

Graves, epresentative from Adrain, discovered recently that the bill put through by someone in the legislature to prevent persons not admitted to the bar, or disbarred, from advertising themselves as attorneys is very faulty. It reads "any person who is not a regularly licensed attorney and not suspended or disbarred from practice' is forbidden to hold him self out as an attorney-at-law." It should read "or is suspended or disbarred from practice." Col. Graves introduced a resolution, which was adopted by the house, to ask Gov. Osborn for a message permitting the legislature to make the

It will take at canals into perfect working order, and a few of the laterals, so that the engineers can survey the whole land. No possible excuse can be given for those speculators who have induced homeseekers all thru the Northern cities to buy farms where the land is not yet free of water, and will not be for twenty, or fifty years. It ought to be clear enough to any ordinary mortal that he should not buy landed property until he has seen it; but we are not all of us ordinary mortals; and so it comes about that thousands have farms, some of which must be approached with oats, and every acre of which must be drained by cross ditches connecting with the canals, before they can be cultivated. Trucking lands, of course, are generally flat land, and especially when they are swampy they are preempted by mosqui-In the case of the Everglades, we have two or three degrees of latitude and as many of longitude, altogether a natural home for this pest, and he knows it There are a few farins possible close by he large canals, and we believe that these are constructed to retain sufficient water for light navigation. Outside the swamp, and bordering it, there is some good farming land, and a few settlements. Congress does well to bring this matter to the open, and we are glad to read the primary platforms of the candidates for governor in Florida, which pledge an honest investigation and the driving out of dishonest companies. There is room enough for honest land promoters, and we believe there are some of them at work .- New York In-





2nd. By a written request accompanied by affidavit, an elector can enroll any day, but cannot vote at any primary held within two months. This affidavit and application must be delivered to the city clerk or other officer in charge of the enrollment

3rd If an elector who was sick or unavoidably absent on enrollment day or who became 21 years of age or an elector after enrollment day can have his name enrolled on primary election day and vote at that election by taking the necessary

4th. If an elector who has been duly enrolled as above changes his residence from one precinct in the state to another he can be enrolled in the new precinct by obtaining a proper certificate from a member of the enrollment board of the precinct wherein he formerly resided stating that he is duly enrolled in the precinct from which he has moved and is entitled to enrollment in the new

precinct, or by taking oath. This is the last enrollment day for 1912, but electors can enroll any day by request as stated. No person can vote at a primary whose name has not been enrolled since August 2, 27th or at any time since August 2. need not enroll again except for

change of residence An elector who neglects or refuses to give the name of his political party cannot have his name enrolled. Said boards of enrollment will be in session at the place of holding said election from 7 o'clock a. m., until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day of enroll-
