. Miss Barhite was killed at Turner last summer by being hit by a light engine while she was going to the station in that village to take the night train. The contention of the plaintiff in the case was that the engine which killed the young lady was running too fast through the village, that the proper lights were not displayed, that a box car standing near the depot obstructed a plain view of the track, that the depot grounds were not properly lighted and that the station was not open for the reception of passengers.

The following are the qualifications of male electors in the state of Michigan: Every male inhabitant of this state, being a citizen of the United States; every male inhabitant residing in this state on the twenty-fourth day of June, eighteen hundred thirty-five; every male inhabitant residing in this state on the first day of January, eighteen hundred fifty; every male inhabitant of foreign birth who, having resided in this state two years and six months prior to the eighth day of November, eighteen hundred ninety-four, and having declared his intentions of becoming a citizen of the United States two years and six months prior to said last named day; and every civilized male inhabitant of Indian descent, a native of the United States and not a member of any tribe, shall be an elector and entitled to vote; but no one shall be an elector and entitled to vote at any election unless he shall be above the age of twenty-one years, and has resided in this state six months, and in the township or ward in which he offers to vote twenty days next preceding such election.

Said board of registration will be in session on the day and at the place aforesaid from 8 o'clock in the forenoon until 8 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose aforesaid.

Primary Enrollment.

Notice is hereby given that the board of enrollment of the city of Tawas City, state of Michigan, will be in session on Monday, April 1, A. D. 1912, in the voting precinct of said city at the polling place where the annual city election of said city is to be held, due legal notice of which has been given, for the purpose of enrolling the names of all persons, members of whatever political party, who are entitled to enrollment and who make personal application for such enrollment at the time above designated to the board of enrollment of the voting precinct in which they reside.

HOW ELECTORS CAN SECURE ENROLLMENT.

1st. By personal application on above named enrollment day, April 1, 1912.

2nd. By a written request accompanied by affidavit, an elector can enroll any day, but cannot vote at any primary held within two months. This affidavit and application must be delivered to the city clerk or other officer in charge of the enrollment book.

3rd. If an elector who was sick or unavoidably absent on enrollment day or who became 21 years of age or an elector after enrollment day can have his name enrolled on primary election day and vote at that election by taking the necessary oath.

4th. If an elector who has been duly enrolled as above changes his residence from one precinct in the state to another he can be enrolled in the new precinct by obtaining a proper certificate from a member of the enrollment board of the precinct wherein he formerly resided stating that he is duly enrolled in the precinct from which he has moved and is entitled to enrollment in the new precinct, or by taking oath.

This is the last enrollment day for 1912, but electors can enroll any day by request as stated. No person can vote at a primary whose name has not been enrolled since August 2, 1911. Voters who enrolled January 27th or at any time since August 2, need not enroll again except for change of residence.

An elector who neglects or refuses to give the name of his political party cannot have his name enrolled.

Said boards of enrollment will be in session at the place of holding said election from 7 o'clock a. m., until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day of enrollment.
