DESERT OCEAN IN AFRICA

Sahara to Be Covered With Ships an Surrounded by Fertile Fields and Forests.

The project of converting the des ert of Sahara Into a vast inland sea one-half the size of the Mediterran ean, is again being agitated, chiefly by Prof. Gotchegoven, a distinguished scientist. He believes he has worked out a satisfactory plan for the engi neering work necessary, and is not urging that France add this to its oth er Northern Africa enterprises.

About one-fourth of the great deser is below the sea level, and by his plan of cutting a canal some 50 miles lone to the north coast of Africa, the whole region would be covered with a sea from 10 to 60 fathoms deep and navigable by steamers, thus producing a flourishing traffic between French West Africa.

It is also argued that all the arid section surrounding the desert would be rendered as fertile as Europe, and that millions of people, now leading a precarious existence, could support themselves in comfort.

Two objections are raised by other scientists. One is the possible damage which might be done to Europe by an alteration of climatic conditions on a large scale, and another the brium of the earth would be affected by the displacement of so many billions of tons of water.
